BY-PASS UPDATE

The Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton held a Public Information Centre on the Blackburn Hamlet By-Pass on September 3 at Glen Ogilvie Public School from 4:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.. The purpose of the Information Centre was to inform the Public about the background to this project and the future study process.

Detailed maps showing proposed routes and their impact on the present environment were available along with information on projected traffic patterns. The material presented was prepared by the consulting firm McCormick Rankin who are undertaking the study of the design of the by-pass. Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton staff as well as members of the study team of McCormick Rankin were on hand and answered questions. Comment sheets were provided and members of the public were encouraged to make their views known on what they want to see included in the design of the by-pass.

Two concerns raised by residents were lack of access to the Greenbelt south of the By-Pass and the possibility that Bearbrook Rd might be extended south to intersect with the By-Pass.

Brendan Reid, Transportation Planner, Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton, said that this initial public meeting was to inform the public what is to be studied in detail and to make them aware of the study process. Further information meetings are planned as the design study proceeds.

Environment Blackburn a local group opposed to the proposed By-Pass route, was on hand to present their alternate route proposal.

Construction of the By-Pass will affect all residents of Blackburn Hamlet. I urge you to keep yourself informed as to what is being planned for this community.

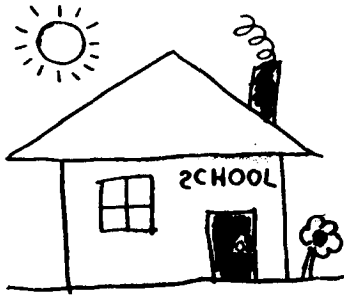
Although the location of prime interest to the Hamlet, Site #22, is not the primary site, we are still disappointed with the direction the Region is taking with it's focus on incineration.

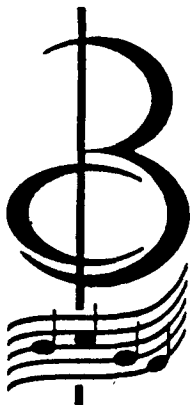

I must emphasize that these meetings are part of a process which has begun. A great deal of work has to be done but finally after years of treading water we are starting to move forward.

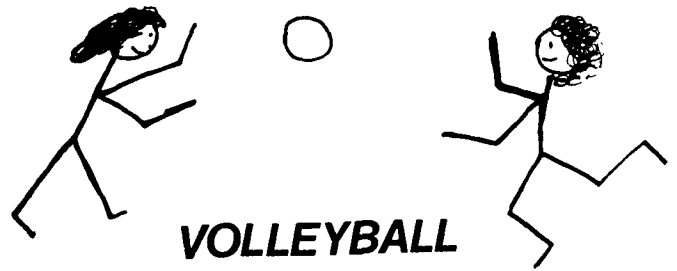
Gloucester Arts Board

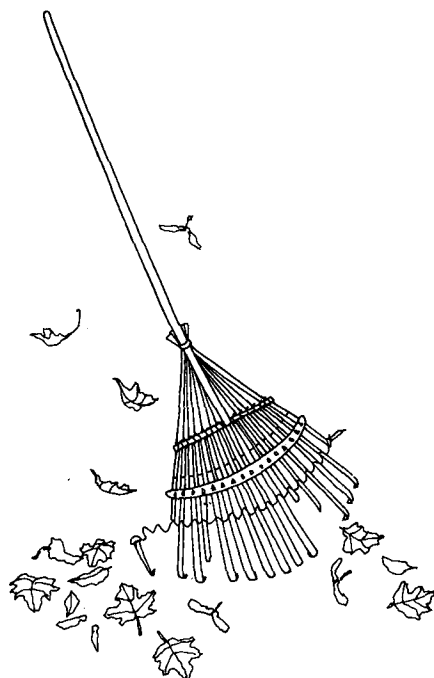

GLOUCESTER CENTRE FOR COMMUNITY RESOURCES

As this article is being put together for the October issue of the Banar, summer is still very much with us. Many of the programs that take place in the Centre have not been going on all summer and some of the people who help keep these programs going - community volunteers - have been off on vacation.

Where possible, we are including the starting date of programs or groups and the contact person's name. If no date is given, or you are unclear about place or time, please contact the Resource Centre at 741-6025.

The Centre is located at 2040 Arrowsmith Drive, just down a block from Ogilvie and Jasmine Crescent. We are open daily from 8:30 to 4:00 (for August) and then revert back to 4:30 closing.

The Centre is here for a two-fold purpose: to offer services and programs/support in the following areas.

Professional counselling to families, single parents, individuals - Janet Penny. People needing this kind of help may call themselves or be referred by another person (school, doctor, other agency).

Counselling for Youth - individual and group - Luize Collin. Groups held in Gloucester high and middle schools - Tom Hall. Referrals through the Gloucester Police Department.

Special Care to the elderly, handicapped - Pam Simpson. For those still living in the community and in subsidized homes (Regional Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton).

Home Management Counselling - Elizabeth Hayes. Direction in child care, home management skills etc. to low-income and families in crisis. Also a re-entry program which offers part-time work to suitable persons.

Crisis Intake - Diane Constantineau. Help in emergency situations regarding housing and food. For families and individuals.

Women & Violence - crisis intervention and support for women living in abusive situations. 24-hour crisis line for persons in immediate crisis 745-4818 (English) and 745-3665 (French).

The following support groups and services are also offered at or through the Centre.

Legal Aid Clinic - every Thursday between 4 and 8 p.m. - no appointment needed. No charge.

Seniors' Employment Counselling - for people over 55 looking for temporary or full-time work. There is a representative of the main office at 63 Sparks in Gloucester at the Centre Monday mornings. Call 741-6025 for an appointment.

Meals-on-Wheels - has been operating in North Gloucester over five years; recently begun in South Gloucester. (Ita McCabe 824-6867 for North and Hilda Zillinsky 523-2598 for South Gloucester).

Pre-Natal and Post-Natal classes coordinated by Health Department at 722-2242 but held in Centre.

Seniors Bridge (Wednesday afternoons) and Thursday lunch at noon in Centre. Contact Steve Evans at 745-4266. This group will be moving to their own centre on Ogilvie Road this fall.

Friendly Visitors - Connecting a lonely or shut-in person with a visitor who keeps in touch with that person by phone and visits. New coordinator is Ginette Rashleigh at 837-1733.

Support Group for Women who are, or have lived in an abusive relationship. Leave name at 741-6025 if you would like to come to one of these support groups this fall. If in crisis call Estelle at 745-4818 or 745-3665. Your call will be answered night or day in French or English.

Phobic Support Group - Ongoing group to assist people who are experiencing or have experienced agoraphobia. Every Monday p.m. at 7:30 at Centre. Or contact Ellen at 745-3889.

La Leche League for nursing mothers - may not continue this fall, but information can be received through calling 741-6025.

Community Mental Health support group - 10 week groups offering support and the opportunity to share experiences and gain new skills and confidence. Contact is Janet Brown at 741-6025.
