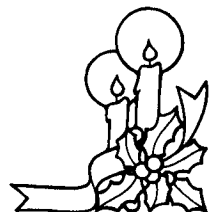
From the President

At a recent meeting I listened with interest to two speakers, John Seul ( ex-mayor of Toronto) and the governor of Arkansas. Both spoke of their concern that North American cities do not make significant social investments in the places in which we live (particularly in comparison with Europe), and that we invest little effort to develop a consensus on important issues. It was Seul's observation that one consequence of these characteristics, is that whereas Europeans tend to personalize the places in which they live (e.g., OUR city), by and large North Americans do not. This in turn has led Europeans to view urban development from a more social perspective.

This "our city" orientation struck a chord with me as I pondered Blackburn Hamlet, and two issues that face us - the incinerator and the bypass. Superficially, Blackburn has developed a consensus on the incinerator - "not here". Most of us perceive air pollution as a common threat, even though we don't all live near the corridors that would be heavily travelled by trucks going to and from the facility. Basically I suppose, it just doesn't seem sensible to locate an incinerator near a concentration of people - our communities. But why is it that Region does not share our belief? Why are we not supporting others in their fight against other sites? Necessary self-interest, I suppose. Perhaps Region values efficiency and savings over peoples opinions. The problem just may be that they are not taking any downstream health effects into consideration because they are not immediately visible, or more importantly, measurable in dollars.

Now what about the bypass and consensus. The fact is, rather than attempting to build consensus, in which our concerns are acknowledged and dealt with, we have processes of self-interest and division. Self-interest with this issue leads to specific local examples of I-win-you-lose (e.g. I get to work faster but your house is expropriated). Why can't we solve the routing problem without damaging people's views of their community - our community? Again, I have this feeling that the local and regional political process does not seem to be able to cope with consensus. No doubt the players that espouse the varying and conflicting opinions that characterize these issues view their actions as being supportive of the common good. However, I can't help thinking, admittedly with some cynicism, that the view that will prevail will have more to do with the exercise of raw power (by non-elected agencies such as Region and NCC) than the development of a plan of action based on social consensus. We need to work at social investment and consensus building. It's not an overnight phenomena. How about it - why not try a consensus approach in which we all win?

 HELD ON OCTOBER 21, 1987  
 GLEN OGILVIE PUBLIC SCHOOL

PRESENT: Bob Madill, Marg Maddoc, Bob Jamieson, Ken Zoner, Special Visitor: J. Ruano

Bob Madill called the meeting to order and the following reports were tabled:

DIRECTORS REPORTS

Ken Zoner: All canvassing has been started and the drive will be extended to Nov. 30, 1987. It was also decided that any registration for events taking place before 1988 will be covered for discount in 1987 as well with 1988 membership.

Bob Jamieson: The following projects were reviewed:

- Expansion of IGA store
  - Construction of mini-mall
  - Condominiums on Beddoe Lane
  - Senior Citizen's Complex
  - Eastern Parkway Interchange with Bearbrook
- Another open house meeting on the Bypass has been scheduled for January.

Marg Maddock: A motion was made by Bob Madill, seconded by Marg Maddoc, and approved to change Signing Authority from one to four persons: Bob James, Marg Maddoc, Bob Madill, Warren Hamstead.

OTHER BUSINESS

Fun Fair 1988 The BCA is looking for a coordinator for the fair in 1988. There was a consensus that perhaps our fair had become a bit too large and that we should go back to the successful family affair it used to be.

Tennis Club Representatives from the Tennis Club, Mr. DuPlessis and Joanne D'Alfonso tabled the need for funds for improvements to the club house. The Directors requested detailed information on membership, specific plans and costs, and the role of the BHCRR for their type of project. The Directors felt that the BCA may be able to act as banker, providing the tennis association had prepared and agreed on a plan to repay a BCA loan over an agreed period of time. Another presentation will be forthcoming.

Eric Schiller Mr. Schiller expressed his concern regarding two very large commercial signs that had been erected on Innes Road. He felt these signs did not add to the beauty of the Hamlet and a request was made to take action on the removal of these signs. Mr. Schiller's information indicated that the signs contravened two Gloucester bylaws - they are larger than the permissible 100 ft<sup>2</sup>, and do not advertise services or products available from the local ground level businesses. The board advised Mr. Schiller to continue the presentation of his objections to the proper authorities involved.

Roger Pyper Mr. Pyper expressed his concern regarding an article in the Orleans Star quoting Bob Madill about the Bypass. Mr. Pyper was of the opinion that the Star article gave the impression that the BCA is opposed to a tight Bypass. He felt that any apparent resistance to the by-pass could have the effect of strengthening the case for widening Innes Road. A majority of the BCA Directors present stated that they agreed with the general tone of the article in the Star, but wished to restate the BCA's position, i.e., that Innes Road should serve only local traffic, and that the by-pass should be routed far south of Blackburn Hamlet's southern boundary.

Ladies & Gentlemen,

From time to time you will have experienced calls to serve your community. This might be interpreted as a similiar blandishment. However we must tell you that this is not a request, but is a warning, since the community is yours and the task, though not tasking, is absolutely required.

The BLACKBURN HAMLET RECREATION CENTRE BOARD (BHRCB) is appointed by CITY COUNCIL to administer community recreation facilities. We make recommendations to Council as to a mill rate to raise taxes for operation, and also the manner in which such taxes are disbursed.

Members serve from 1 January to 31 December each year. We meet approximately every three months or as required, but rarely more than six times a year. There is a need for a Chairperson, Treasurer, and Secretary, and as many members as wish, to a normal maximum of fifteen. We are joined by two designated Councillors.

If we do not get volunteers then the administration of the community facilities could devolve to the City Administration. This would remove community autonomy.

As you will see elsewhere in this paper the BHRCB General Meeting will take place on 16 December 1987. The minutes of that meeting will contain the recommended budget for 1988, and also the names of Hamlet volunteers who wish to act as Members of the Board.

Persuant to the provisions of By-Law 172 of 1975 of the Corporation of the City of Gloucester and the amending resolutions of Council, the following are the particulars of the upcoming Annual General Meeting to be held on Wednesday, December 16, 1987.

1. The meeting will be held on December 16th, 1987 at 7:30 p.m. in the Library of Glen Ogilvie School, Blackburn Hamlet.
2. Each resident is entitled to file either one statement of support for, or one statement of opposition to, the proposals which are referred to herein. The statements shall be forwarded to the Board, whose postal address is:

Statements submitted by mail and written statements submitted by residents at the Annual General Meeting shall have the same force and effect upon any decision taken by the Board concerning proposals and all written statements shall form part of the documentation submitted by the Board to Council.

All statements of opposition or support must be received at the above noted address no later than 4:00 p.m., December 16, 1987.

The BHRCB will also receive community ideas for projects to be undertaken in 1988, thus if there are projects that you wish to see undertaken in your area, this meeting constitutes an active means by which you may be heard. You may also mail in your ideas, before March 16, 1988 at the above noted address.

3. The object of the Annual General Meeting is to ensure that residents and Council are kept fully informed of the activities of the Board and as well, to determine the extent of the support for, or opposition to, the proposals put forward by the Board.
4. During the past year (1987), the Board has held meetings at which it:
  - a) Saw to the upkeep and maintenance of all existing park facilities which are the responsibility of the Board within the confines of Blackburn Hamlet;
  - b) Entered into an agreement with the Blackburn Community Association Tennis Committee for the operation of the tennis courts;
  - c) With the assistance of the City Recreation Department, established rates and policies with regard to the Bearbrook Swimming Pool and saw to the operation of that swimming pool during the 1987 season;
  - d) Dealt with the concerns of the residents with respect to the parks and structures under the control of the Board;

e) Conducted studies in conjunction with City Staff, of requirements that exist for maintenance and capital projects of Parks and Recreation Facilities within Blackburn Hamlet;

f) Reviewed a report by the City Staff which provided cost estimates for projects to be completed in 1988 and after; and,

g) Received revenue and incurred the expenses as hereinafter set out in the financial statements.

#### 5. Proposals for 1988

The Board has approved Capital Expenditures in the amount of \$34035.00 for 1988 which will result in the enhancement of our neighbourhood parks, upgrading of Bearbrook Park and the Pool building and completion and upgrading of the pathway system within the Hamlet.

#### 6. Board Membership

It is the intention of the Board to recommend to Council that the following members of the Board be re-appointed to the Blackburn Hamlet Recreation Centre Board in 1988:-

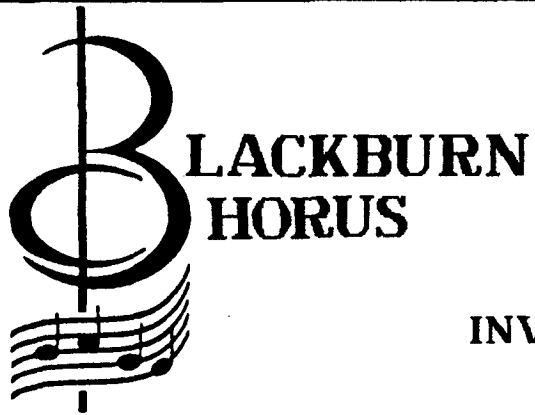

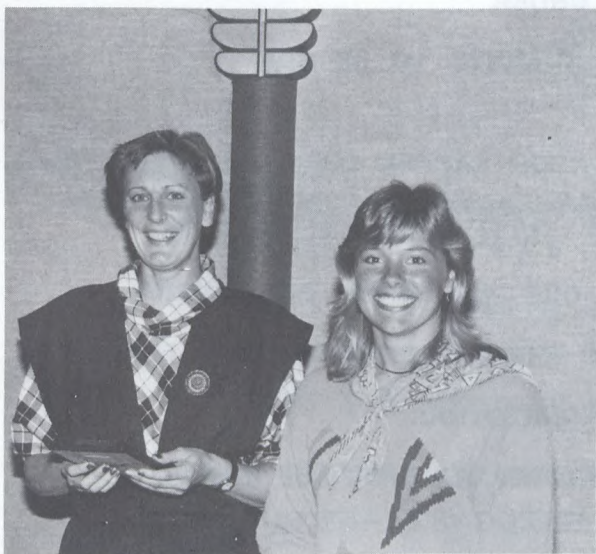
## ANNUAL CLUB TOURNAMENT WINNERS

About 40 members of the Blackburn Tennis Club enjoyed a wind-up to the 1987 season at a combined dinner and general meeting held on October 15.

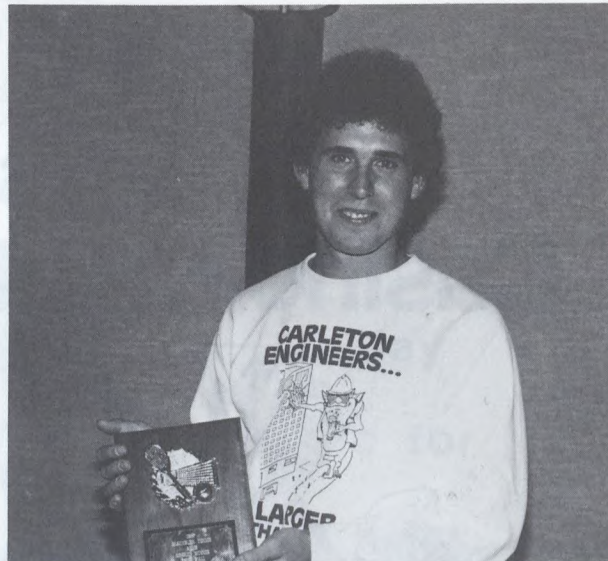

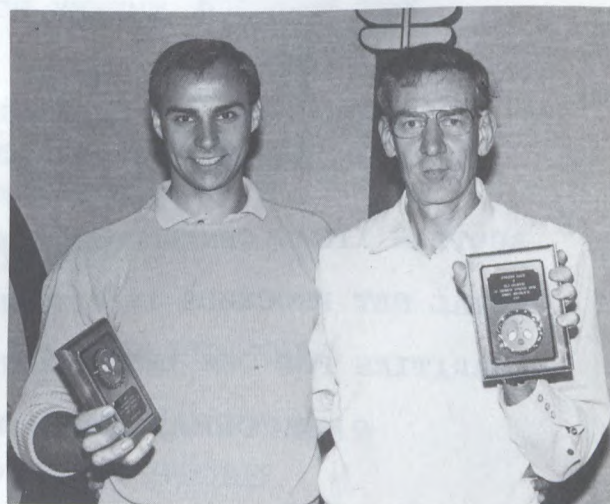

# Letters to the Editor

## SIGNBOARD CLUTTER ON INNES ROAD

By the time this issue of the BANAR comes out we will be bombarded with an increase of Christmas advertising. However this year as you travel along Innes Road there will be a new dimension added to this advertising blitz. I am referring to the two new large billboards that have appeared on Innes and Beddoe Lane, outside of Wally's Restaurant.

These signs could be the first step in an excessive commercialisation of Innes Road. Blackburn Hamlet could soon no longer be a cohesive community, but could be increasingly cut in two by a commercialized strip of advertisements. This can be a factor in downgrading the quality of life in the Hamlet.

I have made some preliminary investigations about the by-laws regulating these advertising signboards. Apparently billboard signs like these have no size limitations and their advertising content need bear no relation to anything sold on the premises. The frightening aspect of this is that similar signs can be erected at similar business establishments in Blackburn Hamlet and in fact throughout Gloucester. I wonder if this is the kind of environment in which we want to live?

The authorities, when questioned about the lack of effective regulations on billboard signs have informed me that eventually there will be a review of signboard legislation in Gloucester. I am afraid without vigorous protests from concerned citizens, that this review may be a long time in coming.

In the meantime there are some things that one can do:

- (1) You can inform merchants who put up large highway signs in the Hamlet if you do not approve of these signs.
- (2) You can phone and/or write elected representatives and other authorities, urging a review of regulations that allow highway type signs to be erected within built-up areas like Blackburn Hamlet.

I suspect that many small children were similarly disappointed, judging from the many smashed lanterns, littering the lawns and roadways of the Hamlet.

Blackburn Hamlet is an excellent community in which to live and raise our children and this family is pleased to be part of it. But I wonder what it will become if we don't instill in our children the need to be kind, considerate, and show respect for the property of others.

#### YOUR ALDERMAN'S REPORT

##### ROADS:

You have noticed the work carried out at Bearbrook and St. Joseph Blvd. to re-align the Eastern Parkway with Bearbrook. This comes from the agreement with the NCC involving the By-Pass. The agreement with the NCC covers the By-Pass lands and access to the airport owned by the NCC and lands owned by the City by the Ottawa River. The re-alignment was also part of that agreement.

While it may make good reading to talk of secret horse-trading, the truth is much less dramatic. An agreement was reached and it is being carried out. The details of the agreement have been well-publicized.

The re-alignment is a small, but important, move and indicates that things are happening, slowly but surely. A bonus for us is that the Hornet's Nest seems to be out of danger for many years.

What is happening in the eastern area reflects the recommendations of our own DelCan study on transportation in the Eastern Urban Area (1985) and the Region's Transportation reports.

##### DEVELOPMENT:

While I realized that the years 1985 to 1988 would likely be the most dynamic period in the City's development, I am pleased with the growth which is occurring in the Blair Road/Queensway sector. The Shenkman Development should be having it's sod turning by the time you read this and the shovels should be working in earnest. You already have seen the Transitway moving eastward from St. Laurent to Blair. The next move will be to extend it beyond Blair which will have a stage commencing next spring.

Development is far from over, as you will see further work commencing in the other quadrants. We are making progress in getting a better commercial base in Gloucester.

##### THE SEASON:

The Christmas Season is rapidly approaching and may I wish you all a happy and safe holiday season and may 1988 be a prosperous year.
