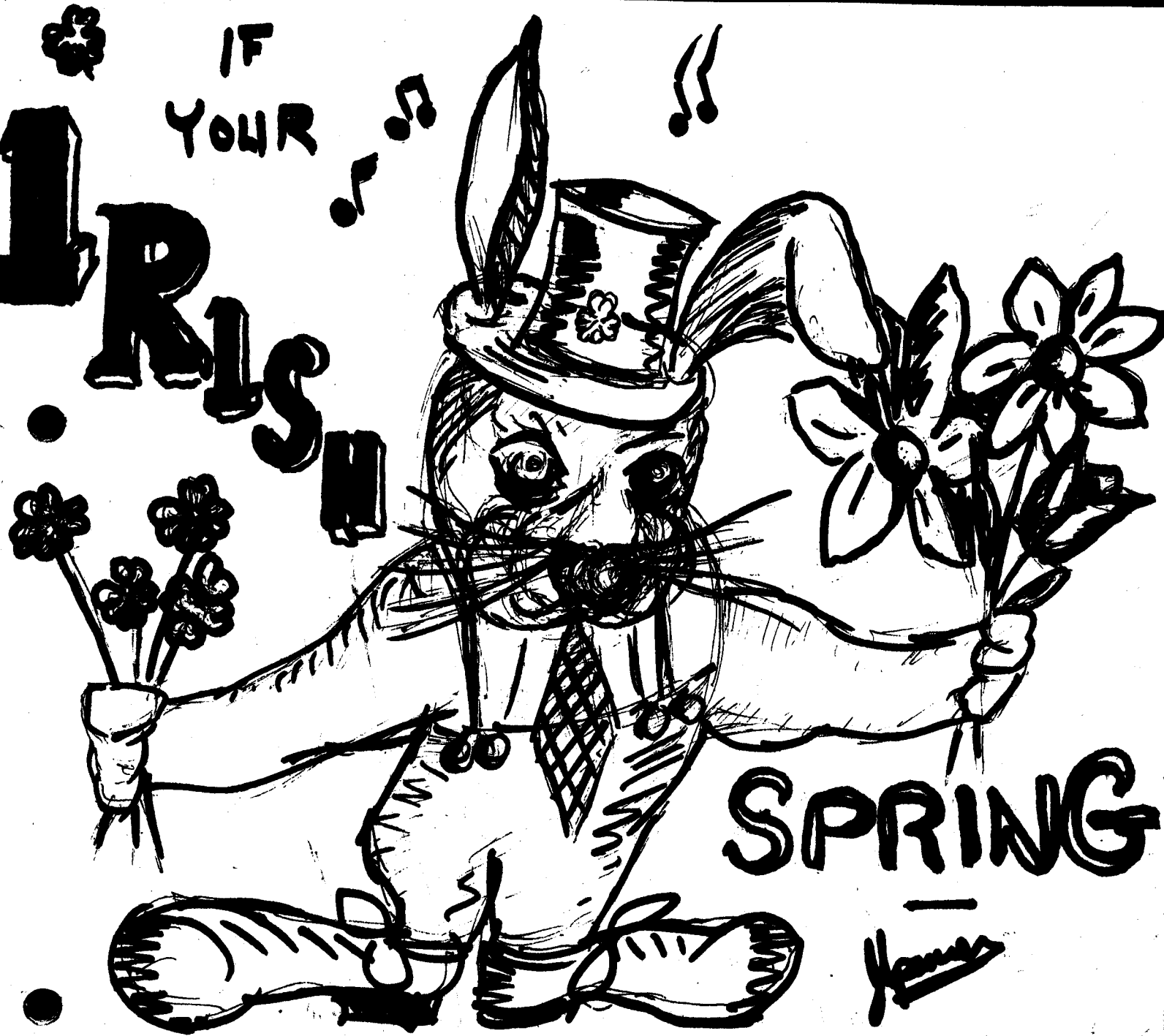

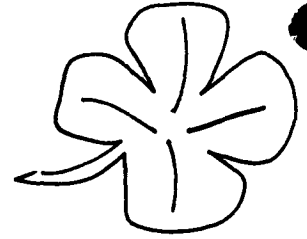

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MINUTES - Jan 18, 1990

Directors Reports:

Civic Affairs: Steve reported on a meeting he and Bob attended with a consultant hired to assess the impact of the proposed new fire station and training hall. This would be located at the east end of the Hamlet, on Innes just where it reaches the NCC and before the new bypass intersection. Steve will prepare a small note and map to inform the community in the March BANAR.

Day Camp: Peggy noted that we are fortunate that Amy Allen will again return to supervise the camp. This year the camp will run for seven weeks, instead of the previous six, and will again be held at Glen Ogilvie. Discussion was also held on the need for an answering machine for handling day camp questions.

MOTION: Steve moved, Joan seconded: That the BCA approve the purchase of 2 answering machines, and associated phone lines for required period, for Day Camp registration. Passed.

Sports: Marg noted that boys baseball is now under the direction of Ken Murray, and that G. Polomark is responsible for girls softball.

Membership: Ken reported that the final numbers are in. Only 800 households took memberships, and although up from last year, this is far from what was expected. Several canvassers handed in sheets with streets without a single member-15 streets in all. It was agreed to blitz these in March. Ken, Bob and Joan will meet on Feb. 6th to review the approach.

Warren noted that with numbers as low as these we should review the policy of distributing the BANAR to all households. The rising costs are such that printing 3,200 copies is an excessive expense if most homes don't feel that it, and other BCA services, aren't worth the \$8 a year membership fee.

President: Bob reported that Joyce Roy was successful in her quest for a new editor: Colleen Stimpson will take over the BANAR with the March issue. The BCA noted their appreciation to Joyce for an excellent job, and wish Colleen the best in the coming months.

Bob noted that he had inserted a notice in the Feb. BANAR soliciting community comments on what the BCA should do for Senior Adults in Blackburn. He also remarked that he will be attending a GRCB/Rec Association meeting on Feb. 22 to review various items of interest from the city.

Treasurer: Warren reviewed the interim financial statements of the BCA and commented that various factors have combined to produce a better year in 1989 than was expected. Boy's hockey shows a large surplus - this will be followed-up. Ringette was credited with a surplus from past years when they amalgamated into Green's Creek. It was noted that Ladies ringette will be requested to keep the ice rental payments current.

Now that all applications are in Warren, Bob, and Marg will get together before Feb. to determine the recommended distribution of the Leisure Grant, so it can be published with the meeting notice in the March BANAR. Guidelines agreed: no increases except for specials, keep total within grant.

New Business:

Hedy Burton reviewed the rink situation. The GRCB is now maintaining, via Darryl, all 5 outdoor rinks instead of the City. The BCA agreed to continue funding the monitors, and this will now be via Sheila Powell instead of Eldon. Sheila will also continue to schedule their time, and she could use more volunteers. The Orient Park puddle rink now has lights and benches.

Hedy reviewed the plans for curling on the pool, and requested \$200 start-up grant to purchase equipment. She confirmed that insurance is OK, and that the rink monitor will supervise.

MOTION: Ken moved, Marg seconded: That the BCA allocated up to \$200 to acquire equipment to facilitate the new curling program in the Hamlet. Passed.

It was noted that both the equipment, and the rink monitors' remuneration, are related to recreation programs and could thus come out of the Leisure Services Grant.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:30pm.

Your Alderman's ReportTELESAT and Commercial Development

During the past four years the City has made great strides in commercial development. The Blair-Queensway area is growing proof. However, I have been perplexed by the continual wish of some to believe that there were deals cut and bonuses given. Hogwash!

TELESAT was looking for a place to establish its headquarters and pressure was being exerted for it to settle in Montreal, among other places, but the Gloucester site was one of the preferred for technical reasons. We are not real estate agents but we acted as a facilitator and we acquired the land to sell to them at the then fair market value. The establishment of TELESAT of course increased the value of the land subsequently.

We erected a portion of the walkway which joins the transitway to the south, including the Pineview community and Sports Canada. Remember, the area south of the Queensway will have 7 major commercial buildings. Speaking of Sports Canada, until the TELESAT project became a reality that parcel was land-locked and the TELESAT project, with the construction of a street into the area, opened it. The costs of the sewers and related services are borne by the developers as in any development.

TELESAT is the type of operation that we should be proud to have in Gloucester. It is a good corporate citizen and in 1989 it paid taxes as anyone else would and in the amount of \$523,000 and likely close to \$600,000 in 1990. Across the highway Gloucester Centre had a tax bill of \$920,000. The Glenview Corporation is paying substantial taxes and this is growing as the development grows. Gloucester gets 25% and the other taxing bodies like the Region share. There will be more development on both sides, at least another 9 major buildings in the immediate area and the redevelopment of Shopper's City is expected to add further buildings.

We have nothing of which we should be ashamed, but much of which we should be proud. I know that in the past a new strip mall was the height of commercial success. I think you will agree that we have enough of these.

We are slowly shaking our old image and attracting modern commerce thanks to efforts by people like Len Romanica, our Director of Economic Development and by a Council that has been prepared to act.

Christmas Food Baskets:

I would like to also take this opportunity to thank all those residents who contributed to the Christmas Food Baskets given to families in the Hamlet through the help of the Blackburn IGA, Blackburn Community Association and the Gloucester Resource Centre. Every year the need for such donations grows and more and more families benefit because of it. Once again, thank you all for your help.

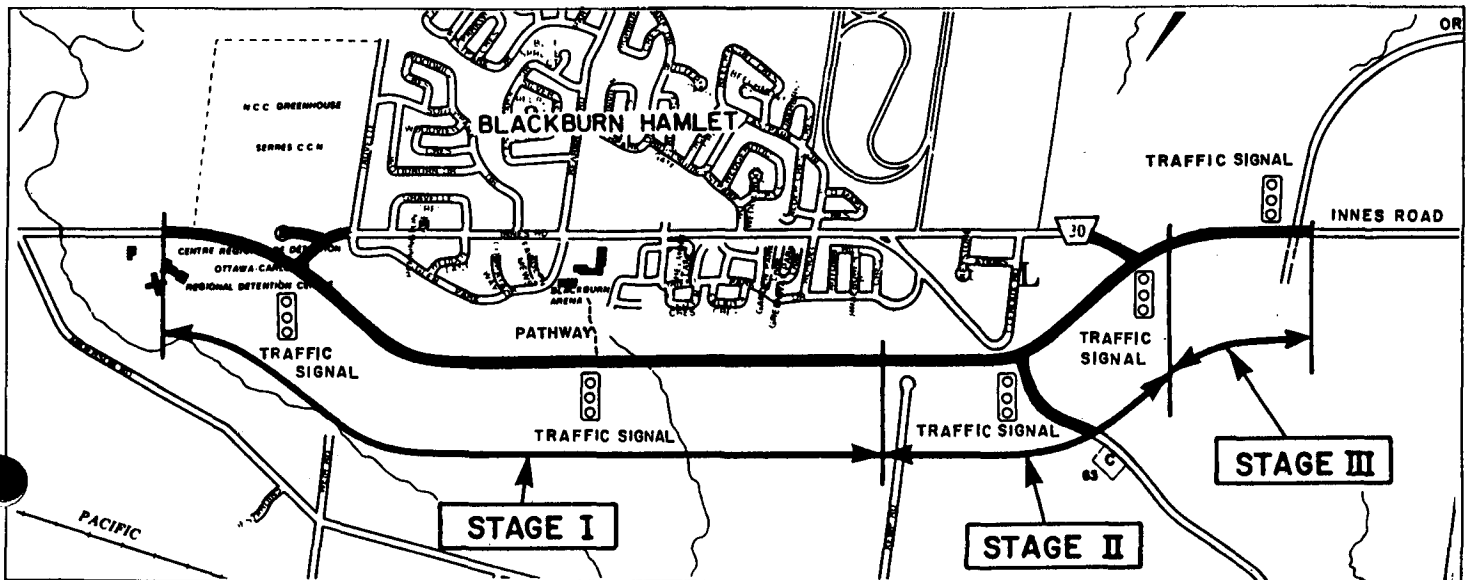

Building Roadways Into The 90's

The Region's Transportation Department is responsible for ensuring that Ottawa-Carleton has an efficient road network which offers convenient access to employment centres, housing and other facilities throughout the Region. The Blackburn Hamlet By-Pass is one of the major roads currently being constructed to respond to the population growth in the East.



Blackburn Hamlet By-Pass

Since the mid-1970's, when the Regional Official Plan was first introduced, the need was recognized for a southern by-pass of the Blackburn Hamlet community to relieve the traffic congestion on Innes Road. The rapid population growth east of Blackburn Hamlet in the East Urban Community (in Gloucester and Cumberland) has confirmed the need for the Blackburn Hamlet By-Pass.

The new By-Pass will run from the Regional Detention Centre to Innes Road, approximately 1/2 kilometre west of Orleans Boulevard. It will have two eastbound and two westbound lanes, separated by a wide median, without curbs. There will be an eastern and western connection to Blackburn Hamlet from the By-Pass. These intersections, plus the intersection of Navan Road and the By-Pass will have traffic signals. A signalized pedestrian crossing south of the Blackburn Arena will also be installed.

Widening of Innes Road provided initial congestion relief

As a first step to relieve the traffic congestion, the Region reconstructed Innes Road between Blair Road and the Detention Centre to a six-lane roadway. This project which was completed in November of 1989, took two years to construct and included replacement of the existing two bridges across Green's Creek and Mud Creek as well as construction of the new road.

Phase 1 and 2 of By-Pass to be completed by the end of 1990

At the beginning of the summer of 1989, construction started for Phase 1 of the By-pass, from the Regional Detention Centre to Kemp Road. This involved clearing a corridor and constructing a rock road base along this section. Earth berms to protect against noise and visual intrusion were also installed. The rock base for the road has been left to settle over the winter.

Construction on Phase 2 (Kemp Road to Innes Road East of Blackburn Hamlet) and the completion of paving Phase 1 will start, weather permitting, in the spring. It is expected that the road will be open to regular traffic by the end of the 1990 construction season.

Construction of Phase 3 to start in 1990

The design of Phase 3, which includes Innes Road, from Orleans Boulevard to the eastern end of the By-Pass, is now being reviewed by the Region in light of Minto Construction's proposed residential subdivision (Chapel Hill South), South of Innes Road. A public hearing will be held on this phase of the project on February 28, 1990. It is expected that construction will begin in 1990, with completion in 1991.

By late summer 1991, it is anticipated that the complete Blackburn Hamlet By-Pass Project, phases 1, 2 and 3, will be in service.

Dear Mrs. Stimpson:

I am writing in response to Alderman Ed Campbell's report which appeared in the February issue of the BANAR. Mr. Campbell states that «provincial support has been dropping steadily for many years in municipal and education fields».

Last November, Sean Conway, the Minister of Education, announced that the Government's operating grants to school boards for 1990-91 would increase by \$363 million, or 8.7% over the 1989-90 allocation, bringing the total to more than \$4.5 billion.

This overall increase also provided additional funding in support of the basic per pupil grant in order to assist school boards with enrolment growth and other costs.

What must not be forgotten is that the level of grant will vary from school board to school board depending on the individual school board's enrolment and local wealth. A school board's grant will, therefore, increase or decrease according to the changes in these two important variables. Locally, school boards have received their fair share according to these two variables.

Let us not forget that, since assuming office in 1985, operating grants to school boards have increased by \$1.3 billion, 41% over and above what was there in 1985, and capital grants have increased by \$258 million or 350%.

Regarding transfer payments to municipalities, the government's contribution this year will total approximately \$4.9 billion, an increase of 8.2%. Of this amount,

\$914 million will be paid to municipalities in the form of unconditional grants, that is grants to be spent by municipalities according to their own needs and priorities. This represents an increase of \$42 million, or 4.8% over the previous year.

A number of changes have been made to the Program for 1990 as part of a reform to bring the Program up to date, so that it will be more equitable in meeting today's municipal needs. These changes have been made in consultation with the Advisory Committee to the Minister of Municipal Affairs on provincial-municipal financing matters. The Committee, which includes representatives from the municipal sector, has reviewed several components of the Program to date, and will continue its review with the goal of recommending further reforms.

The changes will result in some redistribution of the Program's funds. As an example, changes to the Resource Equalization component of the Program ensure that only those municipalities whose assessment base is below the provincial average will receive funds under this component.

The changes made to the Program for 1990 are the first step in the process of meeting those changing needs and making the overall system of grants to municipalities fairer and more equitable.

I hope that the above information helps to clarify the Government's position towards education and municipal government.

ARTICLE 5. COPING

Deborah, a local resident, cares for her husband, Charles, who is afflicted with Alzheimer Disease. For Deborah, the caring part is easy for she has loved and cared about Charles since first they met, some 42 years ago. The hard part is coping with the disease symptoms and changes these have imposed upon their life together.

Deborah and so many others in Ottawa-Carleton and, indeed, across North America, face the very special challenge of dealing with lives that have been touched by Alzheimer Disease. They have found they can make a very special difference in this very special challenge, but it is one that is hard fought and, often, from the very depths of their being.

Hope comes from within - the same place, perhaps, where love originates. And it is hope and love that make caring possible. But coping with caring has its price and help must be offered from real sources elsewhere when the going becomes more difficult and demanding, which it does.

Alzheimer Disease affects the lives of everyone involved. When the shock of its onset wears off, there are periods of guilt, grief, frustration, utter sadness and tremendous fear of what lies ahead. One needs help right from the beginning stages to learn about the disease, legal implications, where to go for help, who to talk to and, sometimes, who to cry with. Such help is available through various community and Home Care services. If you find yourself in need of this information, call the Alzheimer Society of Ottawa-Carleton at 722-1424 where knowledgeable and caring individuals will point you in the right direction within the Society and the community.

Caring and coping is difficult but there is help available. You are not alone.

A Fire Station for the Hamlet

As Bob Jamieson has mentioned already in this Banar, he and I met with a consultant who was conducting an environmental assessment of an area of land at the east end of the Hamlet. The assessment was for the NCC, who own the land, and for the City of Gloucester. The City wants to build a new fire station and fire training facility in the area. The building design was not completed but it looked about the same size as the station at Blair and Innes with the addition of a fire training tower. This would likely be similar to Ottawa's facility located on Industrial just west of St.Laurent. The site will be buffered from the community by a minimum of 100 feet of existing trees and the buildings themselves were at the east side of the lot.



Expansion in the Quarry

Many of you may have noticed the new building in the Quarry. This is an office building for Permanent Concrete (Lafarge Canada). They have now made application for a second building of about 700 square feet. This building is for storage and according to the plan I doubt that it will be visible from the road.

Navan Road Low Rise Apartments

Iberica developments has requested approval of a zoning change for property along the west side of Navan road. The approximate street numbers would be 2464 to 2470. They want to increase the density from a maximum of 80 units per hectare to a maximum of 104 units per hectare.

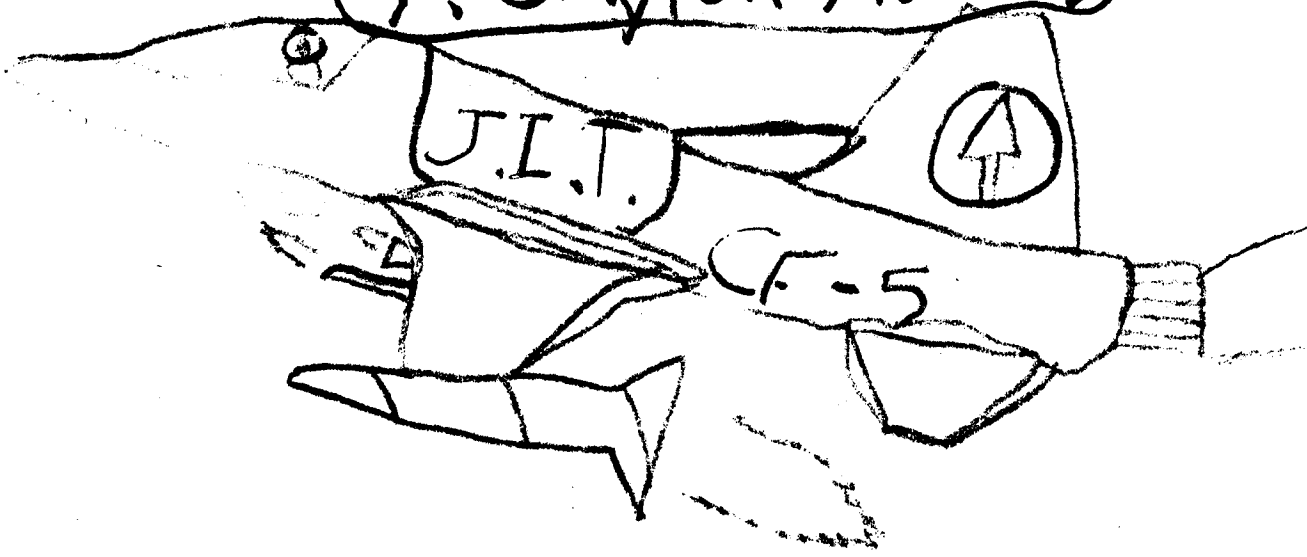

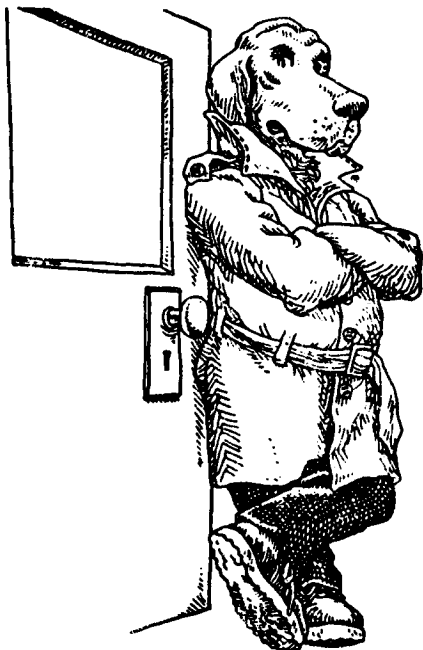

THINK ABOUT IT NOW, BEFORE YOU LEAVE !

IF YOU ARE GOING AWAY

- Leave the following with a trusted friend or neighbour:
 - Where you are going, timetable and route.
 - How you can be reached, in case of emergency.
 - When you expect to return.
 - If anybody will be at your home (maid service, repairman).
 - Leave a key with your neighbour, to do a regular house inspection. This could be an insurance requirement.
 - Leave the make, colour, licence plate number of your vehicle with immediate family or a neighbour.
- Cut off mail and newspaper delivery, or have a neighbour collect them.
- If valuables can be seen through a window, move them out of sight.
- Arrange for somebody to clear the walk or driveway.
- Adjust the drapes and blinds to make the house appear occupied.
- If possible, have a neighbour park a car in the driveway.
- Place two lights on timers. Place a radio on a timer. A radio playing will discourage a burglar. Due to the possibility of fire hazard, do not leave a T.V. on in an unattended house.
- Place expensive items in a safety deposit box or other secure place.
- Turn your telephone bell down to its lowest setting or unplug it, if possible.
- Never leave a note on your door telling friends when you will return.

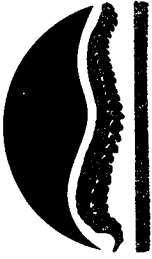

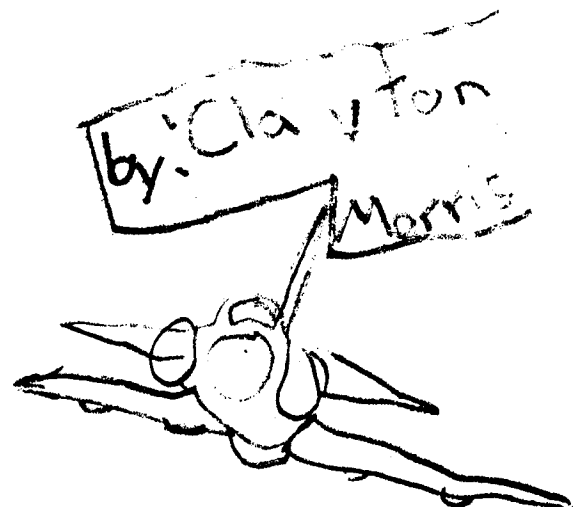

EUROPE 1990

Europe in 1990. Why not? As well as the traditional attractions that are many and varied, you could experience at first hand some most dramatic and historical events. or airport transfers. The key is to book early to attain the best value in flights and tours. CANADIAN HOLIDAYS offers a 5% discount if the tour is booked and paid in full 6 months prior to the start of selected Trafalgar tours.

Coach tours are available in all sorts of combinations from one country in 3-5 days or a dozen countries in a few weeks. Really, there is a tour for every taste and budget. If you are young (18-35) or you have children of that age, there are exclusive tours for this age group. These tours are popular with young adults from around the world and you are practically guaranteed of meeting some interesting Aussies or Kiwis. These new friendships usually result in exchange visits in future years.

TRAVEL TIME

For more independent travellers, there are a couple of options for travel once you are in Europe. With the purchase of 2 adult round trip tickets to Amsterdam, a one week FREE car rental is included. Until June 14 and then from September 16-December 31, a free car for a week is available in Frankfurt, Munich or Copenhagen.

For more extended vacations, leasing a Renault car is of great value. In fact, you are buying the car and sign a promissory note for the balance that is voided when you return the car. This plan is available from Paris or Amsterdam. As an added bonus, this method of renting a car is tax-free.

The train is another way to travel at great value in both Europe

and Britain. Unlike in Canada, train travel in Europe is highly developed and valued. Especially for tourists are Rail passes, that allow for unlimited train travel for a certain period. For instance, an adult pass for 15 days is \$408.00 or a youth pass (under 26) for 2 months is \$600.00. For three or more people travelling together, the pass is \$288.00 for 15 days.

KLM (the Dutch airline) has Eurail passes for sale at discounted prices for those passengers flying KLM transatlantic. As this airline has a very good reputation for service and performance, it is a good choice for your flight to Europe. Service from Ottawa is direct (with a stop in Halifax) twice a week.

Another method of seeing Europe is by cruise ship. Itineraries in both the Mediterranean and Baltic Seas are possible. This year another cruise line, Royal Caribbean, is sailing these waters offering a pleasant and good value holiday where the bonus is that you only have to unpack once.

AIR CANADA travel tip: For the first time, Air Canada is offering direct flights from Ottawa to London, Heathrow beginning June 16th. Call our office for details and prices.
