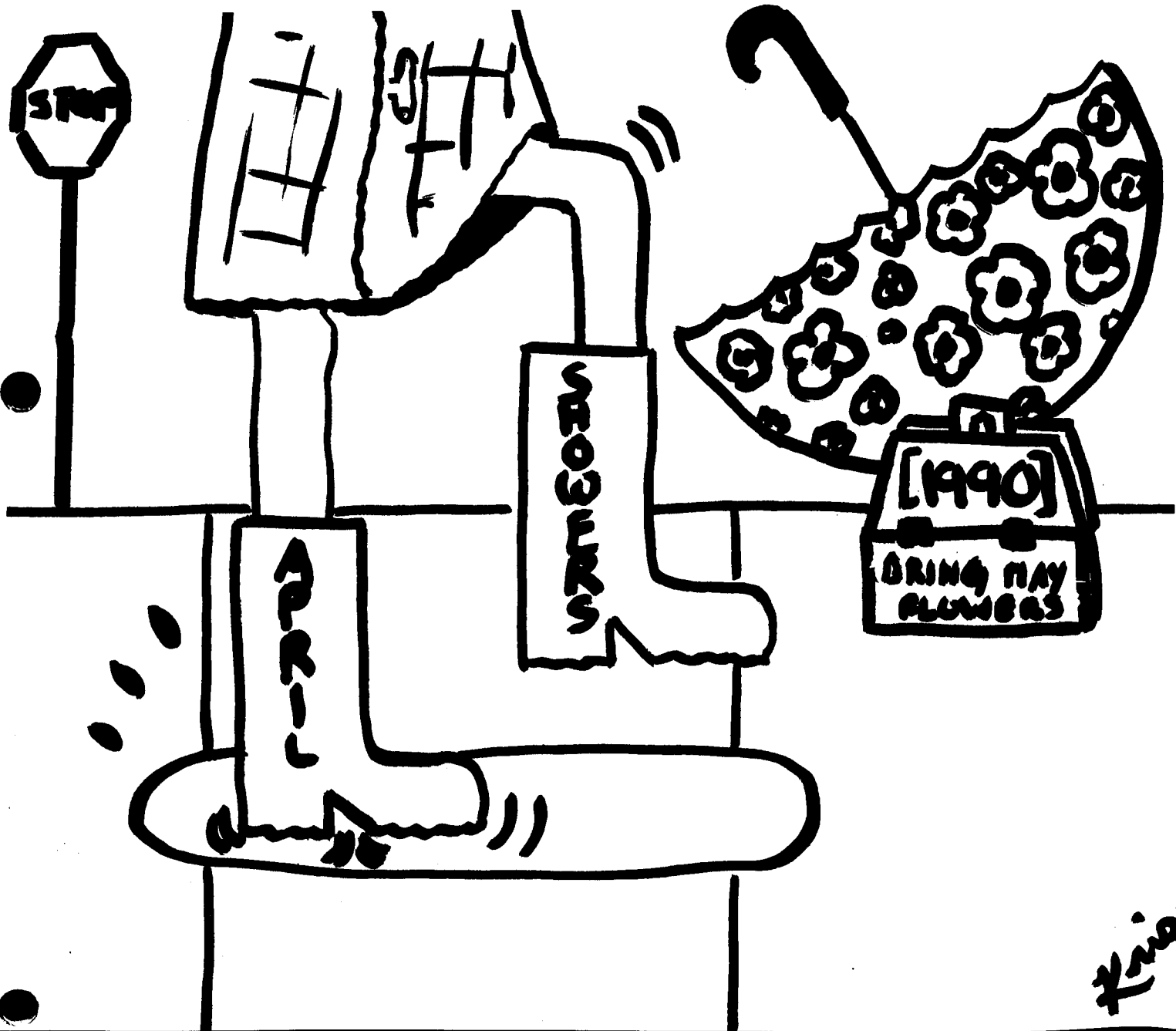

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MINUTES - Feb 15th,1990.**

**Directors Present:** Lee Coutu, Joan Grier, Bob Jamieson, Steve Palmer,

Bob introduced the new BANAR editor, Colleen Stimpson, and the new FunFair co-chairmen, Lee Coutu and Daphne Poulin. They were all welcomed by the Board.

**Correspondence:**

- Letter of thanks from Alderman Campbell for the Christmas basket donation from the BCA
- Recent GRCB minutes; 1990 City copying allotment
- Outline of the proposed organic farm project targetted just outside Blackburn(see below).

**Directors Reports:**

Civic Affairs: Steve has provided a note and map of the proposed new Fire station for publication in the March BANAR. Some rezoning is also being proposed for Navan road.

The recommendation has been issued for a complete review of the whole Wasteplan process in the Region, with a focus on extension of the existing Trail Road dump site. Steve will be attending the Regional "Greenprint" session planned for next weekend.

Publicity: A discussion was held on potential candidates for the volunteer awards. Joan will follow-up.

Membership: Ken noted that everything was lined up for a follow-up canvass of the missed streets at the beginning of March.

President: Bob expressed his personal appreciation to Lee, Daphne, and Colleen for volunteering for activities that are at the heart of Blackburn. He wished them all the best in the coming months.

On a less optimistic note, Bob remarked that he had been disappointed to receive only one phone call in response to his BANAR notice soliciting interest in Senior Adult participation in the community. The note will be re-inserted into the next BANAR. Bob distributed a package of budget information that was put together after a director's review meeting. These will be used at the March budget meeting, and includes the recommended Leisure Grant Distribution and Public Meeting Notice for the March BANAR. Although included in the list, Diving and Football have not yet submitted requests- these must be received before the meeting..

Bob noted that he will be attending a special GRCB/ Rec Assoc joint meeting on Feb 22 to review various activities, and Leisure Grant policy.

Fun Fair: Lee and Daphne provided a quick review of the status. They have already had one meeting, and many of last year's volunteers are returning. All of the director's positions should be filled within the week. They are planning basically the same format as last year, with Saturday, June 2nd as the date. In order to get started, FunFair requested its regular start-up grant.

**MOTION:** Steve moved, Joan seconded, that \$5000 be advanced to Fun Fair as requested.

**New Business:**

- Colleen reviewed the status of the BANAR, and stated that everything was looking good, except for some minor problems with the distribution of the Feb issue. She also tabled a proposal for a new cover format for the Board's comments.
- Bob then introduced Jill Finlayson, and asked her to review for the Board the ideas and proposal for the Partner's Farm as detailed in her information package.

**PARTNER'S FARM:** Jill explained that her goal was to transform the old McNeely farm, on 100-200 acres of NCC land just SouthEast of Blackburn, into a model organic/natural farm. This would serve both as a model to educate local farmers on the benefits of natural farming, and also as a community resource for recreational and educational activities (tours, tea room, lab, school courses,...). It would take about 2-3 years to really get going.

Jill highlighted the backgrounds of the 8 individuals who have formed the PARTNER'S FARM group, and noted that she had received strong support from various government depts, local and national farming groups, and recently the CBE. The NCC has also voiced very strong support of the concept. Jill requested that the BCA take on a sponsorship role, given its leading position in the community.

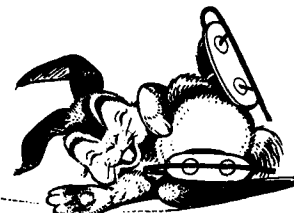
Jill passed out a copy of a draft Business Plan for the project, and noted that in addition they would be in line for significant federal grants, but only if matched to other funds. She also explained that many of the figures were rough estimates, such as the funding proposed to come from the BCA. The immediate problem area is acquiring the funds to lease the land from the NCC: Unless this is done in the next week or so, the NCC will proceed to lease it to a commercial grower and the project will be set back. Jill finished by thanking the Board for its time, and hoped that the request would be favourably considered.

After some discussion, Bob responded that the Board was very impressed with the concept proposed, and agreed that it would be a valuable addition to the Hamlet. A letter of support will be sent from the BCA, and the Board will also consider the extent of financial support it can offer (although this could at most be only a fraction of the level estimated in their business plan). Bob thanked Jill for taking the time to come out and talk to the Board.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:45.

**YOUR ALDERMAN'S REPORT**

**The Continuing Saga of Provincial Funding:**

In a recent edition of the BANAR I discussed the Gloucester Budget and made some reference to the Region and School Boards; I noted that there was a decline in provincial participation in education and municipal funding over the years. It was a comment without any editorializing, although Mr. Morin has found it necessary to set the record straight. However, I cannot ignore his comments since they may leave a wrong impression, particularly as to funding received locally.

Governments can increase grants and still have declining participation, when the costs of operation are increasing. This I experienced over the years when I was on the School Board. Mr. Morin says that unconditional municipal grants increased by 4.8%. While someone out there may have received something extra, Gloucester did not. The 4.8% would at best be an inflationary increase. **Our overall grant package remains at the 1988 level.** It is particularly hard for growth municipalities when grants are frozen.

There is a growing unrest in the municipalities of Ontario because local councils are being forced into the position of raising funds to offset provincial policy objectives, instead of meeting local needs.

The province while giving an increase to some, passed on to us all an employer health levy, as well as new costs for access to information, courthouse security, etc. We provided the security and fire for the Detention Centre in 1989, receiving \$11,200.00. Our costs relative to that Centre are at the \$114,000.00 level. If we received proper grants-in-lieu of taxes we would get \$125,000.00. In striking the Regional budget, similar problems were encountered.

Changes in educational funding have been a problem for school boards over the years. The present government has put a lot of money into it, but the abundance is not coming to this area. The Carleton Board of Education's student population will increase by 1500 in 1990, yet its grants will decrease by \$3,500,000, which follows on a similar erosion in 1988 and 1989 totalling \$14,000,000. A zero increase in costs would still result in a 10% increase in taxes.

Educational funding is complex, due to formulae that are used to calculate grants. Increases can be announced in the grants based on pupil costs, but changes in the factors, and other shifts, can impact greatly. An example was special education grants, which had been funded at 100%, but in 1989 were folded into the base and funded similarly to other education costs, thus ending with a significant shifting of costs to the local taxpayer. Both the Carleton Board of Education and the Carleton Roman Catholic Separate School Board are facing double-digit increases in 1990. It becomes difficult to satisfy local needs in the present circumstances.

I appreciate that all levels of government are experiencing problems and that shifts of costs are occurring. I had not wanted to enter into this debate, because the Provincial Government has done a great deal of good, but it must be stated that we in Gloucester, as well as many other municipalities, face severe problems when grants are frozen and shifting occurs.

This letter is in response to the open letter from Gilles Morin M.P.P. published in the March issue of the Banar.

In his letter, Mr. Morin asserted that Carleton Board of Education has received its fair share of provincial educational grants; and he denied that the Province has reduced its support for public education in Ontario.


If we are to believe Mr. Morin., then our Trustees have been deceiving us when they say it is difficult to maintain programs like Junior Kindergarten and impossible to start new initiatives or improve current programs. They say they don't have enough Provincial funds and ratepayers will have to make up the difference. The Province, through a smokescreen of confusing figures representing overall averages, percentages, transfer payments, and resource equalizations; says it is distributing its funds fairly and generously.

Does Mr. Morin really think parents and taxpayers find it easier to accept the current situation if we pay higher taxes to the Municipality rather than the Province? Does he think it makes a difference which tax collector gets our cheque?? Either way we pay more and seem to get less.

What we care about, Mr. Morin, is that Blackburn Public doesn't have a gym, that children in Chapel Hill are doing gym in their hallways; that kids are taking months to get into underfunded special education programs; that there are almost no field trips for our children despite living in a Nation's Capital with several wonderful National Museums; that we have to count every Xerox we make; that our Senior French Immersion Kindergarten teachers are dealing with excessive class sizes; etc etc etc ad nauseum.

I'm sick to death of politicians playing politics with the education of my children. I would like to see a full and open budget process at the Carleton Board, complete with Town Hall meetings like the Ottawa Board enjoys....and a commitment by the Province to provide a quality education for our children.

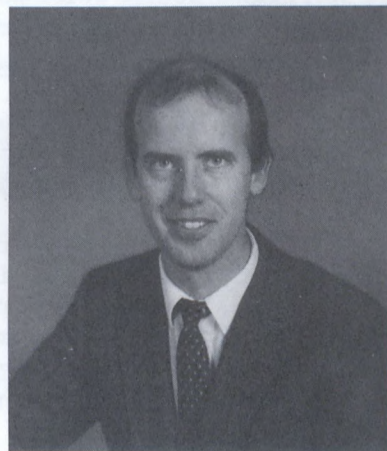

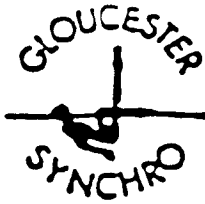

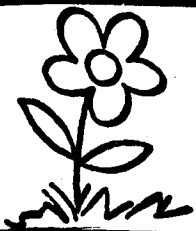
## GLOUCESTER SYNCHRONIZED SWIMMING CLUB

## NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH



Basement windows usually offer little resistance to forced entry and are a favorite target for burglars. One popular method of securing them is by the use of 25 mm round bars not more than 180 mm apart to prevent a small person or child from entering. Similar items are available commercially. Other types of bar grills are also available. Make sure at least one such device is installed so that it can be easily removed from the inside in event of a fire.



Some locks that come installed on garage doors are easily destroyed or jimmied. For roll-up or tilt-up doors, a padlock or bolt installed on each track 6 mm (1/4 in) above a roller will prevent the door from opening even if the lock is jimmied. A padlock installed on the end of the locking bar is another way of ensuring the door can not be opened from the outside. Keep the garage door closed at all times. If a burglar gains entry, he can drive in, get into your house unseen, load your goods and drive away.
