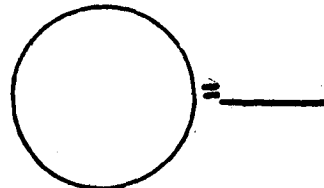
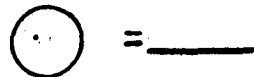
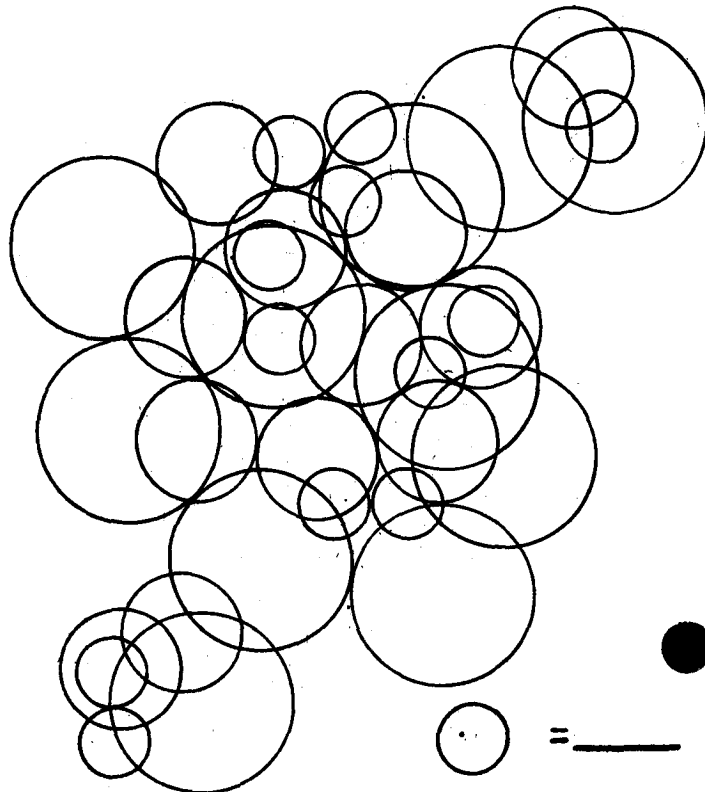

ANNUAL BUDGET MEETING MINUTES - Mar 21st,1991.**

Directors Present: Jim Campbell, Marg Callaghan, Joan Grier, Warren Hanstead, Bob Jamieson, Steve Palmer, Colleen Stimpson.

Guests: 10 residents
Marjorie Milloy - Gloucester Recreation Dept.

Bob Jamieson welcomed the guests to the Annual BCA Budget meeting, introduced the members of the BCA executive, and reviewed the agenda for the evening.

1990 Financial Statement (see table 1)

Warren Hanstead reviewed the details of the audited '90 financial statement. In all aspects 1990 was a very good year, with the assets showing a significant increase as a result of the \$13,000 surplus for the year. Note was made of the continuing good management of the Day Camp, the efficiencies in the BANAR operation, and of the significant increase in Membership revenues over 1989. Ken Zomer was commended as this was a key objective in last year's budget. Even without the BMHA surplus (see below), 1990 was an excellent year for the BCA.

Motion: That the 1990 Financial statement be accepted as tabled. Moved: Harvey Wittenburg, seconded Colleen Stimpson. Carried.

1991 BCA Budget (see table 2)

Warren then presented the proposed '91 budget, noting that an error was present in the baseball figures and would be corrected. The highlights include the fact that BMHA has decided to perform their own bookkeeping, and so the related amounts (after April '91) have been removed, including \$5600 resulting from their 1990 surplus. Warren noted that other changes will also come as a result of the proposed spin off of the adult sport groups, so as to remove any GST liability from the BCA. In addition interest revenues will be down. The result is that a breakeven year (after BMHA) is projected for 1991.

Motion: That the 1991 BCA Budget be accepted as tabled, with the noted correction. Moved: Warren Hanstead, seconded Steve Palmer. Carried.
Bob thanked Warren on behalf of the BCA and the community for his continuing judicious management of our finances, and the excellent results for the past year.

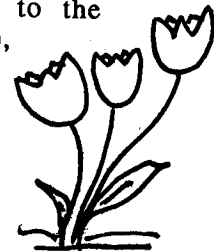
Leisure Services Grant Allocation

Bob Jamieson reviewed this area, starting with the general guidelines used by the executive in formulating its grant distribution recommendations:

- Distribute the full amount of the City grant each year directly to the needs of organized user groups in the community.
- Majority of funds to youth, plus consideration for seniors and special needs
- Base the distribution on the number of participants in each group who live in the Blackburn area. Additional funds for 'unique' events.
- Avoid drastic year over year changes, except where participation warrants, while trending the Arena sports to an overall lower level.
- Maintain consistency in per capita grant levels in similar leisure areas

Highlights of '90 distribution : 24 groups benefited, plus rink supervision. Increase of 3 over '89. As decided last year, the funds distributed essentially matched the grant level.

Highlights of '91 recommendations: Requests from 26 groups, including 3 new ones, for a total of \$62,000. This is 10% more than requested in '90, although the participation numbers are the same. The City grant has increased slightly due to the new construction in the Hamlet (offsetting the City-wide per capita decrease), however is still far less than the totals requested.



Bob then explained the differences from the recommendations originally published (late applications), and answered questions related to specific allocations for Ringette, and Senior games. After some discussion, it was also agreed to return the Scouts allocation to the 1990 level, and to allocate \$500 to the Gloucester Handicapped Assoc.

Motion: That the 1991 Leisure Grant distribution be accepted as tabled, with the noted changes. Moved: Warren Hanstead, seconded Chuck Taylor. Carried.

Note: Bob reported that he has been officially informed that the new Leisure Services Delivery proposal has been shelved, and that the GRCB will be working with the community on a new approach over the next 12-18 months. As a result Bob doesn't expect any changes in the system before the '93 Grant year.

Extraordinary Grant Requests

Bob then proceeded to review two requests to the BCA for funds which the executive has decided do not fall within the scope of the Leisure grant. Although this type of request is not normally considered, both requests are considered valid and the bonus situation in 1990 finances gives us some leeway.

Gloucester Historical Society: This request is for a one-time donation to assist this group in renovating their new Gloucester Museum, at the old city hall in Leitrim. Given the valuable contribution to the city a grant of \$1000 was recommended. After some discussion this was agreed by all.

Motion: That, given the positive financial results in 1990, the BCA approve a one-time donation of \$1000 to the Gloucester Historical Society for the purpose of renovating of the new Gloucester Museum. Moved: Warren Hanstead, seconded Fred Gooch. Carried.

Partner's Farm: The objective of this group is to establish an organic farm and demonstration facility in close proximity to the city. The background of this group was reviewed, including their unsuccessful attempt to obtain the old NCC farm southeast of Blackburn last year. They have reapplied to the BCA as they are now actively looking at land between Hwy 17 and the river. Although the BCA executive does not feel confident that we should donate funds at this point in time, it is looking for authority from the community to allocate funds to this group if appropriate over the next year (to avoid having to call a special general meeting). Much discussion ensued: focusing on the need to be cautious, to ensure that the Blackburn community gets value for any funds assigned, and that a specific location and business plan will be required. The general consensus was that we should support the initiative.

Motion: That the BCA executive, upon its decision that the conditions are suitable and of benefit to the community, be authorized to donate up to \$500 to the establishment of a Partner's Farm. Moved: Chuck Taylor, seconded. Carried.

At this point Harvey Wittenburg, on behalf of the BMHA, expressed his sincere appreciation for the work that the BCA, and Warren, had performed over 20 years in administering their accounts. Warren thanked the BMHA, and expressed the BCA's desire to work together to ensure a smooth transition for hockey.

Bob Jamieson then thanked all present for their interest and for taking the time to participate.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:15.

Your Alderman's Report

Gloucester Services

Recently, in The Banar, I addressed some of the problems of the library system in Gloucester as well as noting the need for increased support by Council. We are well behind Nepean in that area, largely due to the fact that its Council placed a higher priority on library services and took the means to fund it.

The Gloucester libraries are not automated, but we have had a professional study of the problem and recommendations have been made and are starting to be implemented. Council put some monies into the capital budget for a start-up in 1991.

Council had identified economic development, corporate organization and public security as planning priorities. A strategic plan will be created, but also recognizing the plans created by the Arts Board, the Library Board, and the Police Commission.


Gloucester has considerable potential for economic development, particularly around Blair Road and the Queensway, but also in the east and the south. The key to improved services will ultimately be a better economic base.

While public security and the hard services such as sewers and roads are essential, the softer services such as our libraries, our arts and culture, and our social services are extremely important. Cities are not just roads, sewers and garbage collection.

There is an attempt being made to identify the need and type of facility for cultural activity. There is not a decent facility for performing arts in the eastern area. Nepean was able to build Centrepointe, but we are still far short of that.

These things will come, and I hope that during the nineties we will see the fulfillment of the library strategic plan, the building of a good cultural facility and, hopefully, a centre for community and social resources.

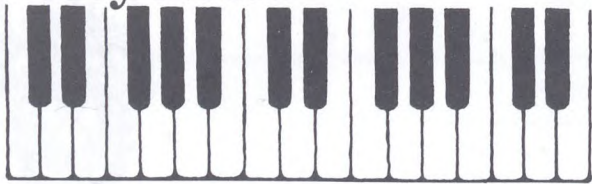

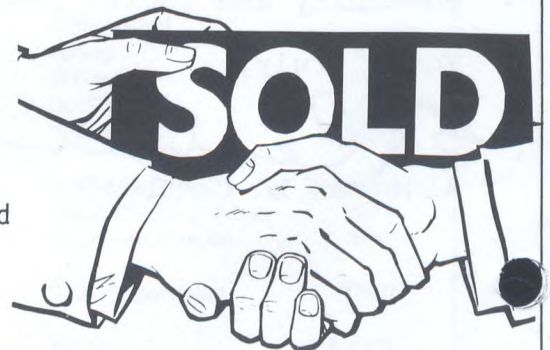

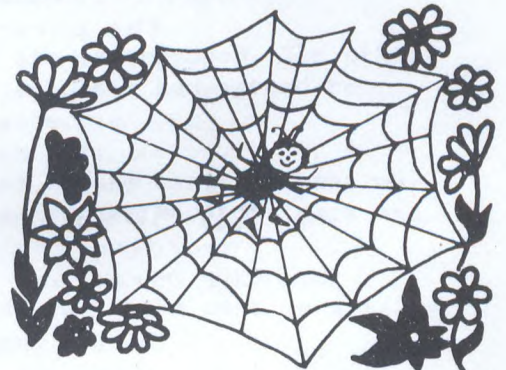

QUARRY - CELLULAR TOWER

As mentioned in the last Banar, we met with representatives of Bell Cellular to discuss their proposal to install a 200 foot tall free standing tower in the Francon Quarry.

Bell Cellular discussed the service problems they are having both north and south of the Hamlet. Cellular telephone requires antenna sites, called cells, at regular intervals. Several sites had been investigated by the company and were either not suitable or access was refused. It was the company's opinion that the quarry site was both the best site and the last site available to them. There was also a brief presentation from the Gloucester Police of how they use cellular service. The Police use them to avoid radio scanners and if the service is not available throughout the policing region it can cause problems.

Bell Cellular asked if we would support their application for the Tower site. This was a requirement imposed on them by Francon. The short answer is no, we will not support the site and both Francon and Bell Cellular will be notified by letter.

There were several reasons for our decision.

- 1- Visual pollution caused by the tower
- 2- Increased industrialisation of the quarry site. This is gradually turning the site into a heavy industrial area. I am very concerned about this as I believe that once the site is considered to be a heavy industry area we could have the Region push a number of unpleasant neighbours on us including an incinerator.
- 3- The potential for more towers or larger antennas once one is approved. The other cellular phone company would likely want access to the site. Bell had agreed to include them on their tower if they wanted to be on the site.
- 4- We also suggested that there were alternatives. Instead of one large antenna we suggested that they consider smaller antennas, one in the Canotek business park and the other somewhere South or West of the Hamlet.

Bell Cellular was not pleased with our lack of support but they have sent us a letter saying they are considering alternate sites.

Until recently we would not of had the opportunity to comment on this type of project. The quarry and the company would have made their own decision independent of the community. I feel that this is a result of the improved communications we have with the quarry management and their increased awareness of the community's concerns regarding their operations. I hope this trend will continue.

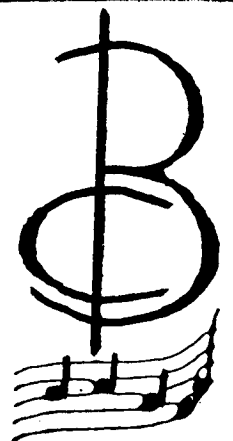

GLOUCESTER BLOCK PARENTS



WHY IS A BLOCK PARENT PROGRAM NEEDED?

To provide the community with an organized method of protecting its children and to aid in prompt reporting of emergency problems to the agency concerned, i.e., Police, Fire Dept, etc.

WHEN IS THE BLOCK PARENT SIGN DISPLAYED?

A BLOCK PARENT does not have to be home and available 24 hours a day. When unavailable, the sign is simply removed from the window. Absence of the sign does NOT mean the house is unattended.

WHAT IS THE BLOCK PARENT SIGN?

The official symbol of the BLOCK PARENT Home and the Program itself, which should be displayed in a window visible from the street. An indication to children passing by that this home is open to them for immediate help in an emergency.

WHEN ARE THE CHILDREN TO USE THESE HOMES?

Only in case of emergency - when they are lost, frightened, bullied or followed by a stranger or stray animal. If they need help because of illness or injuries.

HOW WILL THE CHILDREN RECOGNIZE THE SIGN?

The parents, schools and Gloucester Police Safety Program will teach our children how to recognize the sign and when to use it. Children are taught how to recognize the SIGN, not the home. If they see no BLOCK PARENT signs, the children are to run to the nearest door but not to go inside.

WHAT IS A BLOCK PARENT?

Any responsible adult who cares about the well-being of children and other persons to volunteer their home as a safe refuge when the need arises. A BLOCK PARENT has no legal status except as a private citizen volunteering to act responsibly in an emergency.

WHAT ARE THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE BLOCK PARENT?

To offer your home as a place of safety from dangerous or frightening situations
To offer assistance to people in distress and telephone the appropriate emergency service.

To assist the police by reporting suspicious or criminal activity in the community.

WHAT IS NOT EXPECTED OF A BLOCK PARENT?

To provide food and beverage, toilet facilities, transportation, or administer first aid. To leave his or her home and break up a fight. To actively engage any dangerous person.

HOW IS A BLOCK PARENT SELECTED?

Everyone over the age of 18 in a prospective BLOCK PARENT home will be screened by the Gloucester Police Dept.

HOW DOES ONE APPLY TO BECOME A BLOCK PARENT?
