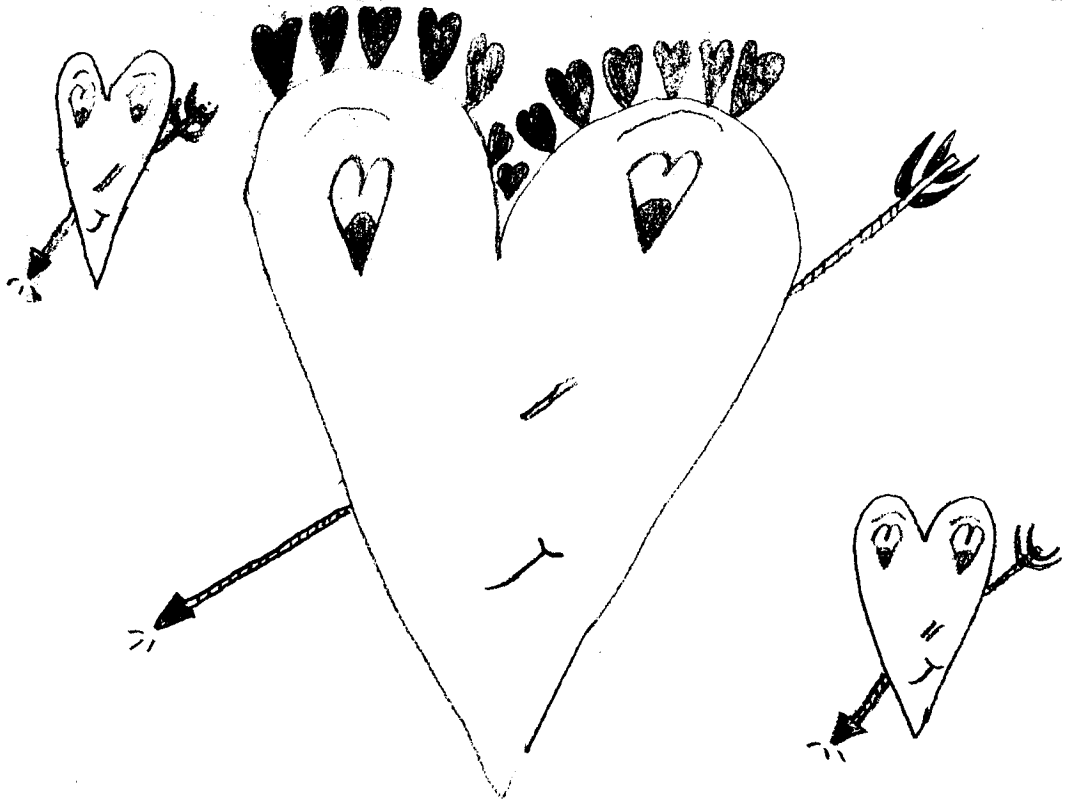

FROM THE PRESIDENT

In this my first message of the New Year I'd like to talk about what the BCA does.

The BCA is a volunteer organization over 25 years old. In 1980 the BCA was officially incorporated as a non-profit organization in Ontario.

What does the BCA do?

The BCA publishes the BANAR. The BANAR is delivered to all residents of the Hamlet to keep them aware of what is happening locally.

The BCA is also a Recreation Association sponsoring various independent youth, senior and sporting activities.

As a Recreation Association we distribute about \$40,000 in grants from the City of Gloucester to sport and recreation groups in the community. If you have applied for a grant from the BCA please make sure you are at the March meeting when the final grants are approved.

The BCA organizes a two day "Fun Fair", this year in late May. It is a great kick off for the summer and provides a fundraising opportunity for local groups. There is more about this and a call for volunteers in this issue of the BANAR.

The BCA operates a summer children's Day Camp. The Day Camp has a varied and active schedule for the children and provides employment opportunities for more than a dozen young people.

Together with the YM/YWCA the BCA ran a Teen Drop-In centre in 91/92. Unfortunately we've had difficulties in locating a facility for this and haven't been able to continue the program.

The BCA loaned \$15,000 to the Tennis club to help them construct their new facility.

The BCA represents the community at various levels of government on of concern to all residents. An example of this was our successful fight against locating an incinerator near the Hamlet. This year we are monitoring the NCC's plans for the Greenbelt to determine the impact on the Hamlet.

The BCA holds all candidates meetings during elections and other community meetings for topics of broad concern.

The BCA hold regular monthly meetings to discuss the activities of the executive and what's happening in the Hamlet. These meetings are open to everyone, and we make every opportunity for those who come to the meeting to have the time to give their opinions or discuss their concerns.

MINUTES

Steve reviewed the agenda for the evening and the Minutes of the October 15 meeting were approved. A summary of the membership campaign and the Leisure grant distribution were the main topics discussed.

DIRECTORS REPORTS

PRESIDENT: Steve received some telephone calls from residents regarding proposed changes to the OC Transpo bus routes as previously discussed at our September meeting. Steve referred some of them to OC Transpo for more information.

VICE-PRESIDENT: Neil discussed the status of the new Recreation Centre. Neil is identifying the needs of the community and the consultation process is still under way.

PUBLICITY: Mike suggested that copies of the BANAR should be distributed through the Welcome Wagon along with our information flyer on "Why you should join the BCA". An invitation for free membership will also be included.

Steve commented on a request by the non-profit Tenants Association for support of their newsletter called "Friends of Blackburn Hamlet". As part of their mandate are recreational and social activities, Steve suggested we use 1,000 copies of our photocopy allocation from the City for their publication and invite a representative to discuss their programs. This was agreed to.

COMPTE-RENDU

Steve a révisé l'ordre-du-jour de la soirée et le compte-rendu de la réunion précédente a été approuvé. La distribution des bourses et la cotisation des membres de la communauté étaient les sujets pour discussion.

RAPPORTS DES MEMBRES

PRÉSIDENT: Steve a reçu des appels téléphoniques des résidents de la communauté concernant le rapport préliminaire pour les routes de OC Transpo précédemment discuté à la réunion du 17 septembre dernier. Steve dirigea certaines questions à OC Transpo pour de amples informations.

VICE-PRÉSIDENT: Neil a discuté de l'état de la situation du nouveau Centre communautaire. Il est au stade de l'identification des besoins et le processus de consultation est en cours.

PUBLICITÉ: Mike a suggéré que le journal BANAR soit distribué par l'entremise du Welcome Wagon. En plus, une copie du dépliant "Why you should join the BCA" et une invitation pour inscription (sans frais) seront distribués.

Steve a fait des commentaires sur le présent système de publication d'un petit journal intitulé "Friends of Blackburn Hamlet", publié par l'Association des locataires de Gloucester. Leur mandat consiste en des activités sociaux et de loisirs. Steve suggère que l'on utilise 1000 copies de nos allocations de photocopies pour cette publication et que l'on invite un représentant de leur organisme pour discuter du programme. Ceci a été approuvé par le Comité.

BANAR: Colleen is no longer the editor of the BANAR. Our new editor will be Geraldine Tanguay-Foisy effective Jan. 1, 1993.

Colleen also mentioned that the basketball games are going very well. They are being held every Saturday at Glen Ogilvie from 12:30 PM to 2:30 PM, and all children 10 years old and over are welcome to participate, at no cost.

SPORTS: Jim briefly discussed the changes for the 1994 grant distribution. The two criteria would be city wide and arena sports. Rules are to be drawn up as to who goes for city grants and who goes for local grants. Bob questioned the proposal and asked if this year's granting procedure will be affected by these changes. These changes are not expected to affect this year.

Steve briefed Jim concerning a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Tennis Club, the BMHC and the BCA. Jim is to follow-up with Renata.

FUN-FAIR: All cheques have been sent out and distributed to various participating groups.

SUMMER PROGRAMS: A representative from the Gloucester Association for children with Special Needs was invited to discuss the various children programs for next summer. She asked the BCA to consider expanding their programs to include a drop in program similar to that run by other RA's this past summer.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:00 PM.

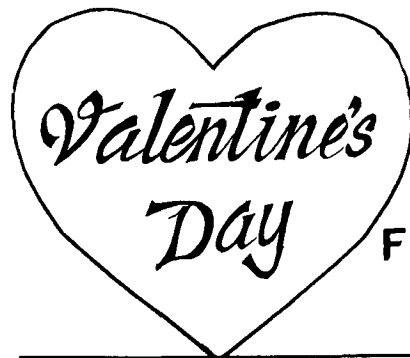

MINUTES

Steve reviewed the agenda for the evening and the Minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

DIRECTORS REPORTS

PRESIDENT: Steve received some telephone calls from residents regarding traffic at the Hornets Nest during the soccer season. Steve questioned the matter and asked whether we should write to the NCC or the RCB to have the parking lot expanded. Jim Campbell is to follow-up.

VICE-PRESIDENT: Neil discussed the status of the new Recreation Centre. Neil met with the City to discuss a survey for the community centre. A meeting is to be held on January 11, with Blackburn groups (Optimist Club) to discuss the needs and the programs to fit in the Community Centre. Neil also mentioned about other developments in the community. The owners of Wallys Restaurant invited Steve to discuss building a new bingo hall. A meeting is to be scheduled for further discussion.

SPORTS: Jim suggested that the BCA allocate an extra \$100 to the RCB for the scheduling and supervision of the rink monitors. This was agreed to.

DAY CAMP: Colleen suggested that we start advertising for Day-Camp councillors and Directors. The interview questions and skill ratings are to be set-up and a new policy guideline is to be established.

Colleen also requested some money to purchase 4 new basketball hoops. She is to obtain pricing.

COMPTE-RENDU

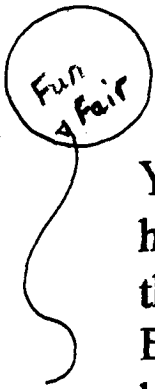

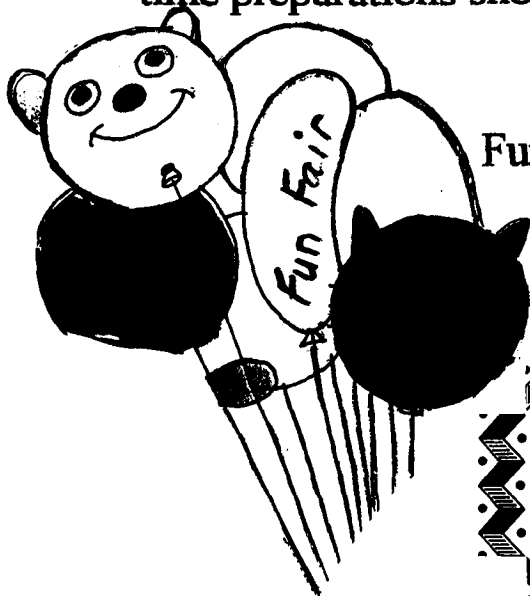
FUN FAIR '93

Your Councillor's Report

N.C.C. Lands

Some time ago there was some publicity concerning the use of N.C.C lands and the prospect that some of the land in our immediate area might be sold. At that time it was apparent that there was the possibility of other uses for lands adjacent to the fire station. It would now appear that there may be consideration given to disposing of lands other than those. The Treasury Board seems to be behind the move which could affect such parcels as the lands near the By-Pass and possibly the Hornets' Nest.

I am told that there will be a public open house during the winter and thus there will be an opportunity to learn more. It is important to take an active interest in this and attend any public meetings. Please keep an eye open for what is happening. We all have a stake in the lands surrounding Blackburn and we want to see the integrity of the Hamlet unimpaired.

Blackburn Library

On October 23, the expanded Blackburn Branch of the Gloucester system was officially opened. It was a pleasure to participate in the ribbon-cutting ceremony. Those of you who have worked hard for the community know that the cutting of the ribbon is the last act following a great deal of effort by a great many people. Many of us have worked to see this happen and we now have a facility that the Hamlet deserves. I want to thank the other members of the Library Board, particularly the Chairman, Hervé Casault for all that has been done. It has been a struggle to modernize the operations. They were far behind, but real progress is being made.

Kirby Report

Many people came to the October meeting at Gloucester High and said that they wanted to keep Gloucester together. The report that Mr. Kirby published pays lip service to this concept but takes significant steps towards one-tier government, suggesting the shifting of much power to the Region. Even if your interest is only in dollars, you are not going to win in such a scenario. You have one more opportunity to express your opinion. Decisions will not be made until after February 26. 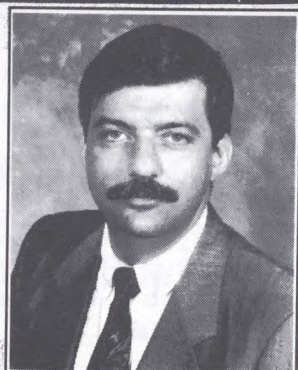
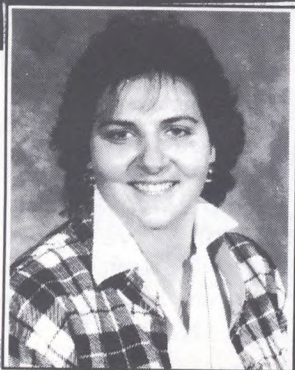

Eugène Bellemare veut introduire un projet de loi qui obligerait les députés à prêter un serment d'allégeance au Canada.

Ottawa-- Le député de Carleton-GloUCESTER, Eugène Bellemare, à l'intention d'introduire un projet de loi émanant des députés intitulé Loi modifiant la loi sur le Parlement du Canada (serment ou déclaration solennelle).

Ce projet de loi aurait pour but d'obliger un député fédéral à prêter un serment d'allégeance au Canada, en plus du serment qui est fait à l'endroit de la Reine.

M. Bellemare croit qu'il est grand temps que notre pays soit muni de son propre serment. Il affirme qu'une déclaration solennelle de ce genre n'est qu'une suite logique au rapatriement de la Constitution de 1982. De plus, il croit que les députés élus à la Chambre des communes doivent poser un geste concret comme celui-ci afin de démontrer le sérieux et l'importance de leurs tâches.

"Je trouve qu'un règlement de cette nature s'avère très utile afin de confirmer la loyauté des élus fédéraux à notre pays et à sa tradition de tolérance et de compromis. Advenant l'adoption de ce projet de loi, je reconnais qu'il posera un dilemme quelconque aux personnes qui veulent être élues pour séparer ou détruire le Canada. Cependant, je crois qu'un serment d'allégeance à notre pays renforcera le sentiment de fierté que ressentent la grande majorité des députés lors de leur arriv e à la Chambre des communes."

M. Bellemare espère que le gouvernement reconnaisse la nécessité d'un tel serment et fera en quoi que le projet de loi en question soit adopté le plus t ot possible.

PRESCHOOL UPDATE - JANUARY 1993

Now that the Holiday Season has passed, it's back to business for the staff and students of the Blackburn Hamlet Preschool. Due to a few miscues and mishaps, the "Update" has not appeared in the BANAR in some time - for this I apologize and my New Year's Resolution is to be in well under the deadline!

The most important item to note is that the Preschool will be accepting registrations for the 1993-94 school year beginning in February. The school offers half-day programs (mornings or afternoons) either two or three days per week.

The Blackburn Hamlet Preschool with its dedicated staff of ECE (Early Childhood Education) teachers is well established and has built a sound reputation for providing a challenging, exciting program to children aged 2 1/2 to 5 years. The activities are designed to provide each child with the opportunity to experience social, emotional, physical and cognitive development in a warm, caring environment. Activity/learning centres such as block, music and book areas, a science centre, house centre, art centre, manipulative play and water and sand play are used to stimulate young minds and imaginations.

One unique aspect of the Preschool is the successful running of a fully integrated program over the past several years to give individual attention to children with special needs.

As the program is "co-operative", parents are encouraged to become involved in the operation of the school by acting on special committees, the school executive and through "duty days" where the parent may participate in the daily routines of the program - which may include some sort of field trip!

The basic program is divided into four phases:

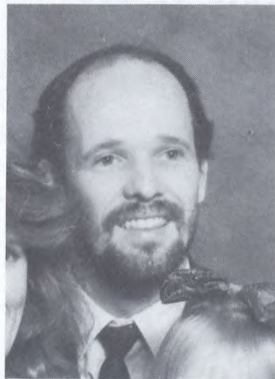
1. **Free Play** - after being greeted at the door by a teacher, the children may float between the two main rooms for about 1 hour and 15 minutes. During this time, they may play in the art room (crafts, puzzles, water play, music, etc) or in the "large muscle" room (climbing apparatus, large blocks, science corner, housekeeping centre, etc.)
2. **Snack** - after the children assist in cleaning up centres, the children, duty parents and teachers gather for a nutritious snack.
3. **Circle** - after snack, the children are divided into three "circle" activity groups for singing, playing games, creative movement, theme discussion and a story.
4. **Outside Play** - for one half hour, the children are occupied in the outdoor activity area developing gross motor skills using ride-on toys and the large climbing apparatus or playing on swings and in the large sandbox. Many children play with balls or participate in "parachute" games.

For those interested in receiving more information about the Preschool or to register a child for one of the programs, an appointment must be made to view the school and receive registration forms. The Registrar, Betty Smith will be happy to schedule appointments. She can be reached at 824-7834.

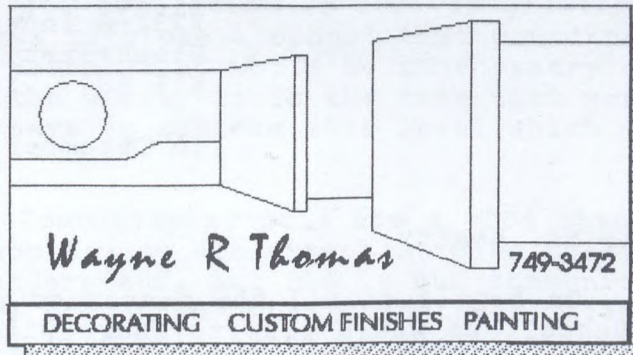

Dear Mr. Beatty,

On behalf of all the concerned parents of Blackburn Public School, we would like to share with you our concerns and our ideas regarding the proposal which was made by the Community Working Group 2 at the Corporate Services Meeting of 10 November, 1992. We realize that many hours of work went into this report, hoping to come up with a practical solution, but we feel that our opinion was neither consulted nor respected and therefore, we wish to voice our concerns.

We feel it is important to look at long term solutions and are distressed at the proposal to close Blackburn Public School, (or use it for "alternate use", that of which has not been defined).

BPS is by far one of the finest elementary schools one can hope to find. It's excellence in the quality of education, the relationships between teacher and child, the open communication with parents and the deep and genuine concern of the entire staff are, to say the least, exceptional. Many of us were most upset that this proposal was made without much consent from the parents of our community. In a survey taken the first week of December, it indicated that 38% of parents were not even aware of the possibility of closing the school. This survey also indicated that 84%, regardless of whether they lived in Blackburn Hamlet or Chapel Hill, wanted the school to remain open and at least 68% wanted their child to stay there.

Most upsetting to us was that no alternate proposal was made! BPS is the only english public school in the area; it is the only school open to all who come, regardless of language, religion or origin. "We consider it our community school", said one Chapel Hill resident and it must remain open to the community. This being Ontario, surely we cannot dissolve the only english school left!

We cannot solve all the problems of the area at once but we have ideas which we would be pleased to discuss. We believe that sending all the Blackburn Hamlet children to Glen Ogilvie would cause more problems than solutions. According to the numbers presented by the board, the school would be over-crowded and more portables would have to be brought in. Going from a portable at BPS to a portable at Glen Ogilvie is not an improvement. It is also frightening to think of such a large number of very young children all together out on the school grounds. Glen Ogilvie may be a more

modern school, but there is nothing wrong with the facilities at BPS. If it is the lack of a "proper gym", as so often mentioned, which is a problem for some people, then why not simply add on a gym and let the facility be used also by the community___ which would be a bonus for all, and would save in expenses in the long run, as the building costs could perhaps be shared.

The population is forever growing in this area so it would seem useless to close a school that would perhaps need to be re-opened in a few years. That would be unnecessary expenses! A school is not just the walls; it is the team that works inside and that took so many years to achieve this level which makes it what it is.

Community schools are a good thing and we realize that a number of people want dual-track at Glen Ogilvie because they live close-by; we understand, but BPS is our community school. According to numbers presented, when Chapel Hill Elementary is completed, BPS would lose only about 60 students, which would still make it very functionable. It must also be said that a number of Chapel Hill residents and Blackburn Hamlet residents simply want their children in an english school (as opposed to an immersion or dual-track school). This must also be respected, and many of us were outraged to learn that, according to this proposal, NC variances would be permitted! We strongly disagree.

All the numbers and figures are too uncertain at this point to destroy something that is very certain, that being our school. We wish only to protect something that we value. Let us not put dollar signs before the well-being of our little ones. We oppose to children being used as numbers for purposes other than their best interest and we believe in compromising. A proposal must offer alternate solutions.

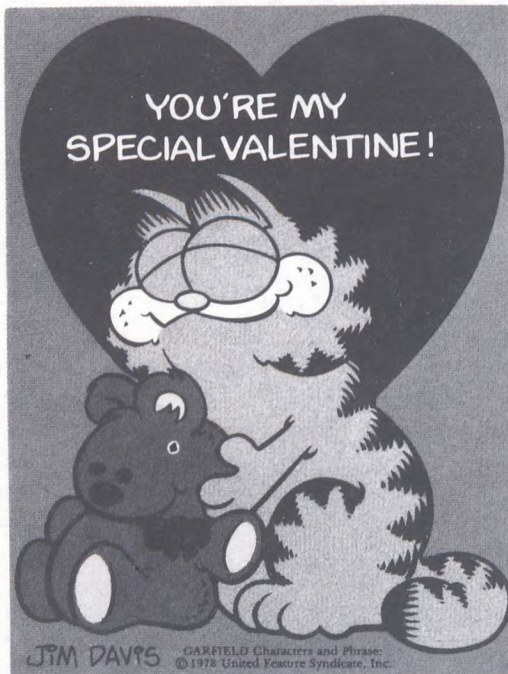

YOUR ANNUAL PHYSICAL

Just recently I saw a young man in my office who had not been to see his own doctor in many years. When I asked him when he last had a complete physical performed, he replied "Well I haven't needed one because I know I'm healthy and its just a waste of my time and the government's money". Surprisingly enough, even with universal and free access health care in Canada, many have this same attitude towards yearly check-ups.

The reasons are endless, for some its simply the fear of finding something is wrong with them, or feel its unjustified when they feel 'well'. In fact this is the time most physicians want to see their patients. One of the most important jobs your family physician can and should do for you is make you aware of diseases you may be at risk for and screen for early detection if possible. This is the area of preventive medicine, and if practiced can save lives and millions in health care dollars.

Most visits to the doctor are about one specific acute problem and seldom do the two of you have time to sit down and discuss questions that you may have about your general health or even social problems you may be struggling with. Nowadays there is a lot more public awareness about health from the media and during your physical I recommend that you come prepared with a written list of concerns to discuss - it's inevitable that you may feel rushed and/or simply forget otherwise.

When is the best time for a physical? Anytime! You may want to do it when your birthday rolls around each year as an easier way to remember when you will be due again. Be sure to book with the receptionist for a 'complete physical' so you will be ensured at least 1/2 hour with your physician - anything less than this means you are not thoroughly being assessed.

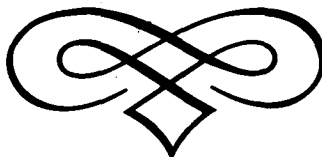
Once your routine statistics have been documented, the two of you should review any changes to your health over the last year, including any new medications, immunizations or procedures, etc.. Then you should address the concerns you have written down and have them properly investigated and discussed. It then is your physician's responsibility to review your own risk factors that he/she uncovers after reviewing your overall health history.

Things such as infant safety tips, childhood behaviour disorders, and nutrition should be brought up, as most parents aren't aware of certain pitfalls. In the adolescence period it is very important to warn of the dangers of drug abuse, STD's and explain the changes of puberty - both physical and emotional. Women need yearly Pap tests once they become sexually active, breast self-exam teaching, mammogram and menopause counselling. Men too are at risk for things such as heart/stroke and may require early screening stress tests or cholesterol checks. As well need education on testicular self-exams and prostate disease. Finally, everyone should be assessed for diet/exercise/stress patterns, as well as immunizations.

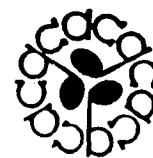
So you can see there is some form of preventive medicine counselling for every age that your family physician is responsible for - but we can't put it to use if we don't see you!

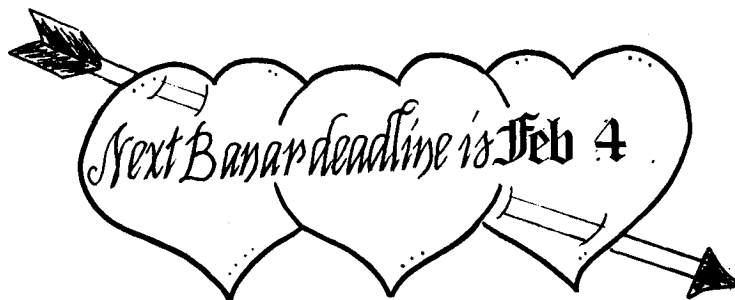

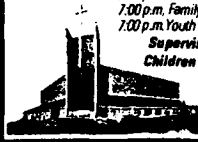

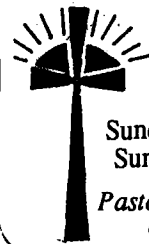
