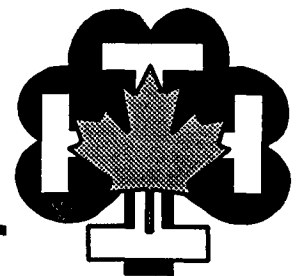
TO BE OR NOT TO BE

MINUTES

The Minutes of the previous meeting were approved. Steve briefly reviewed the agenda for the evening and introduced the new Editor, Geraldine Tanguay-Foisy.

Correspondence

- Steve received a call from the Blackburn Minor Hockey Association asking if they could be considered a sub-group of the BCA to assist in fundraising. The Executive agreed that the BMHA could be considered a sub-group of the BCA.

- Discussion regarding the zoning and planning on Navan Road now that it is no longer a main arterial street. Jim is to follow-up with Planning Department.

- Steve received 3 telephone calls from residents of the community, objecting to the Bingo Hall. They are concerned with various issues such as: religious reasons, gambling, profit organizations, parking, etc. The owner of Wallys asked Steve to discuss these issues on behalf of the BCA at our meeting. Steve mentioned that there are two types of Bingos: 1. Bingo itself, 2. Bonanza Cards. Usually the owner provides the infrastructure and the client is responsible for the Bingo licence. The BCA is positive toward this structure since it could bring certain benefits to groups the BCA supports and give them the opportunity to increase their funds. Steve is to attend a meeting with the owners and local residents to discuss these issues further.

- Proposal from Darryl MacLeod Independent Recreation Services for rink monitors was submitted. The BCA is now approaching it's annual budget meeting and since 2/3 of the season has passed, the BCA would like to carry-on with these priority issues before determining a fixed rate to the new proposal.

- Information from OC Transpo on proposed changes to route 125 and 128.

- Ottawa-Carleton information on environmental review of official plan.

- The Ottawa-Carleton Heart Beat Assoc. sent a letter and information package to the BCA for an invitation to their community meeting and to print a healthy heart article in the

Steve a mentionné qu'il existe deux genres de Bingo: 1) Bingo
2) cartes Bonanza. La responsabilité du propriétaire est de fournir les services et le client est responsable d'obtenir une licence. L'Association appuie avec enthousiasme ce fonctionnement puisque les groupes membres profiteront des retombées du Bingo. Steve va rencontré le propriétaire de Wallys et les résidents pour en discuter d'avantage.

- Darryl MacLeod a soumi à l'ACB une proposition pour l'embauche des moniteurs d'aréna. Etant donné que la saison de hockey s'achève, le BCA va discuté lors de la prochaine réunion de ces priorités avant d'étudier la proposition de Darryl MacLeod.

- OC Transpo a envoyé de l'information concernant les changements des routes 125 et 128.

- Ottawa-Carleton a envoyé de l'information concernant l'étude environnementale.

- L'Association coeur-à-coeur d'Ottawa-Carleton a envoyé une trousse d'information et une invitation à leur prochaine réunion. De plus, ils ont demandé au BCA de faire imprimé un article

BANAR. The Heart Beat Campaign of the Ottawa-Carleton Health Dept. is a community-wide program designed to reduce the incidence of heart disease in the Region through public education and community change.

- Jim Campbell received a telephone call from a resident located behind the new construction of the medical building regarding the deflector lights. Jim spoke to the planning dept. and asked what could be done. The planning dept. made suggestions to the developer. Jim is to follow-up.

- Confirmation from the GRCB that half the grant allocation would be received approximately March 30, 1993.

- City of Gloucester - Environmental Report for the East-urban Community.

- Ottawa-Carleton - copies of the Kirby Report.

- Mike received a call from the Scouts Assoc. concerning the monthly distribution of the BANAR. Steve suggested that we publish a notice in the BANAR to establish a list for interested participating groups.

Mouvements Scouts-Guides

Mrs. Lucie Arcand was invited to our meeting to discuss the possibility for grant allocation on behalf of the St-Claude Scouts-Guides Association. For the last couple of years the francophone community were not allocated any funds from the BCA, as no request had been received. Their main financial resources were fundraising and membership fees. Lucie explained how they had doubled the price of registration in order provide funds for outdoor activities, crafts and day camps. Furthermore, Lucie mentioned that no application was sent to anyone because the Committee responsible has been abolished and no volunteers have been available to follow-up. Lucie would like to take on a pro-active move towards this issue. Steve suggested that she submit an application ASAP and attend our annual budget meeting.

Grant Allocation

- Steve initiated a discussion concerning recreation grants for incorporated profit organizations. Steve suggested that the Executive pass a motion to exclude these groups from our grant allocation list. As a recreation association the BCA does not contribute money to profit organizations. This motion was passed - Seconded by Neil Morris - Unanimous. Steve is to write a letter and send it to the concerned groups.

- There were also discussions regarding late applicants, cultural groups, Children VS Adult groups. Steve is to discuss these issues further with Marjorie.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:30 PM.

Your Councillor's Report

French Language Services in Gloucester

There has been considerable publicity recently regarding Council's deliberations over proposals to improve French language services in the City. It is unfortunate that much of what has been reported is, at best, selective and inaccurate and, at worst, misleading and inflammatory.

On February 23, Council adopted a **policy statement** for the provision of bilingual services. In fact, many of the services guaranteed in this document were already in place as the City has been working to meet the needs of its francophone residents on an ongoing basis for many years. Now, however, current practices and some new and/or improved services will become official City policy.


In addition, at the same meeting, several recommendations were approved from the **French Language Needs Assessment Study**, which Council commissioned to evaluate current services and suggest improvements. This study, conducted by Rhéal Leroux and Associates, concluded that there is overall satisfaction among francophones in Gloucester with the current level of services being provided. The consultant's report noted that there were very few complaints registered by francophone residents. It did however, put forward eight recommendations it was felt would improve services. City Council has now approved six of these eight recommendations.

Unfortunately, much attention has been focused on the two recommendations from the consultant's report which were not approved and much name-calling has been directed, particularly in the French press, at the Council members who decided, as individuals, not to support these particular proposals. The recommendation that a French Language Services Advisory Committee be established to oversee the implementation of language policy was defeated. I voted against this recommendation. I believe that staff can be trusted to implement this policy just as they are

trusted to put into practice all other direction given them by Council. I also voted against a recommendation involving the designation of positions as bilingual and the introduction to Gloucester of the rigid, costly, intimidating and dehumanizing mechanism of language training, testing, determining "levels" of bilingualism etc. City staff, like any other group, deserves to be treated with consideration. Moreover, of the 228 management, non-union and union salaried positions which exist at this time, 46 are already designated "mandatory bilingual." Over 30% of this staff group is bilingual, and when Police and Library staff are included the percentage is even higher. Of course, we will continue to look at positions and language requirements as necessary, but, I voted as I did because I felt that this recommendation was neither essential nor desirable.

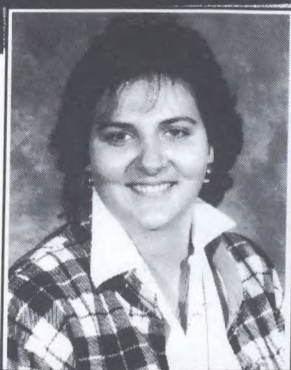
I believe that Council has, within certain unavoidable financial and practical constraints, passed a progressive and fair bilingualism policy which serves its francophone constituency well. In the future, changes and improvements can of course be made as they are required. The longstanding harmonious relations between both language groups in Gloucester should not be threatened by this policy nor should anyone doubt the goodwill of staff or Council regarding its implementation. Let us carry on together from here.

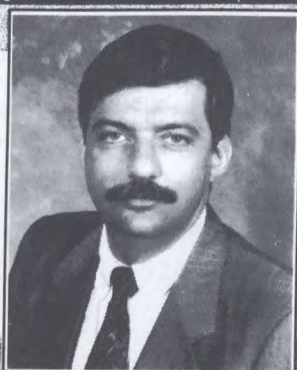

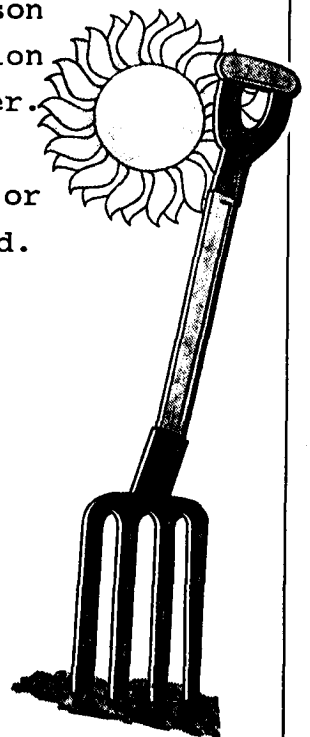

SEPARATE COLLECTION OF YARD WASTE

In an effort to divert more waste from landfill, the City of Gloucester has expanded its separated yard waste collection program in 1993. The collection program will begin during spring cleanup time in late April.

Residents are asked to use re-useable containers (garbage cans) whenever possible for setting out yard waste. When this is not possible we ask that the 100 litre Kraft yard waste bags be used.

The re-usable containers supplemented with the Kraft yard waste bags provide the most efficient and cost effective means of handling the collection of separated yard waste.

Plastic bags in any form, are not compostable and have to be separated manually from the yard waste which increases costs. Therefore Gloucester is not collecting plastic bags.

Separated yard waste will be collected every second week during 1993. Yard waste that is put out on the off-collection week will be left at the curb for pickup on the following collection week.

* These weeks contain a statutory holiday. On these weeks regular collection, blue box recycling collection and yard waste collection will be one day late!

Please retain this schedule so you can put your yard waste out on the proper weeks.

Kraft yard waste bags will be available at many retail stores in Gloucester, such as, Hardware, Food, Drug, Lumber, Department and Garden Centres.

In the 1992 program between start-up July 1 and November 15, we diverted 941.5 tonnes. The full season program target is 1,500 tonnes. Can we do better?

Prostate Cancer - Understanding the Controversy

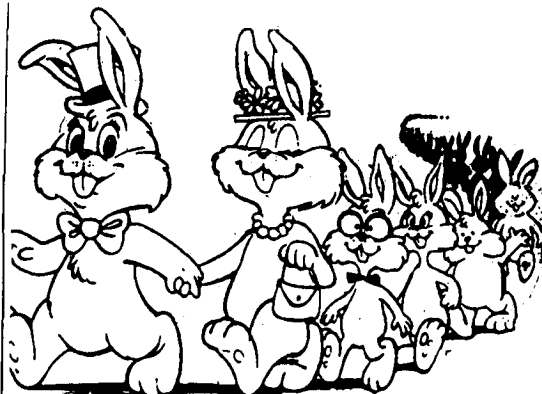
Eventually, most men experience prostate problems in their life. Many will face symptoms from an enlarged or hypertrophied prostate (BPH) or an infected gland. Or there is prostate cancer, currently the most frequent cancer in men and the second deadliest. Each year approximately 11,000 Canadian men are diagnosed and 1/3 or 3600 will die from this form of cancer. Though this tiny gland is normally only the size of a walnut, gram for gram, there is more disease in the prostate than any other tissue or organ in the body.

With the frequency of disease it is understandable that a lot of attention and research has been devoted to this area. As a result there is also a great difference of opinion amongst physicians about aggressive screening measures and their effectiveness for the early detection of this form of cancer (somewhat like for screening mammograms). The controversy lies in the fact that a blood test called PSA (prostate specific antigen) which is secreted by prostate cells, but at greater volumes by cancer cells; can pick up early prostate disease and/or cancer. But it is not always specific for cancer, and so one can be fooled. As well, it has not been proven yet that picking up this form of cancer earlier is cost effective or improves the lifespan in these individuals, as most are in their seventies and have other complicating medical conditions.

Because early prostate cancer is asymptomatic, it is very difficult to diagnose. If one waits until symptoms of low back pain or urinary obstruction occur, advanced disease will already be in place, which usually requires aggressive surgical and/or radiation palliative treatment. It is still therefore recommended by the Canadian Urology Association that every man over fifty have a yearly digital rectal exam (DRE) and a PSA measurement. Black men or patients with a family history should start at age forty. If the PSA level is elevated and/or the DRE reveals a suspicious nodule, a transrectal ultrasound should be ordered and if needed a biopsy of the region for further confirmation.

Advances in hormonal therapy for the treatment of prostate cancer and BPH occur yearly and so it can be theorized that earlier detection will lead to improved mortality rates. Until this is proven in studies however, the controversy over the care for the middle aged male will continue. Your family physician can explain further the symptoms of prostate disease, possible treatment options and arrange for the PSA testing at any local laboratory facility.

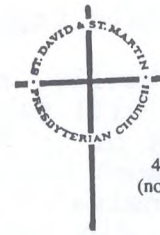

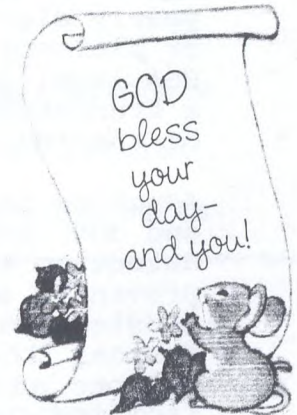

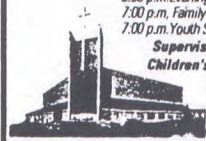
