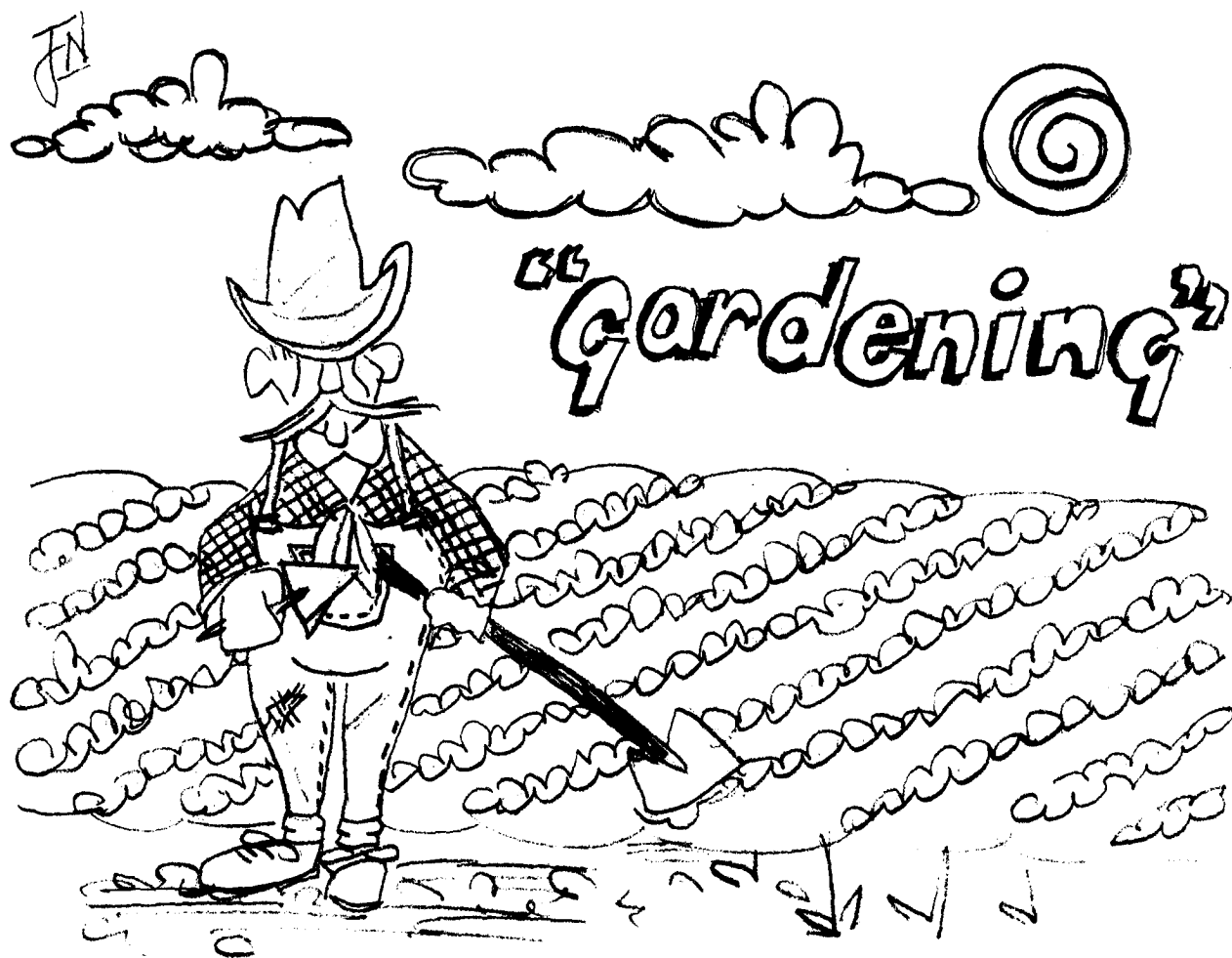

FROM THE PRESIDENT

In this issue of the BANAR we have included last year's financial statements and this year's grant distribution. The financial statements were approved at the March BCA meeting. I would like to thank all those who attended the meeting.

The financial statements were prepared by our Vice President Neil Morris and I'd like to thank him for his work. By doing this he saved the BCA \$1,300.

We lost money again last year and the budget shows we will lose money again this year. The BANAR is the major expense that we have. The editor will be reviewing the costs to see where we can save money yet retain the value for the community.

This may be the last year the BCA distributes the recreation grant for the City of Gloucester. The City is considering combining the Recreation Associations, RA's, (a function the BCA serve in Blackburn Hamlet) with the Recreation Centre Boards(RCB's). The present system has the RA's distributing Recreation Grants and operating recreation programs in the community (day camp ,fun fair) and the RCB's look after the facilities (pool, outdoor rinks, park play structures, paths, park lights etc.). The RCB's are a committee of the City Council, RA's are not.



If the proposal is approved by Council a new organization would be formed. At this stage I'm not sure what role if any the BCA would play or whether we would continue to operate programs such as the Fun Fair and Day Camp. These are some issues which we will be discussing in the next meetings.

MINUTES

Steve apologized for the change in location of the meeting, welcomed the guests to the Annual BCA Budget meeting, introduced the members of the BCA Executive and reviewed the Agenda for the evening. The three topics were:

- 1) 1992 BCA Activities Review
- 2) Leisure Grant Distribution
- 3) BCA Financial Review

Quorum: A Quorum was present

Motion: To accept the minutes of the previous 1992 Annual Budget Meeting as tabled. Moved: Jim Canning, Seconded, Colleen Stimpson. Carried.

1992 BCA Activities Review

Steve presented an overview of the BCA's objectives. The BCA represents the community at various levels such as: in civic affairs, environmental issues, allows groups to inform the community through the BANAR, sponsors youth and sporting activities and publishes the BANAR, a community newsletter.

The BCA also organized a 2 day Fun-Fair of which \$10,000 was distributed to the participants last year. The BCA also operates a summer day camp. Over 100 youths participated last summer and it will be run for 7 weeks this year. We have also loaned \$25,000 to the Tennis Club to help them build their new club house. The All-Candidates-Meetings are held by the BCA and all regular meetings are held monthly.

LEISURE GRANT DISTRIBUTION

Steve reviewed this area, starting with the general guidelines used by the Executive in formulating its grant distribution recommendations:

- Base the distribution on the number of participants in each group who live in the Blackburn area.
- Distribute the full amount directly to the needs of the user groups in the community.

COMPTE-RENDU

Steve souhaite la bienvenue aux invités, présente les membres de l'Exécutif et révisa les sujets pour discussion de la soirée. Par ailleurs Steve s'excusa du changement d'école de l'assemblée. Les 3 sujets de discussion de la soirée étaient:

- 1) Révision des activités de 1992
- 2) Distribution des bourses
- 3) Bilan financier de l'ACB

Quorum: Le quorum était atteint

Adoption du Budget Annuel: Que l'Exécutif de l'ACB, accepte le procès-verbal concernant le budget annuel de 1992 tel que déposé. Proposé par Jim Canning, Appuyé - Colleen Stimpson, Accepté.

Révision des activités 1992

Steve présenta les points pertinents des objectifs de l'ACB. L'ACB représente la communauté à plusieurs niveaux: Affaires municipales, Environnement, porte-parole communautaire par l'entremise du BANAR, commandite les activités de loisirs et les groupes de sports, publication du journal communautaire BANAR.

L'ACB organise une foire communautaire à tout les années d'une durée de 2 jours. Cette activité a permis de recueillir \$10,000 l'an passé qui a été distribué aux participants. L'ACB opère un camp d'été qui a attiré plus de 100 jeunes l'été dernier et sera d'une durée de 7 semaines cette année. Nous avons fait un prêt de 25,000\$ au Club de Tennis pour la construction d'un nouveau bâtiment. De plus, l'ACB organise à tous les mois des assemblées régulières.

DISTRIBUTIONS DES BOURSES

Steve a révisé ce sujet, en énumérant les lignes directrices suivantes utilisées par l'Exécutif pour l'octroi des prêts:

- Par rapport au nombre de participants de chaque groupe demeurant dans la région de Blackburn.
- Distribution du montant total selon les besoins des groupes de la communauté.

- Majority of funds to youth groups, non-profit organizations, seniors and special needs.

3 groups were late in their applications for various reasons. There were several questions and discussions on specific items. The BCA recommended that these changes be accepted, for a total distribution of \$38,710.

Motion: That the 1993 Leisure Grant distribution be accepted as tabled and amended. Moved, Jim Canning, Seconded - Lucie Arcand - Carried.

BCA FINANCIAL REVIEW

Neil and Renata put countless hours reviewing the 1992 Financial Statement. In all aspects 1992 was a very good year.

Motion: That the Financial Statement for 1992 be accepted as tabled. Moved - Penny Harfield, Seconded, Jim Campbell. Carried.

1993 BCA BUDGET

Neil presented the proposed 1993 BCA Budget with a net deficit of \$3,154.

Motion: That the 1993 BCA Budget be accepted as tabled. Moved - Colleen Stimpson, Seconded - Jim Canning. Carried.

Steve thanked Neil and Renata on behalf of the BCA for their efficient work and the good results in a difficult year.

The Constitutional requirements of the BCA is to audit the financial statements every year. Steve proposed a motion to delete this requirement to reduce the cost of about \$1,300 a year. Audits would still be performed by the Executive when necessary or desired.

Motion: To delete the requirement for an annual audit and replace it with a Financial Review Committee consisting of the treasurer and at least one other member of the executive. Moved, Michael Martin, Seconded, Colleen Stimpson. Carried.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:10 PM.

BUDGET 1993 ACB

Neil a présenté le budget de 1993 représentant un déficit de 3,154 \$.

Motion: Que le budget proposé pour 1993 soit accepté tel que déposé. Proposé par Michael Martin, appuyé par Colleen Stimpson. Accepté.

Steve a remercié Neil et Renata pour leur dévouement et leur travail efficace malgré une année difficile.

Le mandat de l'ACB stipule que la vérification du bilan financier doit être révisé à tout les ans. Steve a proposé une motion pour abolir cette politique afin de réduire les coûts de 1,300 \$ par année. La vérification des états financiers serait examiné par l'Exécutif au besoin.

Motion: Que l'ACB accepte d'annuler la vérification annuelle du bilan financier pour être remplacé par un comité responsable pour la vérification constituant du trésorier et au moins un autre membre de l'ACB. Proposé, Michael Martin, Appuyé, Colleen Stimpson, Accepté.

Your Councillor's Report

Bingo - Rezoning on Innes Road

Recently, Council passed a bylaw to rezone the property on the corner of Innes Road and Beddoe Lane. This zoning change allows an additional use for the already existing commercial zoning of the site, permitting the operation of a bingo hall. In view of the concern expressed by some of you regarding this decision, I would like to make some comments.

When I first learned of the proposal, I suggested that the applicant discuss the matter with the Blackburn Community Association, which is our local community-wide organization. Their reaction to it was apparently positive, and, in fact, the BCA appeared at the public hearing before the Planning Advisory Committee (in March) to support the application. This public hearing had been originally scheduled for February, but the applicant requested a deferral to allow time to meet with the residents in the immediate area before the hearing. Unfortunately, this deferral meant that I could not be present because I had been scheduled for some weeks to go to Africa on vacation and I was locked into those plans.

At the time of my departure, the Planning Department had not yet made its decision as to whether or not to recommend approval of the application and faced the same difficulty that I was experiencing in deciding the worth of the project from a planning and community perspective. I appreciated the problems that the applicant faced and the potential financial benefits to local charities, but I also understood the real concerns of the residents over noise and traffic.

Ultimately, the Planning Department recommended that Council turn down the application on the grounds of lack of compatibility with the surrounding neighbourhood. I was surprised to learn when I returned that Council had not only approved the application but had approved it without dissent. It seems that Council was impressed with the efforts made by the applicant to bring the community onside (both the BCA and the immediate neighbourhood) and sympathized with the rental and revenue problems. It was also noted that the site was already zoned as commercial and therefore the proposed change was not extreme. I was also surprised to learn that support came from local business, which I thought might have opposed it. In view of the Planning Department's recommendation, which recognized the residents' input, had I been present I could not have supported the application, but of course that is only one vote.

B C A DAY CAMP EARLY REGISTRATION

This year's DAY CAMP promises to be an exciting one, especially for the older children. We are in the process of forming a YOUTH CAMP for kids aged 11 - 14. More information will be available at a later date.

An Asthma Update

Asthma is a common condition that affects people of all ages. Although wheezing is the most common symptom, for some asthmatics the only symptom is a chronic cough (often worse at night or in cold air), a feeling of tightness in the chest, or frequent chest infections. People who only cough or wheeze when exercising are said to have exercise induced asthma. Young children who tend to have a persistent cough after each cold might be suffering from asthma. Asthma is much more common in people with a family history of asthma, allergies, or eczema. There is currently no cure for asthma, but understanding the disease and learning to control its symptoms can allow one to enjoy a normal, active life.

Asthma involves changes in the bronchial tubes. These are the fine, branch-like tubes that carry air in and out of the lungs. With asthma, the muscle surrounding the bronchial tubes tightens intermittently, which causes the airways to constrict, which in turn causes wheezing and breathlessness. Drugs that relax these muscles and open the airways are called bronchodilators. Common examples of bronchodilators are alupent, ventolin, and bricanyl.

Asthma causes the lining of the airway to become inflamed and swollen, and increases its mucous production. This further narrows or even blocks the airways. Inflamed airways are more sensitive to irritants and are more likely to cause wheezing. Drugs that reduce the inflammation act to prevent the asthma symptoms from occurring. Common examples of preventive, anti-inflammatory drugs are intal, tilade, beclovent, pulmocort, and prednisone.

Management of asthma has changed dramatically in the past five years. Doctors had relied almost entirely on bronchodilators (such as ventolin) for treatment of asthma, and rarely used the anti-inflammatory medicines. It is now known that it is better to prevent the asthma attacks and reserve the bronchodilators for wheezing episodes that occur despite prevention. If you are using a bronchodilator more than three times a week without an anti-inflammatory, then you should discuss with your family doctor the use of an anti-inflammatory medication. If you are using a bronchodilator more than twice a day with an anti-inflammatory, you should discuss increasing your dosage of anti-inflammatory medication. If you only experience wheezing or coughing when exercising, it is best to use a bronchodilator 10 to 20 minutes prior to exercise to prevent symptoms.

Another way to prevent asthma symptoms is to remove triggers that irritate the airways. The most common allergens leading to asthma symptoms include cat dander, dogs, dust, pollen, ragweed, feathers. Discuss with your family doctor methods of eliminating these from your environment. Smoke, both inhaled and second hand, aggravates asthma. Drugs such as aspirin, some blood pressure medications, and some eye drops can trigger asthma symptoms. Review your medications with your doctor. Asthmatics, adults and children, should receive the flu vaccine each Autumn.

There are several warning signs of worsening asthma which should lead you to contact your doctor:

You need to use the bronchodilator more often than usual.

Early morning wheeze or chest tightness persists despite treatment.

Sleep is disturbed by your asthma symptoms.

You can't exercise as easily as before.

You have more cough or sputum.

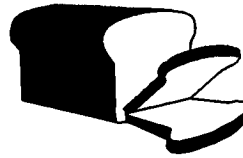

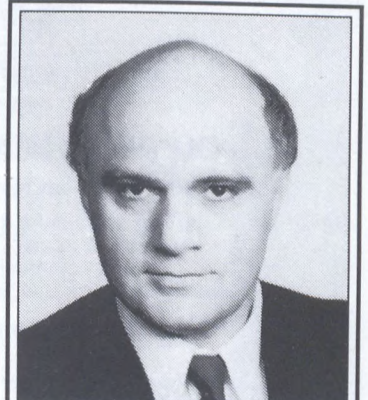

BLACKBURN HAMLET . . .**Past Glimpses***Hamlet Facts and Figures*

This is the first in a series of articles appearing in the BANAR which describe the characteristics and history of Blackburn Hamlet.

Most of the Hamlet has been developed within approximately the past 25 years. However, nearly two centuries of settlement are reflected in the contemporary Blackburn Hamlet. In upcoming issues of the BANAR, topics such as the early settlement of the Blackburn area, the origins of the "Blackburn" name, development of the modern bedroom community of Blackburn Hamlet, the origins of the street names and some of the landmarks in and around the community will be explored. First, however, a statistical profile of the current Blackburn Hamlet.

Of the six Gloucester planning areas: Cyrville, Beacon Hill, Orleans, Blossom/Windsor Park, Rural, and Blackburn Hamlet, the Hamlet has the smallest population. The original 1962 development plan for Blackburn Hamlet called for a population of 9,400 by approximately 1985. This projection was remarkably accurate. In 1986, the census population of the Hamlet was 9,674. This was, however, a *reduction* of 300 from the 1981 census. The City of Gloucester planning department estimated the 1991 year-end population of Blackburn Hamlet to be even less: approximately 9,265. The reason for the further drop in population is because of an anticipated reduction in household size (i.e. older teenagers and young adults moving out of the home - mostly in the North side of the Hamlet). Unfortunately, 1991 census information for Blackburn Hamlet has not yet been published. (Once this is available from the City of Gloucester - sometime this upcoming summer, - I will provide a census update of the Hamlet in this space).

Blackburn Hamlet's stature as a family oriented community is reflected both in the large number of children in the community as well as large family sizes. At the time of the 1986 census, 41.8% of Hamlet residents were children living in the parental home. This figure compares to 37.8% for Gloucester as a whole. The average number of children per family was also high at 1.57 compared to 1.36 for Gloucester. Indeed, 17.1% of Hamlet census families had 3 or more children, a higher proportion of 3 children families (by 3 to 4%) than any other Gloucester planning community. In comparison, the proportion of 3 children families in Gloucester as a whole is 13.5%.

Blackburn Hamlet is evenly divided between multi-family and single-detached homes. According to the 1986 census, the community had a total of 2,845 residential dwellings, of which 47% (1350) were single-detached. The city of Gloucester's 1991 population projections is also roughly evenly divided between single and multi-family with approximately 4,600 people in each type of dwelling. The Hamlet is also a fairly high income community. The average household income in 1986 was \$52,617. This is the second highest household income among the Gloucester planning communities after Beacon Hill, and compares to a Gloucester average household income at the time of \$41,203.

It will be interesting to see how the 1991 census figures compare to the 1986 numbers. In the next issue of the BANAR: the origins of the name Blackburn Hamlet.

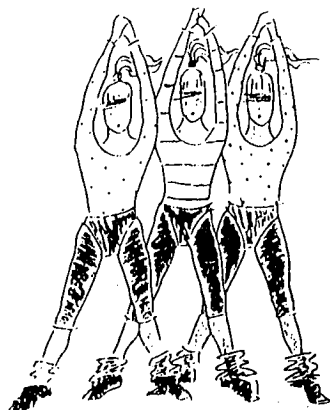

THE RECYCLING SYMBOL WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

The most abused symbol in use today is the one that indicates that an article is recyclable. This symbol is called the "mobius loop" and it signals that an article can be ground down or broken up so that its original materials can be reused in creating a new product.

Everywhere the consumer looks today they see that the packaging on the articles they are buying is recyclable. This can range from the detergent box to the two litre soft drink container. Most all plastic bottles indicate they are recyclable.

It may be true that the article has the capability to undergo that process but the real question is - Is there a company willing to undertake the breaking down of this product?, and more importantly, is there "any market for this newly created raw material to produce another product"?

At present, while many packages can technically be returned to this basic material state, the materials used in the original production are still cheaper than these coming from the recycling system - the result - little demand for the recycled product because of the cost.

Another area is the fact that the products made from recycled material are "perceived" to not be as good as the original produced item made from virgin raw materials so the consumer is hesitant to buy these products.

As a result, there is no financial incentive for a manufacturer to get involved.

The whole question then comes back to us - the consumers - when we ask why we are not recycling more materials, consider what our buying practices are - are we willing to buy products made from recycled material thereby stimulating the demand and costing marginally more, or will we continue with that good old product at the lower price.

Only the consumer, through changing purchasing habits can make the concept of recycling a vibrant and viable process to assist society in reducing the amount of waste now being created!

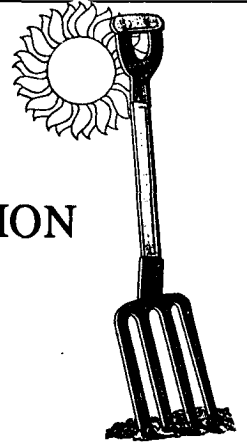

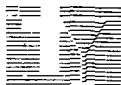
