FROM THE PRESIDENT

This is the end of my first year as President and the start of my second year. At the May election meeting the board was acclaimed. There are two open positions, Fun Fair and Youth Programs.

At the beginning of the year we set a number of goals for the year, and we were able to get many of these either accomplished or underway. These are mentioned in the minutes which are also in this issue of the BANAR.

About 100 volunteers a year give some of their time to the BCA to help the Community. I would like to thank the directors and other volunteers who made things work this year.

I received a few comments about the BCA this past month, some positive and some negative. Some of you have asked us to be more involved in community issues such as local improvements, traffic and zoning concerns. Others wanted more information on changes in the community that affect where they live. I appreciate the comments from those who have taken the time to call or write me and I will be discussing these concerns with the executive to see what we can do that we are not already doing.

It now appears that the Recreation Associations and the Recreation Centre Boards will be combined in January 1994. The recommendation was going to council in June for approval. The amalgamation will remove the responsibility for approving and distributing recreation grants from the BCA. The draft proposal that is under review by the City proposes to phase out the unconditional grants to leisure groups. These would be replaced with contracts for services, but only for new programs. Groups such as Hockey, Ringette and Swimming would get a discount on the rental of facilities instead of a grant. Assuming this is approved it would reduce the income of the leisure groups in Blackburn Hamlet by approximately \$16,000. On a positive note the tax mill rate would drop about 2 1/4 mils resulting in a net property tax savings in the Hamlet.

At the Council meeting where this was presented I asked Council to delay approval of the new process until the affected groups could review the document and provide their input. As I was not the only one with concerns council agreed to a delay until July. If you have questions or concerns on this issue call me or Jim Canning on the BCA or our local Councillor Ed Campbell 748-4119.

Other issues we are working on:

Community policing, Michael Martin has attended workshops with Gloucester Police

Improvements to Innes Road, we are reviewing a proposal by a local resident to improve the appearance of Innes

Discussing the impact of delaying the widening of Innes road between Blair and 417 with the Region

Completion of this year Fun Fair and distribution of the profits (Thanks to all who took part)

Start up of our Summer Day camp, expanded this year to those up to 14 years old.

DIRECTORS WANTED

Fun Fair. To co-ordinate a group of volunteers to run the annual fun fair. There is work involved but it is rewarding. Each year Fun Fair raises more than \$10,000 for community groups.

Youth Programs. To co-ordinate the summer day camp and other youth programs that the BCA operate. Possibly restarting the youth drop-in.

MINUTES

Directors Reports

Sports: The new leisure system is going ahead quite rapidly and should be ready for City Council on June 15.

Banar: Geraldine made a few comments concerning advertisements for the BANAR. A free draw for three Links tickets is in the June BANAR. Geraldine also received positive feedback on the previous article concerning the history of Blackburn Hamlet.

Membership: Bob is leaving the Executive Committee and Mr. Neil Papineau will take on his responsibilities as Director of membership. Bob also mentioned that membership was up 180 more and we are closing in on \$10,000. Approximately 1,200 members have paid their membership and Bob expects more to register at the Fun-Fair. Close to the same amount as last year.

Fun-Fair: The Fun-Fair is all set up and well under way. The Fun-Fair Directors requested that the BCA make a policy decision on travelling expenses. It was agreed to do this at the allowance payable similar to the present government standard

rates, for employee requested vehicle use (10 cents/km). The executive also agreed storing the Fun-Fair equipment (Dunk Bozo, Candy machines etc.) in the 40' trailer. As for the rental of the equipment specific guidelines will be established including insurance coverage, special events within B.H., non-profit fund raising events etc.

Vice-President: Neil reported that the Community Centre is presently on hold due to the reorganization of the Recreation Associations. Tour of facilities will be looked at next year.

COMPTE-RENDU

Rapport de l'exécutif

Sports: Le nouveau système des loisirs s'avère rapidement et devra être prêt pour le conseil municipal le 15 juin prochain.

Banar: Géraldine a fait des commentaires au sujet de la publicité du BANAR. Une petite annonce sera inséré dans le BANAR du mois de juin concernant un tirage gratuit de 3 billets pour la partie des Links. Des résultats positifs ont été reçus concernant l'historicité de Blackburn Hamlet.

Cotisation: Bob quitte l'Exécutif et sera remplacé par M. Neil Papineau qui assumera ses responsabilités comme directeur de la cotisation. Bob a aussi mentionné que la cotisation a connu une augmentation de 180 de plus avec un total de 10,000\$ (presque le même que l'an dernier). Plus de 1,200 membres ont payés leur cotisation et Bob croit que plusieurs autres personnes s'inscriront durant la foire.

Foire d'amusement: La foire aura lieu cette année. Les directeurs ont demandé à l'Exécutif d'établir une politique concernant le remboursement des frais de déplacements pour les volontaires. Il a été décidé par l'exécutif que le prix payable sera

déterminé selon les standards et les taux présentement établis par gouvernement (soit 10 sous par km). L'exécutif a aussi établi une politique au sujet de la location et l'entreposage des équipements (dunk bozo, appareillage à bonbons etc.) La couverture d'assurance, les événements spéciaux et les organismes à buts non-lucratifs étaient les sujets de discussion.

Vice-président: Neil a mentionné que le projet du centre communautaire est présentement en suspend à cause de la réorganisation des associations récréatives. L'étude des emplacements sera remise à plus tard.

Publicity: On behalf of the BCA, Mike attended a meeting concerning Community policing in Gloucester. The Gloucester police are presently redesigning and implementing new policing strategies with the support of the community. It is imperative that the police and the community work together in a problem-oriented partnerships approach. Through a series of workshops the committee is identifying the present and future needs of the community including: human resources, information and technology, organizational structure, calls for service, management, communications strategies.

Steve reviewed the agenda for the current year and discussed the action taken on these 13 topics.

Community Input

Reiner Bloes also approached the BCA on matters that concerns the residents of Blackburn Hamlet. The Kirby report, Market Value reassessment and the Bingo Hall. Reiner said that he feels the BCA could have done more on each of these issues. Paul Clément discussed his proposal for improving the appearance of Innes Road. The executive agreed to support the initiative. Michael Martin will be the responsible director.

Election

A motion was passed to re-elect the present executive with the addition of Neil Papineau as director of membership. The positions of Youth Programs and Fun-fair are open. There being no amendments to the motion, it was passed by vote.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:30 PM.

Your Councillor's Report

Changes to Leisure Services Delivery System

June 1 marked the release of the final report of the Steering Committee on the Future of Leisure Services in Gloucester. This report, presented to Council for approval on June 15, recommends changes to the existing leisure services delivery system.

Mindful that the population of the City has nearly tripled in the last twenty years while the leisure delivery system has remained unchanged, City Council established the Steering Committee in February, 1992 to examine leisure services in Gloucester and recommend a delivery system for the future. Membership was drawn from the Gloucester Recreation Centre Board, local Recreation Associations and Recreation Centre Boards and city-wide groups. Committed to ongoing consultation with community groups and residents, the committee sought input from all stakeholders, as well as the general public, throughout a long and challenging process. Its final report presents recommendations which members feel will significantly improve delivery of leisure services in Gloucester.

Historically, Gloucester's leisure delivery system has relied heavily on volunteers, certainly to a greater extent than many other municipalities. It is the Committee's belief that, in the future, all municipalities may need to move towards less direct government and more community involvement. It has therefore sought to retain a significant level of community involvement while increasing centralization of some functions. It proposes four major changes:

- 1) New **Community Leisure Services Boards** (an amalgamation of current RCB's and RA's) would be responsible for recreation programming and assume some of the community parks responsibilities of RCB's,
- 2) The **Gloucester Recreation Advisory Committee** would replace the current Gloucester Recreation Centre Board with a narrower role as facilitator for city-wide issues, functioning mainly as an advisor to Council on matters of policy,
- 3) City staff would assume more responsibility for planning, construction and maintenance,
- 4) Unconditional grants would be eliminated and replaced by subsidized facility rates (for target groups) and purchase of service agreements.

The implications and effects of these changes are outlined in more detail in the report itself. Copies are available at most City recreational facilities.

The Steering Committee recommends adoption of this new system effective January 1, 1994 and plans to develop a detailed implementation plan for Council approval in the Fall.

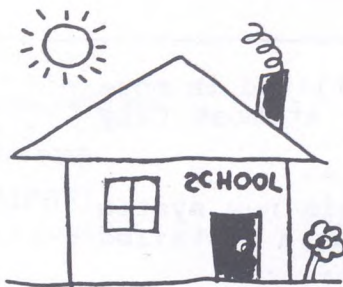

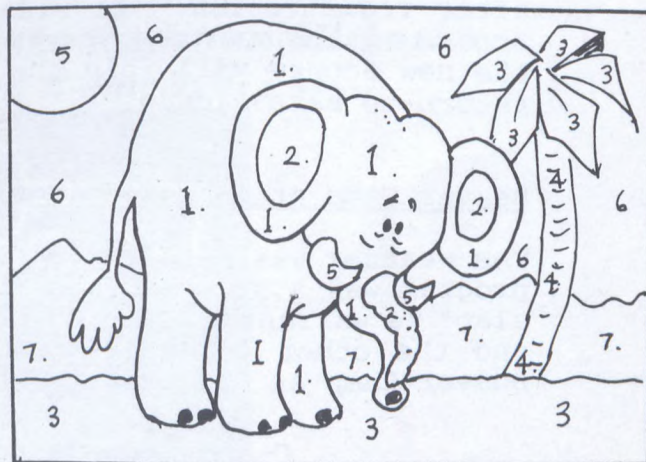

BLACKBURN HAMLET . . .**Past Glimpses***The Early Years*

When I am walking through the Hamlet, I'm always impressed by the thick growth of mature trees and bushes which stretch across the yards and parks, merging seamlessly into the thick forest and brush of the surrounding greenbelt lands. We are fortunate in Blackburn Hamlet to be able to enjoy this picture. During development of the community, a conscious effort was made to keep existing trees and fortunately lot sizes were large enough that many of the trees survived the development. As well, the imagery of treed neighbourhoods and parkland is reinforced by many of the street names chosen: Oakhurst, Silver Aspen, Alder, Highpark, Woodview, etc. This characteristic provides an element of continuity with Blackburn's earliest past.

Consistent with the industrial heritage of the Ottawa area, in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth century, the land in the Blackburn area was sold by the government as a timber limit. Logs were reportedly floated down Green's Creek to a saw mill on the creek operated by Robert Green. As the timber was exhausted, the lands were sold to farmers who began to settle the area. The earliest settlers in the area arrived between 1803-1811. Some of the Hamlet street names provide a constant reminder of the early settlers who came to the area during the 1800s: Kemp, Cleroux, Tauvette, Traillefer. Some of the descendants of the early Blackburn residents continue to live here. Most of the people who settled the area were of English or Irish descent. Some French as well as a few Scottish also settled here to farm.

Blackburn Public School was first built as a one room log school-house in 1866. It was situated on the farm of a prominent local settler, Richard Dagg. This school burnt down in 1915 and a second, one-room brick veneered school, was constructed on the farm of Adam Kemp. By the early 1950s, this school was no longer large enough. In 1954 the current Blackburn Public School was constructed, initially as a two room school-house. It was expanded in approximately 1959 and again in 1963.

Although Blackburn Hamlet is now a satellite bedroom community, in the late 19th and early twentieth century, Blackburn was very much a distinct town. The community had its own post office, a train station and hotel. There was even an Orange Hall, which was later used as a community hall.

I plan to be back with more articles when publication of the BANAR resumes in the Fall. Some of the subjects I hope to cover are the history of the Blackburn Fun Fair as well as local area landmarks, such as the Department of National Defence proving grounds, the Francon quarry and the Ottawa-Carleton Detention Centre.

Again the cost will be \$1 per week and players should arrive 1/2 hour before game time to learn league rules. Again, street hockey will be played at Emily Carr rink.

3-on-3 basketball will not require equipment, however, players are recommended to wear knee pads and elbow pads for protection.

Street hockey will require all players to wear helmets, elbow pads and shin pads as required by the City of Gloucester. This rule is for your protection as well as that of others and as such teens who show up without proper equipment will not be permitted to play. Street hockey will be played with a proper street hockey ball (orange plastic) and roller blades will not be permitted. However, if enough interest exists for roller blade hockey, a separate league will be started for those players.

This league is organized for you and as such your participation will guarantee continued activities organized for your benefit. All rules are made to ensure enjoyment by all. Both sports are organized with the assumption that both male and female teens will participate. 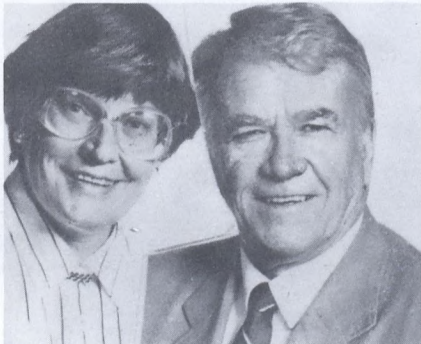

HISTORY OF THE HOME BUYER'S PLAN: Saving For a Home and Retirement at the Same Time

The following information was extracted from the Canadian Real Estate Association Home Buyers' Plan

At the beginning of 1989, members of the Canadian Real Estate Association (CREA) asked the federal government to let first-time home buyers use their own RRSP funds to help accumulate a downpayment. Getting that money together was a big problem for many who wanted to buy homes.

The idea was not an instant success. But REALTORS kept knocking on the Finance Department's door. For three years they persisted. After all, they argued, an RRSP is intended to help provide financial security for retirement and owning a home is the single most important element of income security for retired Canadians.

Why not marry RRSP holdings with home-ownership and put some rules in place to ensure timely repayment of the RRSP? Canadians would then not have to choose between saving for a home and saving for retirement. Using RRSP funds to help buy a home would enable them to accomplish both these worthwhile goals at the same time.

In presenting their plan to the Minister of Finance, CREA members promoted the idea of making RRSPs a permanent part of housing finance in Canada. They wanted to improve the accessibility and affordability of homeownership over the long term.

THE REALTOR EFFORT SUCCEEDS...TWICE!

In his budget of February 25, 1992, Finance Minister Don Mazankowski responded to the REALTOR lobby by announcing new legislation to establish a

step toward achieving REALTOR goals and direct benefit to home buyers...but the big problem was that one-year limit...

From hard experience, REALTORS know that short-term stimulus programs have a negative impact on housing markets because they distort the balance of supply and demand that helps keep prices stable.

So back they went to the Department of Finance with a second proposal to extend the Home Buyers' Plan and make it a more permanent factor in housing finance.

In his economic statement of December 2, 1992, The Finance Minister again responded by extending the Home Buyers' Plan for a further year - to March 1, 1994. By year-end 1992, the first-year program had triggered 127,000 RRSP withdrawals for home buying purposes. Clearly, Canadians gave it their stamp of approval.

GET THE FACTS

With the extension of the plan, more people than ever have the opportunity to buy a home, use their RRSP and still get the tax break associated with RRSP contributions.

However, there are some key dates and rules that affect the period in which RRSP deposits are eligible for tax deductions and anyone wishing to use their Home Buyers' Plan should be completely familiar with these details.

Home Buyer's Plan. Canadians could use up to \$20,000 from their own RRSPs, tax-and interest-free, to buy or build a qualifying home. Borrowers were given 15 years to repay their RRSPs.

This was not the long-term program REALTORS had in mind but a "quick fix" version, introduced for only one year and designed to help Canada's economy by encouraging increased home sales right away.

The Canadian Real Estate Association responded positively. This was the first

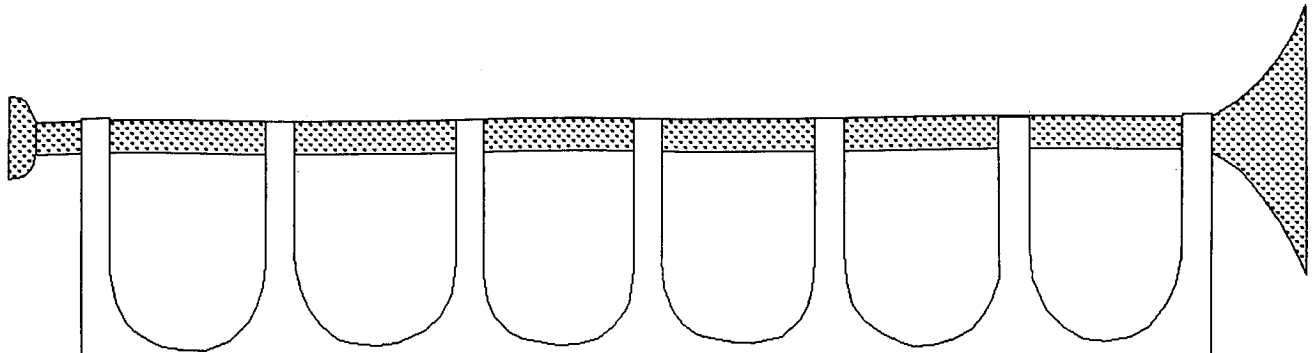

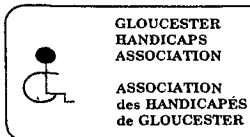

First Aid Kits: What do you really need?

Warm summer days have a way of bringing minor first aid problems. The best thing to do, of course, is to prevent any accidents. In the event that an accident does happen, it is very helpful to be prepared with an organized first aid kit. It is also important to know how to use the first aid kit and when to seek professional help. Basic first aid and CPR knowledge can save a life. The Red Cross (contact Judy Burrows at 560-7440) or the Health Department (722-2328) can provide information on local courses. A basic first aid book (e.g. St. John's Ambulance) is important. There should be a permanent, easily seen list beside the telephone, which shows ambulance/fire/police (911), poison control (1-800-267-1373), family doctor, and your address.

A basic first aid kit should contain the following:

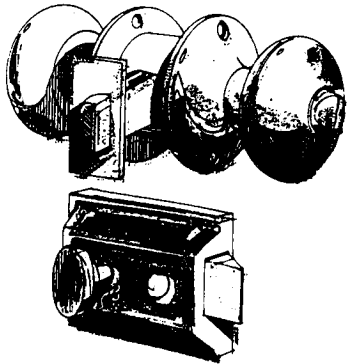
- rubbing alcohol, for sterilizing
- hydrogen peroxide, for cleaning cuts (doesn't sting)
- antibiotic ointment, for cuts (e.g. polysporin, bactroban)
- sterile gauze pads (2" x 2", 4" x 4"), for cleaning wounds and using as bandages; medical tape (e.g. transpore); bandaid assortment
- scissors, tweezers, clean small needle, for slivers
- sling, to immobilize arm for pain relief and to prevent further injury if a broken bone is suspected
- tensor bandage, for sprained ankle or wrist
- benadryl, for allergic reactions to insect bites, food, plants, (adult and child doses)
- acetaminophen, (e.g. tylenol) for pain or fever (adult and child doses)
- ipecac syrup, to treat accidental poisoning (will cause vomiting; should have one bottle for each child in household; only use after calling poison control, 1-800-267-1373)
- epinephrine kit, only if a family member has a history of anaphylactic shock (life threatening allergy)

You should know the fastest route to the nearest hospital, especially when staying at a cottage. At a cottage, it is important to have your cottage address clearly labelled by the phone. (In an emergency, it is easy for you or a guest to forget on which lot number, lake, or RR# you are located.) If a family member has a chronic disease such as angina, diabetes, or asthma, you may consider keeping some spare prescription medicine in the first aid kit, in case the person forgets the medicine at home.

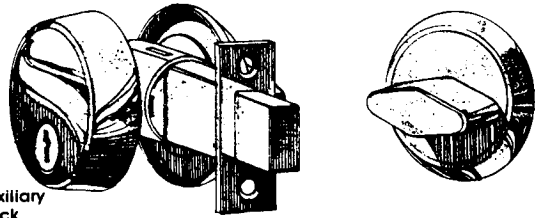

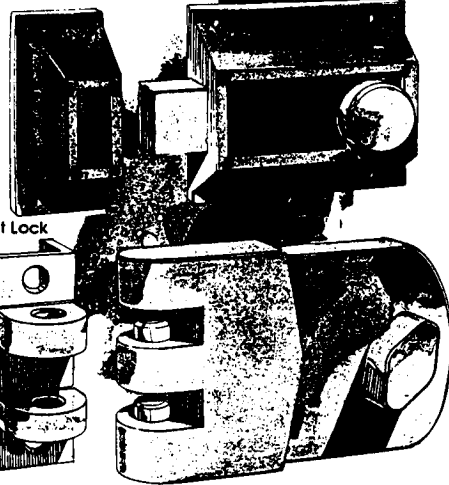
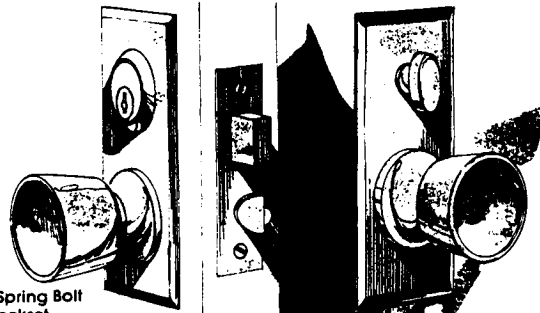
Single Cylinder Auxiliary Bored Deadbolt Lock



Cylinder Bored Spring Bolt and Deadbolt Lockset

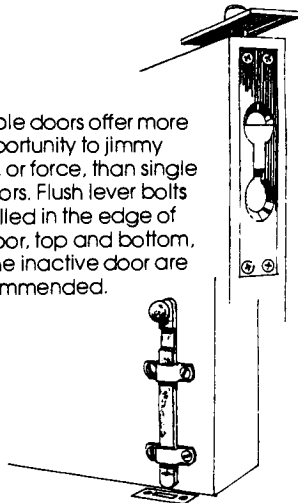
Spring bolt locks like the above can usually be opened by even an inexperienced burglar. A credit card or other simple shim is all that's needed to push back the lock bolt.

Deadbolt locks like those on the right are recommended. The bolt should extend at least one inch beyond the door edge.

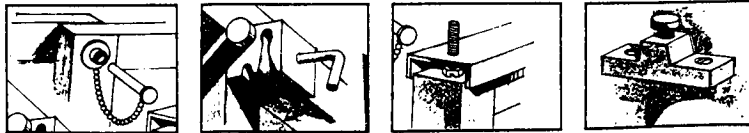


Single Cylinder Rim Deadbolt Lock

Double doors offer more opportunity to jimmy open, or force, than single doors. Flush lever bolts installed in the edge of the door, top and bottom, of the inactive door are recommended.

On patio door, tighten adjustment screws to prevent lifting door out of channel. Numerous locking devices are available for sliding windows and doors. Those operated by keys are also effective.

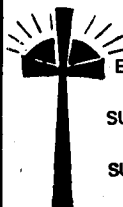
