FROM THE PRESIDENT

I am pleased to announce that we have a new Director , Lance Curtis, who will be looking after the Fun Fair this year. Many of last years Fun Fair Directors will be returning this year but there are still a few vacancies. This is our main fund raising activity with all the profits distributed to the participating community groups. If you are interested in helping please give Lance a call at 830-7616.

In March we will be looking for nominations for new directors, President etc. for the BCA. If you are interested in any of the positions please contact me or any member of the executive.

The City of Gloucester has again passed a bylaw to prohibit dogs from City Parks. This restriction was originally passed in 1984 and then set aside for about 6 months in 1993. At our last meeting two residents approached the executive asking the BCA to see if we would approach the City and ask them to ease the restriction in some of the parks or parts of the parks to permit dog walking. The executive decided to let the City know that there was some interest in this in our community and to discuss it further with the community.

Anyone who has lived in the Hamlet through one winter and walked through a park in the in the Spring will realize that the bylaw certainly didn't work. There was a considerable amount of brown stuff along the pathways of the parks. Putting the bylaw back into place will not change this as irresponsible dog owners will ignore it. I doubt that greatly increased enforcement will change this. Only the attitudes of the pet owners will change this. Dogs should be on a leash, in control, and the owners must pick up after them, anything else is irresponsible and unacceptable. This applies to parks and sidewalks. If you won't or can't pick up after your pet keep them at home.

On the other hand there are many responsible pet owners in the Hamlet who will pick up after their dogs. It is this group of people who are being penalized by the actions of the others. Some of these people are longtime residents of the Hamlet who have raised their families here and now enjoy a bit of fresh air and exercise with their pet.

Where do I stand on this issue? I'd like to see pets kept away from playgrounds and play structures in the parks. I would like to see the pathways opened up to dog walking, on a leash, to people who pick up after their dogs. I have several reasons for supporting this. I feel that it is important to get people out and about in the community. People walking their dogs through the woods will notice strangers and make it harder to sneak about to break and enter or commit other crimes. Fresh air and exercise is important and as we have a wonderful park system we should enjoy it. I feel responsible people, who pay taxes, should not lose the rights to enjoyment of the parks do to other's irresponsible actions. Lastly, the restrictive bylaw doesn't work. We need to educate people and convince them to be responsible.

I expect I'll probably get more phone calls on this than I did about bingo. I am interested in and appreciate your comments, my name and number is below.

Community Input

A presentation on Nevada fund raising was made by Blackburn Scouts. The directors agreed in principle to the process but would need the full details on the legal arrangement before committing to it. This information will be provided.

Scouts also asked for support to assist them in obtaining access to a Bingo. Decision on this was delayed until discussions could be held with other groups to confirm community interest. They also asked for the BCA to take an active part in organizing bottle drives. The BCA had recently started a section in the BANAR to show upcoming fundraising activities.

Mr Stevens and Mr Ables addressed the meeting to discuss the recent ban on dogs in Blackburns parks. This was the reintroduction of an eight year ban on dogs in the parks. They were concerned that the ban was unfair to dog owners and limited their opportunities for exercise. They requested the BCA to help them develop a compromise arrangement that would satisfy both dog owners and those who wanted dogs out of the parks. The Directors discussed this and decided to approach the City and advise them that there was a concern and that the BCA was going to confirm if there was an interest in in the community of working out a local solution. They also offered Mr Stevens space in the BANAR to advertise a meeting of interested parties to discuss the bylaw and recommended changes.

Reiner Bloess addressed the Directors to discuss the proposed new Regional election boundary for Blackburn. The region accepted the recommendations proposed by many in the community and we are now to be part of a larger urban area and not the large rural area as originally proposed.

City Of Gloucester

Marjorie Milloy advised the Directors that she will no longer be our contact with City Parks and Recreation as she will be working with other groups. Our new contact will be Ghislaine Bradour. On behalf of the BCA Steve thanked he for her help over the years.

Directors reports

Neil Morris confirmed that he and Renata had looked into recovering the GST and it looks like we will be able to get back \$767 from 1991. The other years have not yet been calculated.

Lance Curtis discussed progress with the Fun Fair. He has many of the directors in place but is still looking for a few key positions.

Proposed Bingo Hall - Innes Road - Update

In my report to you in the May, 1993 BANAR, I discussed the circumstances surrounding the controversial approval by City Council of a zoning change to the property on the corner of Innes Road and Beddoe Lane. The change which Council approved allows an additional use for the already existing commercial zoning of the property which would permit the operation of a bingo hall. Residents in the immediate area of the site and City Planning Department staff had recommended that Council turn down the application, on the grounds that it was incompatible with the neighbourhood. However, the support of the B.C.A. and local businesses, plus the fact that Innes Road is the commercial core of Blackburn, persuaded a majority of Council members that the plan had merit.

Following the passage of the zoning bylaw, objections were made by some residents to the Ontario Municipal Board and a hearing was held last summer. An O.M.B. hearing is a semi-judicial process which brings an objective arbitrator into a zoning dispute. Both sides are invited to present their arguments and the Board's ultimate ruling is based primarily on whether or not the proposed change constitutes "sound planning." In this case, the Board approved the zoning change, noting in its report that Innes Road is designated as a regional arterial road with commercial zoning already in place. It took into account as well the fact that bingos have traditionally been conducted in a variety of locations (i.e. church basements and community halls) and have "consistently been viewed as being compatible with residential uses," attracting as they do a clientele who tend to cause little disruption to the community. The Board's approval was conditional, however, on the development of an appropriate site plan which would, in essence, set the project apart from its residential neighbours.

Following approval of an acceptable site plan, a licence would be required before a permanent bingo hall could be opened on the site. As of October 27, 1993, the provincial government has handed over the responsibility for issuing such licences to municipal councils, after providing them with fairly specific and stringent guidelines. The City Clerk's office is currently finalizing the details of what will be Gloucester's own process for the consideration of applications. A full public review process will be implemented, with City Council having the final say on where any future bingo operations will be opened in Gloucester.

Should the Blackburn location meet all of the criteria and receive a licence, (and at this point this is still uncertain, I would hope that those opposed to the project would accept graciously what they will no doubt perceive as a loss or defeat. Although in today's society, the particular needs or wishes of a special interest group are often given priority by the majority, sometimes they are not and the "common good" prevails. While I did not agree with the position that Council took in approving this zoning change, I do not believe that it was wrongly motivated. Rather than condemn our entire system because it does not always meet our expectations, we should take heart in the fact that an open and democratic process exists whereby we are guaranteed a fair hearing and consideration of our views before decisions are made.

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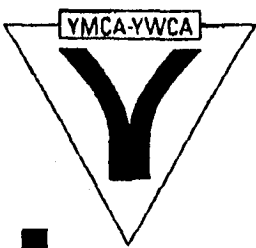

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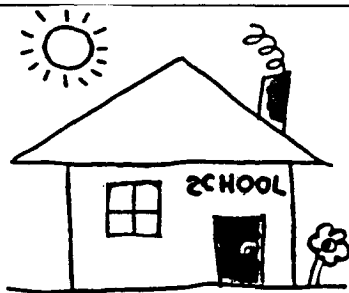

January's activities at the Preschool dealt with snow and winter themes. Special activities included trips to the Museum of Nature for a program on birds and to the Aviation Museum for a film on "the big blue balloon."

Registration is now beginning in February for the 1994-95 school year. If you are interested in obtaining information about the Preschool or wish to register a child, an appointment must be made to view the school and receive registration forms. Our Registrar, Betty Smith, will be happy to schedule appointments. She can be reached at 824-7834.

Blackburn Hamlet Preschool offers half-day programs, mornings or afternoons, two or three days per week. The school has a dedicated staff of Early Childhood Education teachers and a sound reputation for providing a challenging program in a caring environment to children aged 2 1/2 to 5 years. The program is fully integrated to give individual attention to children with special needs. As the program is co-operative, parents are encouraged to become involved in the operation of the school by acting on special committees and the school executive, and through duty days where the parent may participate in the daily routines.

The basic program is divided into four phases.

Free play The children may move freely between two main activity rooms -- the art room (craft, puzzles, water play etc.) and the large muscle room (climbing apparatus, house-keeping centre etc.).

Snack The children gather for a nutritious snack and drink provided by the duty parents.

Circle The children separate into three activity groups for singing, stories and discussion.

Outside play One-half hour of fresh air and outside activity is included before the children go home.

Urinary Incontinence — More Common Than You Think

Urinary incontinence, the uncontrollable loss of urine, affects over 10 million North Americans. Only 1 out of 12 people with urinary incontinence seek help, often because of embarrassment or because they don't realize help is available. Urinary incontinence should not be viewed as a result of "getting older"; the source of the problem should be looked for and corrected.

There are three different typical patterns of incontinence: stress, overflow, and urge incontinence. People with stress incontinence often leak urine when they cough, laugh, or sneeze. They go to the bathroom more often to prevent accidents. Those with overflow incontinence urinate small amounts and do not feel completely empty afterward. They get up frequently during the night to urinate and have a dribbling stream with no force. People with urge incontinence wet themselves if they don't get to the bathroom immediately. They may wet the bed at night. They go to the bathroom frequently during the night and at least every two hours during the day.

The diagnosis of the type of incontinence (or combination of types) that is present is based on a thorough medical history and physical exam. The physical exam will include a rectal and pelvic (or "internal") exam, and neurologic examination. A review of all regular medication, both prescription and over-the-counter, is also important. A urine analysis will also be done. Other diagnostic tests may also be used.

Treatment of incontinence will depend on the type of incontinence that is present. Treatment may be as simple as Kegel exercises, to improve the strength of the pelvic muscles, or bladder retraining exercises. Often medication or hormone replacement is useful. In some cases surgery is indicated. The important point is that most cases of urinary incontinence are treatable.

If you have a problem with urinary incontinence be sure to ask your family doctor for help. It is a common, treatable problem. With proper treatment, you should soon be able to travel, socialize, exercise, sleep, and laugh without concern for urinary accidents.

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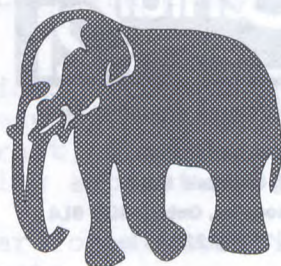
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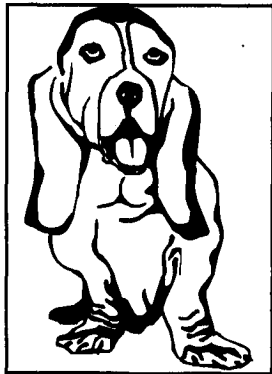

Dog Owners Unite!



Several Blackburn Hamlet dog owners are meeting to form a dog club. The inaugural meeting will be at the Public Library on Tuesday, February 15 at 7:00 p.m.

The purpose of forming the club is two-fold: to assist dog owners in training their canine friends, creating a relationship that will be enjoyable for both; and to lobby with Gloucester city council to change the present by-law restricting dogs from all parks.

Almost all dog owners are very responsible citizens. Most have been diligent in picking up after pets. To punish the majority on behalf of the few is not just. There must be a more adult, reasonable solution to the problem. We need to discuss some of these options before coming up with by-laws that create discord within the community.

The present by-law, as it stands, has created a situation where many have been forced to practice civil disobedience and break the law every day by continuing to walk their dogs in city parks.

Gloucester has problems far greater than dogs in parks. We need to spend our tax dollars on far more important items than erecting expensive signs in parks and by-law enforcement against well-intentioned citizens, particularly when other, no-cost options have not been considered.

By training the dog owner and the dog, the club hopes to create an environment in Blackburn Hamlet that will allow humans and beasts to co-exist.

There are always those who try to destroy another person's freedom through legislation when they can not tolerate another's behaviour. There will always be those among us who have no affection for dogs. It is hoped the dog club will improve relationships among Hamlet residents by helping dog owners be more responsible through cooperation.

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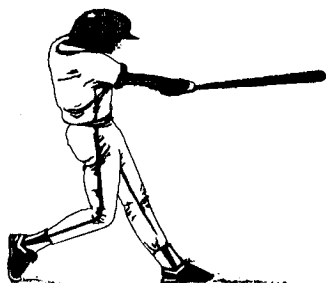

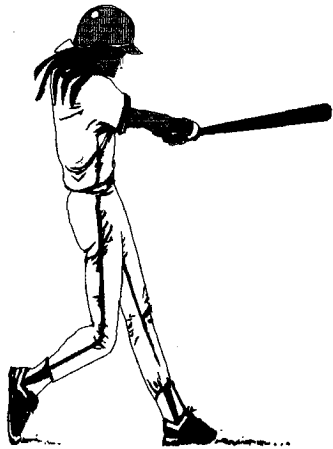

Past Glimpses

Hamlet Facts and Figures: Part I - The Hamlet Gets Smaller

In this and next month's columns, I use 1991 census data to update the May, 1993 *Past Glimpses*, where I gave a demographic overview of Blackburn Hamlet.

The population of Blackburn Hamlet continues to shrink. In 1986, the census population of the Hamlet was 9,674 a drop of 300 from the 1981 census. The 1991 census shows that the population has decreased a further 100 to 9,574. What makes this population drop more striking is that the number of occupied dwellings in the Hamlet has in fact *increased*, 4% since 1986 from 2,874 to 3,020. A closer look at the census figures reveals that the decline in population is not uniformly spread across the Hamlet. Rather, the drop in population is restricted to the residential area North of Innes Road, where the population has declined just over 6% since 1986. The area South of Innes Road, on the other hand, is where most of the increase in occupied dwellings took place. In this area of the Hamlet the population actually increased 8% (Not enough however to offset the loss of residents from the North side of the Hamlet).

A closer look at the figures reveals a demographic restructuring of the Hamlet. As would be expected by the increase in the number of occupied dwellings in 1991, the number of census families also increased (from 2,585 to 2,665). If circumstances were the same as when the Hamlet first developed in the late 1960s, one would expect an increase in the population; however, families have actually decreased in size. This fact is clearly illustrated by the census figures. In 1986, 51% of Blackburn Hamlet families consisted of 4 or more persons. In 1991, this number was down to 41%. It's interesting to note that this reduction occurred almost completely on the North side of Innes Road. There are several likely explanations for the drop in family size, including: 1) In 1986, Blackburn Hamlet (as a suburban residential development) was about 19 years old. The children of the established residents of the Hamlet would, by then, have been older children or young teens still living at home. These children have now become old enough to move away from home, thus reducing existing family sizes, 2) the new families moving into the Hamlet are coming in with smaller families than were the norm in the 1960s and '70s, 3) the number of lone parent families living in the Hamlet has increased by almost 50% in 1991, from 260 to 385.

As suggested by these population figures, not only are the numbers of persons and sizes of families in the Hamlet changing, but so is the age profile of the community. This is the subject of next month's column.

OWNING A HOME - THE INVESTMENT OF A LIFETIME

If you expect to become wealthy from bank savings, dream on! The effects of inflation and income taxes sabotage any potential real growth in the common savings account. Real estate, on the other hand, provides a good opportunity to accumulate wealth for the future. Almost everything else you buy today - automobiles, appliances, furniture - starts to depreciate once you buy it. But real estate has historically outperformed the rate of inflation. Sure, during bad economic times, house prices may fluctuate. But most well-located properties will appreciate in value over the long term. And even though the house you find today may seem to have an outlandish price tag, the cost will likely be much higher in the future. You've heard it before: "I could have bought this house 10 years ago for half what it costs now." Where investment in real estate is concerned, it's never too late.

For most people, owning their own home is the single biggest investment of a lifetime. For many retirees, a paid-off home can mean a comfortable retirement. In Canada and the U.S., 63 per cent and 64 per cent of all households (respectively) own their own home (according to the 1991 Canada Census and 1987 American Housing Survey). And with today's low mortgage rates, more and more home buyers are seizing the opportunity to enter the housing market.

Advantages of Owning a Home

For starters, owning your own home is a sound investment. Your property will most likely increase in value and you will be able to sell it for a profit. Your equity (the cash difference between the market value of your home and the amount you still owe on your mortgage) will grow, as the value of your home grows, thus making owning a home a steady and secure investment for you.

Buying a Second Home

At some point, you may decide to buy a second house to provide you with supplemental income. An income-producing property has many advantages, especially if you only have a small amount of money to invest. Generally, your cash will always be returned from real estate even though you may have to wait for the right time to sell. As a result, your capital is at little risk.

Moreover, your property will provide you with rental income, and your equity will appreciate at a rate that has almost always outpaced inflation over the past 50 years. But accumulating wealth starts with the purchase of your first home - which can mean a small house, condo or townhouse.

You may be at that stage now where you've already been living in your first home for a couple of years and are thinking about what to do next. To realize a substantial real profit, your property should be allowed to appreciate over a number of years. So you may want to rent out your house - which will provide you with a second income as well as tax relief - and buy another house to move into and begin upgrading. After a few years, you can rent out that house and buy another one until you reach your goal of, say, half a million dollars in equity - or an amount on which you can happily retire. Remember, home ownership doesn't necessarily mean owning your dream home right off the bat. Starting with a smaller home will help build equity and eventually provide you with the financial clout needed to trade up to a bigger home.

Real estate also offers you greater control than you have with other forms of investment, such as stocks, commodities and precious metals, which are all susceptible to drastic price fluctuations.

Unique stock market events, such as "Black Monday" (Oct. 19, 1987 when the market crashed 508 points in one session) have helped accentuate the value of home ownership.

In real estate, not only do you profit from your own savings but also from the borrowed money of others. Without leverage (the use of financing to allow a small amount of cash to purchase a large property investment), it is difficult to earn a reasonable return on your investment (not that many people can afford to buy a home today without the assistance of borrowed money).
