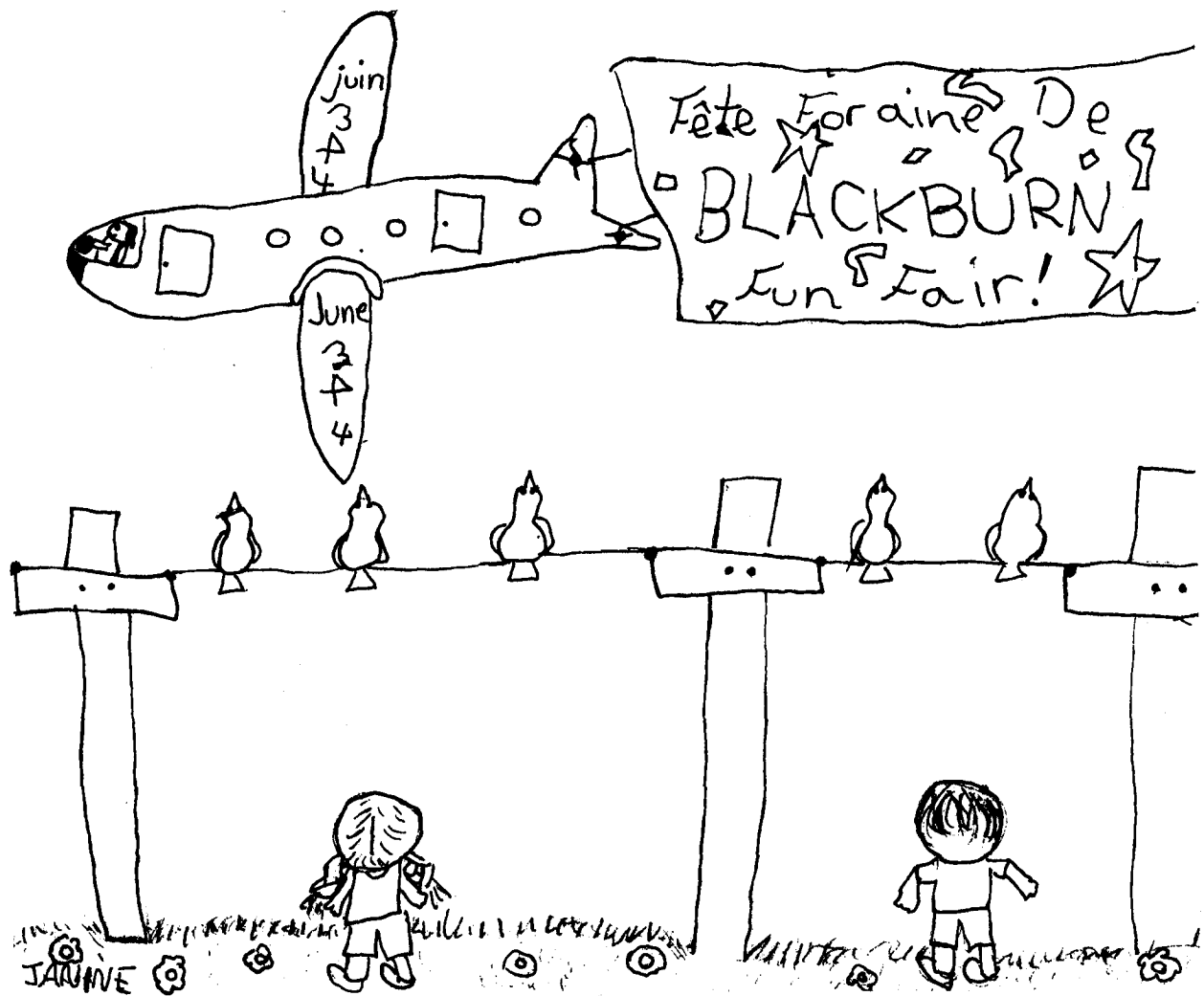

Your Councillor's Report

A Point of Clarification

For thirteen years, The Leader relayed City notices and information to Gloucester residents and highlighted local news, consistently promoting our many community groups, volunteers, and achievers. Over the years, it became recognized and respected as the reliable and accurate source of information about Gloucester, focussing as it did on local events and concerns. In many homes, issues were set aside and kept for reference. It was non-political and non-partisan, untainted by the journalistic "creativity" and selectivity which twists, slants and edits much of the information we receive in other publications. It was also a locally produced publication, distinctive in appearance, and differing in content from the countless flyers and unsolicited pieces of "junk" mail which exist primarily to advertise and which crowd our mailboxes one day and our recycling boxes the next.

Following the last election, however, some members of Council pushed for a competitive bid process for the City communication vehicle contract. As a result of this exercise, last summer, staff recommended approval of a contract to the lowest bidder, Ottawa News Publishing Company Ltd. The entire process fell through however when it was discovered that the bid submitted by Ottawa News contained several mathematical errors which brought the bid's credibility into question. The City then signed on to put "City Pages" in the Orléans Star until a second tendering process could be completed.




Gloucester

On April 12 of this year, following a second tendering process and the evaluation by City staff of the two bids submitted, staff once again recommended to Council the approval of a two year contract with Ottawa News to produce a communication vehicle for Gloucester. Gloucester City Council rejected (by a vote of 6 to 3) this recommendation. A decision on whether to negotiate with the only other (and higher priced) candidate, The Leader, was deferred to April 26. On April 26, however, responding to public pressure and negative press, Council reversed its earlier decision (coincidentally by a 6 to 3 vote) and awarded the contract to the lower bidder, Ottawa News.

In the interim, when it appeared that a deal would be struck with the Leader, some expressed opposition to my support for this bid. Since it was higher than the Ottawa News bid, the feeling was that there could be no possible justification for rejecting the rock bottom, deep discount submission. Indeed, the implication was that loyalty to Mrs. Lois Kemp, the producer of the Leader, was behind my vote. In fact, any loyalty I felt was loyalty to The Leader itself, a proven, quality product, and what it has come to represent to our residents.

I have felt all along that the type of product being offered by Ottawa News, a newspaper/flyer type of format, was not good value even at the low price suggested. As consumers, surely we all realize that choosing the cheapest product is not always the best course of action. I am alarmed that representatives of the Gloucester Chamber of Commerce, of all people, demonstrated a total lack of support for local businesses. Can The Star survive with a competitor essentially the same as it? Perhaps the Chamber of Commerce has the answer.

In any case, the decision has been made, and we will all have the opportunity to assess whether or not it was the right one in the months ahead. I believe that The Leader had value as a unifying force within our city and an important part of our city's history and its public image. I cannot help but feel that something special has been lost to Gloucester with its demise.

ATTENTION ALL BCA MEMBERS THE BANAR IS CHANGING!!

The BCA currently prints and delivers nine issues of the BANAR to all residents of Blackburn Hamlet. Publication of the BANAR is the single biggest expense incurred by the BCA. Historically, BCA membership income has been insufficient to cover BANAR costs; the rest of the money has come from interest income drawn from the Association's reserve funds. With current low interest rates, however, this income is no longer enough to meet the shortfall. Furthermore, advertising in the BANAR barely covers printing costs at the current rates. Indeed, if all paid advertising were eliminated, the net cost of producing the BANAR would be about the same. In order to improve the economy of the BANAR, the Association is proposing the following changes.

1. Reduce the number of issues to 5.

2. Increase commercial advertising costs by 50%.
3. Keep the size of the BANAR to a maximum of 24 pages.
4. Reduce delivery payment to \$100.00.

Production of the BANAR is going to be reduced immediately. The Summer BANAR which normally comes out in July will not be produced. The BANAR is an important communication mechanism for the community and your input into this process is essential. If you wish to comment on the above plan or make suggestions, bring them forward at the next meeting of the BCA, or call Michael Martin, Publicity Director at 830-5530.

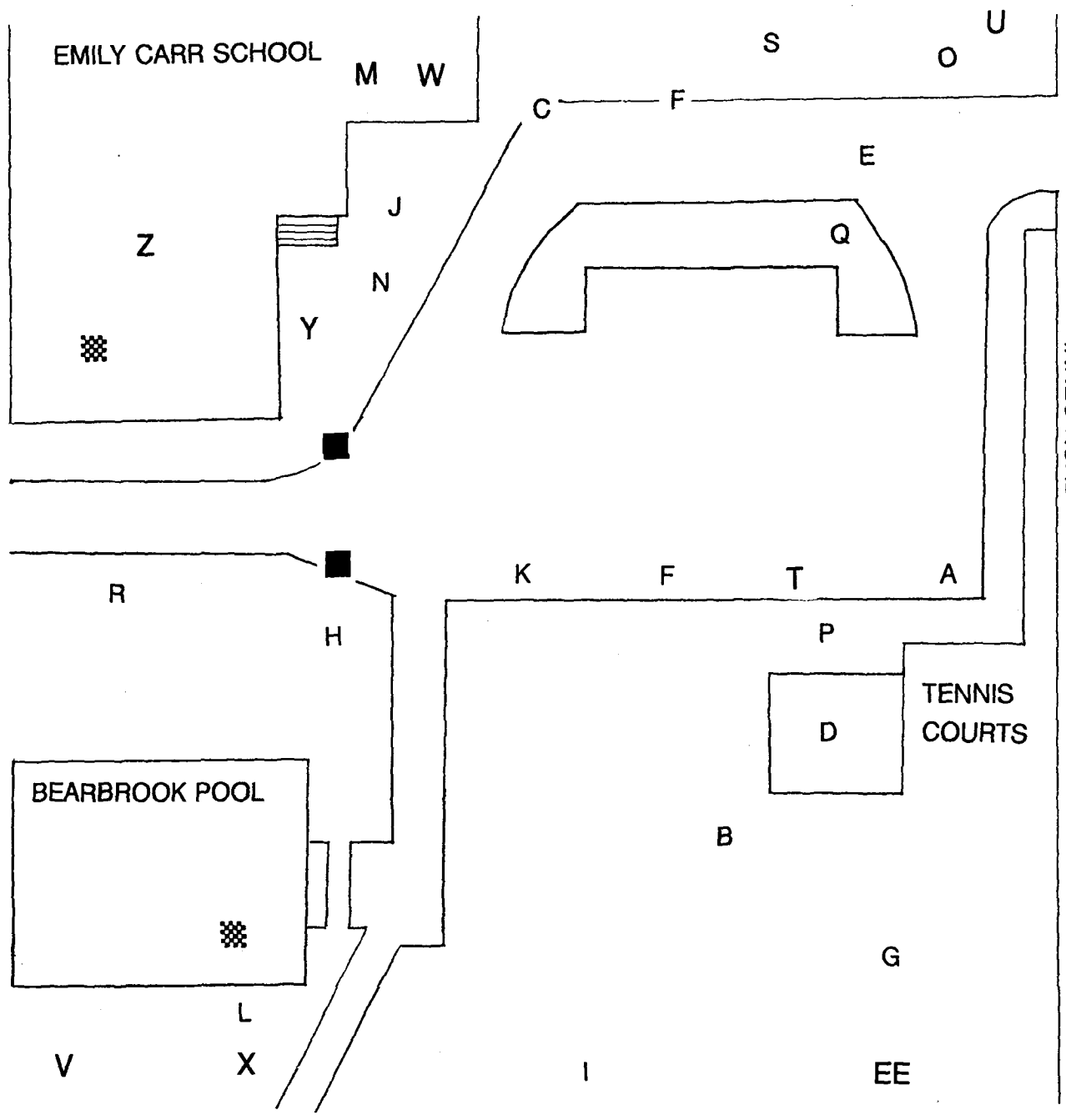

The parade will start at 6:30 p.m. and proceed down Bearbrook Road to Innes Road, then east along Innes to Emily Carr School and Bearbrook Park.

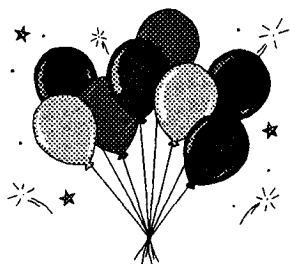
