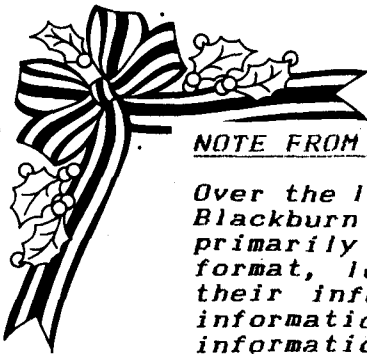

The directors are awaiting your call or the BCA Information Line is available to leave your ideas and telephone number. The BCA has the financial capability and the commitment to offer more. We need volunteers.

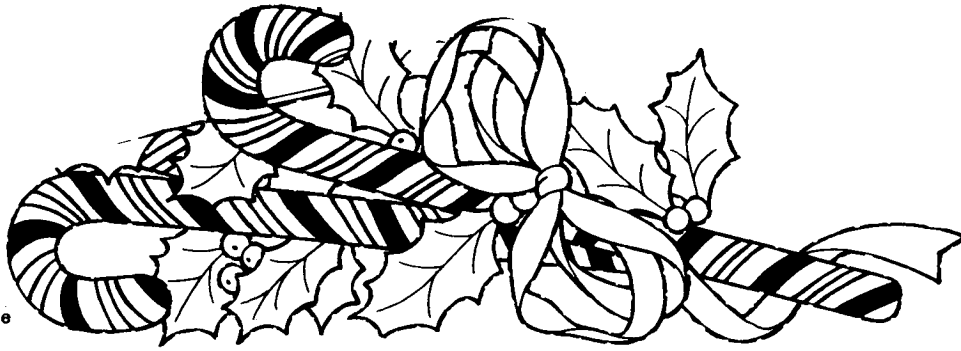


NOTE FROM THE EDITOR

**BLACKBURN COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION
MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 15, 1994**

RESOLUTION re: Greenbelt and other Federal urban land holdings:

WHEREAS the community of Blackburn Hamlet (Gloucester, Ontario) has reached its optimum size; and

WHEREAS the undeveloped lands around Blackburn Hamlet such as the Greenbelt (including Greens Creek Valley, the buffer between the bypass and the Hamlet) and the LETE property contribute to the definition and distinctness of the community as well as contributing to the quality of life of the residents of the community;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that no public lands around Blackburn Hamlet be disposed of or rezoned without full public consultation with the residents of the Hamlet and the Blackburn Community Association;

FURTHER, BE IT RESOLVED that the National Capital Commission make a complete disclosure of its intentions for the future of these lands under its jurisdiction;

FURTHERMORE, BE IT RESOLVED that our Member of Parliament clearly enunciate his position on the future of the federal land holdings around Blackburn Hamlet.

CIVIC AFFAIRS UPDATE

As most of you are aware, the **BCA** hosted an All-Candidates Meeting on November 2, 1994, at Glen Ogilvie School. The meeting presented candidates for regional chair, regional council, Gloucester mayor and Gloucester council.

As usual, residents of Blackburn Hamlet expressed their interest in their community by showing up in record numbers to question the candidates and to discuss the issues. Estimates of the attendance (based on seats and standing room) are that approximately 250 people came to rate the candidates. This was one of the best attended All-Candidates meetings in the region.

Numerous concerns were raised by the audience, including the protection of the Greenbelt and other green space around the Hamlet, commitment to the arts in terms of funding for an Arts facility, programs and services for youth in Blackburn Hamlet and the role of volunteers in the community.

The protection of the **Greenbelt** is an ongoing concern for residents of the Hamlet. A resident from Orient Park addressed this issue at the September meeting of the **BCA**. Our Association responded by unanimously passing a resolution to ensure full public consultation and consideration of community interests. This resolution has now been shared with the various political levels, including the Chair of the National Capital Commission and the federal ministers responsible for the properties in question. We will keep you posted of events as they unfold in this area.

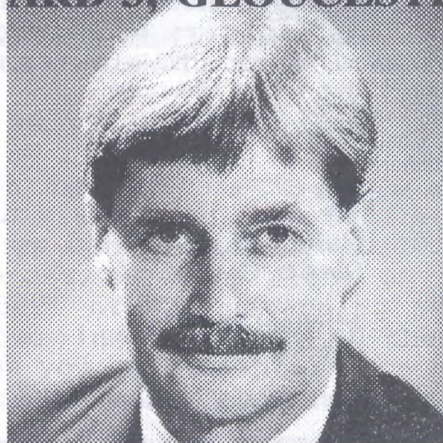

Information Gloucester is frequently asked about child care services. There are many different services available in Gloucester.

Playgroups offer an opportunity for toddlers and parents to meet with others in a half-day per week program. Playgroups are held throughout Gloucester.

The Childrens' Welcome Centre is a drop-in childcare service for ages two to five. Children may be left at the centre for up to three hours up to three times per week. Parents are invited to take part as volunteers, there is always a parent volunteer present along with staff.

Nursery schools have two or three half-day per week programs for ages two and a half to five. Children are usually registered in monthly sessions. Some nursery schools are run co-operatively with parent involvement.

Daycare centres offer full-time childcare. Some centres accept children from three months, others from eighteen months or two years.

There are half-day child care programs available in some schools and daycare centres for kindergarten students.

The City of Gloucester offers an After Four Program in some local schools and at the Orleans Recreation Complex.

Gloucester Child Care Services offer several programs. The Community Outreach Branch runs drop-ins, workshops, toy lending and a resource library. Early Childhood Educators are available to provide information on child development, nutrition and play activities.

The Home Childcare Branch provides childcare in an approved family environment. The Child Care Centres Branch operates two daycare centres in Gloucester for ages three months to ten years.

RECREATION AND PARKS BOARD

VICE-CHAIRMAN - NORM OVENDEN (837-0922)

Volunteers and local councillors on the Blackburn Hamlet Recreation and Parks Board meet monthly to discuss leisure activities and facilities for the neighbourhood. They are responsible for ordering minor capital works in local parks, the maintenance of ball diamonds and outdoor skating rinks. Some special projects completed in 1994 include the new basketball court at Orient Park, installing a basketball hoop at Ecole Sainte-Marie and putting up a storage box at the Tauvette fields.

The 12 parks within Blackburn provide varied uses ranging from tennis and swimming to play swings and slides. Tauvette Park and the Hornet fields are on lands leased from the NCC.

The 1.64 mill rate will remain constant in 1995, but a downward revision of the tax base means revenues for the board's operating budget will drop to \$36,640 from \$38,865 in 1994. The bulk of the spending next year will go to rink maintenance and monitors (\$22,000), ball diamond grooming (\$9,225), and minor capital items (\$3,915) like basketball hoops and children's park structures.

At the end of 1993, the board had reserves of \$115,000. As a result of council-approved changes encouraged by the Recreation, Parks and Culture staff, the local volunteer board lost control over the use of much of those reserves. That money must be used for major park completions before city tax funds will be allocated to Blackburn. There is an undetermined amount of money left in the reserves. Residents with ideas for projects can contact Peter Brown, the city's manager of community services.

Under Gloucester's new leisure delivery system, a park redevelopment plan is to be prepared in Blackburn to guide development for the next five to 10 years. The volunteer board is to work with city staff to undertake this study. Local residents will be surveyed early next year. This is your chance to have a say on the future shape of our green space.

Following the November election, a new slate of volunteers will be appointed. Please contact retiring chair Alan MacEwen at 837-5399 or city liaison officer Diane Emerson at 748-4238 if you want to get involved.

The city and the Blackburn Community Association have a role in providing recreation programs in the community. Feel free to pass on your ideas for new programs.





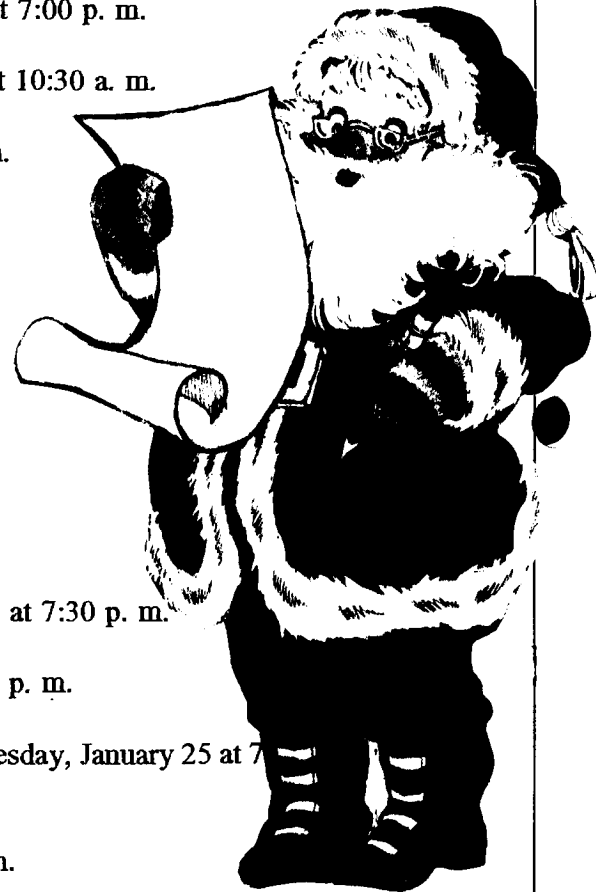

Dear Editor,

The Children's Aid Society of Ottawa-Carleton is seeking your assistance to promote the important role foster parents play within our community. Every year, more than 300 foster parents provide care for children and teenagers. These are young people who have to be separated from their own families, either on a temporary or permanent basis.

In addition, we desperately need more foster parents who can provide care on a part-time or full-time basis, or in emergency or respite situations.



Foster Families Play Key Role in Caring for Children in Need

Feeding, clothing, nurturing, loving and educating children is a natural duty of parents -- or so most of us think. But have you ever stopped to wonder about the children in your community who do not have the luxury of counting on a safe, loving, stable home, with families who ensure these basic needs?

In the Ottawa-Carleton area alone, more than 300 foster families work with the Children's Aid Society to provide care for children whose parents are unable to supply the basic necessities of life for their own children -- who may range in age from newborns to 16 years of age.

With the increasing number of single-parent families, and with child poverty, unemployment, family violence and sexual, physical and emotional abuse on the rise, the need for foster families is growing daily. This year alone, the Ottawa-Carleton Children's Aid Society looked after 1300 foster children and youth, 300 of whom were in foster care.

"Every child deserves the chance to live in a safe, secure home," says Janet Smith, who, with her husband Martin, has cared for 27 foster children in the last eight years. "We started fostering back in 1986, and it's been one of the most rewarding experiences of our lives."

While most foster families just add fostering to their lives, for the Smiths and many other foster parents (who may be single parents or couples with or without children), fostering becomes a way of life. "It's made us better parents to our own children," Smith adds.

"Often, the most difficult children are the most rewarding," says Smith. "The repayment of being a foster parent is watching a child grow and blossom." This can mean seeing a child who is withdrawn and suspicious become cuddly, warm, open and loving; watching a child develop verbal, manual or learning skills; or seeing a child learn the ability to interact with others.

The Children's Aid Society and foster families work in partnership with the foster children's natural parents, when possible. Sometimes, the foster parent provides services on a part-time or relief basis, such as on weekends or a few hours a week, to give a much-needed break to the natural parents.

More often, though, foster parents take children into their homes for periods ranging from a few weeks or months to several years, with some even adopting the children on a permanent basis.

Foster parents may be relatives or friends, or they may be strangers -- but, whatever their relationship to the children in their care, they undergo careful screening by the Society to ensure that they are as closely matched as possible to the child's needs.

Prospective foster parents receive intensive assessment by Children's Aid Society workers regarding their backgrounds, education and lifestyles; their parenting and problem-solving skills; and how they respond to stress. They learn about acceptable and unacceptable parenting practices. They also receive ongoing training, education, and support -- through regular meetings with Society workers and other foster parents who provide invaluable assistance.

When the fostering period ends, says Janet Smith, "it's sad to say goodbye, but just knowing that you've made a difference in a child's life, and that you've given him a structure he can take with him for the rest of his life, helps ease the pain."

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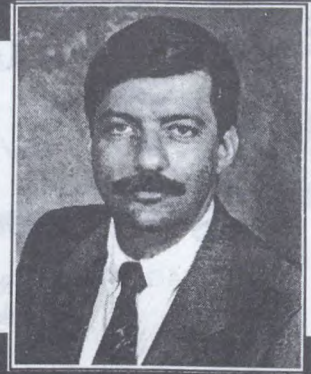
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GLOUCESTER CHILD CARE SERVICES CELEBRATES TWENTY YEARS OF SERVICE

Gloucester Child Care Services, a non-profit organization, governed by a volunteer Board of Directors, began in 1974 as Gloucester Family Day Care.

In the beginning, there were four staff serving 20 children in twelve private homes. Over the years, the home child care section has expanded to three office locations, Gloucester North, Gloucester South and Cumberland, with 27 staff, 554 children and 250 child care homes.

In addition, the organization has expanded to include three child care centres, Heritage Child Care Centre on St. Joseph Blvd., Elizabeth Park Child Care Centre on the Uplands Air Base, and Rideau Valley Child Care Centre in Manotick on Rideau Valley Drive N. In total, there are 150 children attending these centres.

A Community Outreach program is also provided to the community as a part of Gloucester Child Care Services. Through this program, parents and providers are able to access morning drop-ins, a toy lending library, a special needs library, well-baby clinics, workshops focused on

child care issues and information on topics of interest to these groups.

A 20th anniversary celebration is planned for October 1st and will be a time for the community to come together to celebrate our roots. A cordial invitation is extended to the community, particularly parents, children and providers who have, at some time, been a part of Gloucester Child Care Services.

Celebrations are also planned by both Heritage and Elizabeth Park Child Care Centres during this 20th anniversary year, with their own 5 year celebrations, as they became part of Gloucester Child Care Services in 1989.

As an exciting event during the 20th anniversary year, a new school age program will be opening in the fall in Forest Valley Elementary School (formerly Chapel Hill Elementary School) to serve kindergarten and school age children.

Members of the Executive and numerous Block Captains have moved away over the years; therefore we need new recruits. I hope that you are able to assist.

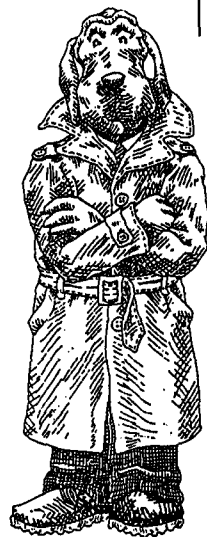

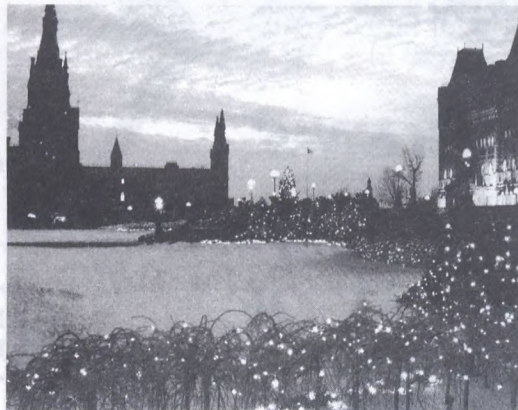

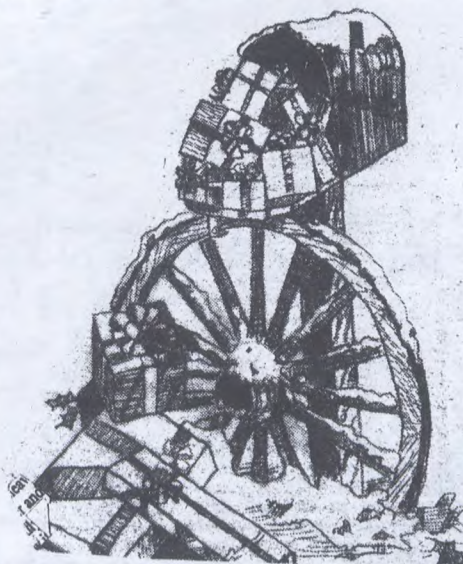
