## Creamy Chicken with Mushrooms

- 2 tablespoons of margarine or butter
- 1 1/2 cups of sliced mushrooms
- 1 clove of garlic
- 1/2 cup of milk
- 1/8 teaspoon of pepper
- 4 skinless, boneless, chicken breasts
- 1 small onion, sliced and separated into rings
- 1 can of mushroom soup
- 2 tablespoons of sherry

*Fry chicken in margarine or butter for 10 minutes. Remove chicken from pan and then saute mushrooms and onions with smashed garlic clove. Place chicken and sauteed ingredients in a casserole, add soup, milk, sherry and pepper. Bake in oven for 30-45 minutes at 350°F. Serve over hot cooked noodles. Serves four.*

# Gloucester's New City Hall

In a unanimous vote at a June 15 Council Meeting, Members of Council agreed to purchase the Queensway Corporate Centre, 1595 Telesat Court, as the permanent home of Gloucester's City Hall.

This represents the culmination of a long process and the fulfilment of a promise which Members of Council and I made to you, our residents and taxpayers, three years ago. An exhaustive decision-making process began in 1991, with a promise to ratepayers to review and reduce the costs of the accommodation costs of City Hall. A Committee explored all options available, consulted with the public and the business community, and decided that this purchase would provide the highest level of annual budget savings of all options. Upon occupancy, in the fall of 1996, we will be saving approximately \$1.6 million. In addition, beginning in 2001, the ongoing annual savings will be

as high as \$1.4 million. Rental income from the building will more than cover the building's operating costs until we move in.

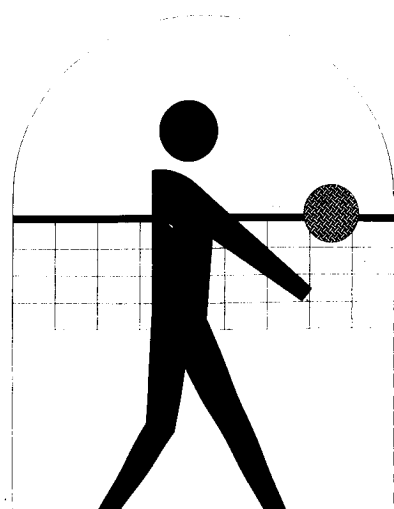
Built in 1989, and strategically located in the City Centre, along the Queensway corridor and near the Transitway, the new City Hall site will promote continued future development in the City Centre area. The eight storey class "A" office building is barrier-free and provides easy access for all Gloucester residents. The total site area of 8.12 acres provides enough land to build Gloucester's future Arts Centre.

Because of prudent financial planning, we are able to pay cash for the building. \$3,160,000 of the \$6.6 million purchase price will come from the City Hall Reserve Fund and New Capital Initiatives Reserve Fund, with the remainder being self-financed from three of the City's other reserve funds.

Savings in occupancy costs will permit replenishment of these funds in 5.5 years.

Gloucester's new City Hall will be a "people place", a distinctive location for our administration, Council Chambers, meeting space for City Boards and Committees, as well as a ground floor and storefront location for Gloucester's innovative Information and Service Centre -- the one-stop-shop for all City information and service.

Finally, it will be a unique and clear identity for Gloucester's citizens and business community, a place we can call "home". This is a very exciting time for our City. I wish to extend my personal gratitude to all of you who have written or called in about the purchase. The over-whelming positive responses are a signal that we've made the right choice. Please feel free to contact me at any time.

# Councillor's Report

At the time of writing, the summer is rapidly passing on. I hope that your vacations have been both pleasant and safe.

In the meantime, a number of issues have run their course with satisfactory outcomes for our community.

The primary issue which at this stage is favourable to Blackburn Hamlet concerns the NCC and the Greenbelt. Details on the NCC's response are being reported by Sue Sheridan in this edition of the BANAR.

I do wish to say, however, that the NCC in retrospect conducted its public consultations in an open-minded fashion.

In spite of public misgivings about the process and suspicions about foregone conclusions, the results indicate that the NCC was receptive to our concerns and to our inputs.

As one neighbour stated at the public forum in the Hamlet, "the proof is in the pudding," and the response by the NCC would

indicate they were listening to the residents of Blackburn Hamlet.

I believe that the Chairman of the NCC, Marcel Beaudry, and his primary emissary in the public consultations, Richard Scott, deserve credit for their efforts to restore our faith in their institution.

Another item which is favourable for our ratepayers, in spite of some initial public and media cynicism, is the recent acquisition of a new city hall.

At a purchase price of \$6.375 million for a building valued at approximately \$15 million, this bargain makes sense, as in dollars and cents.

This opportunity presented itself due to the state of the local commercial real estate market. The availability of funds in our reserves made the deal possible without imposing any additional burden on our already overloaded taxpayers.

In fact, I remain convinced that we will see the benefits of this

deal sooner than later on our tax bill (perhaps as soon as next year).

Finally, I would just mention an initiative underway by a group of Blackburn residents to beautify the Hamlet. Led by Jill Finlayson, it is looking at ways of turning a part of Bearbrook Park into a community garden. The intent is to bring various groups together in a community effort to develop a focal point of pride, which hopefully will be the catalyst to improving the appearance of Innes Road in general.

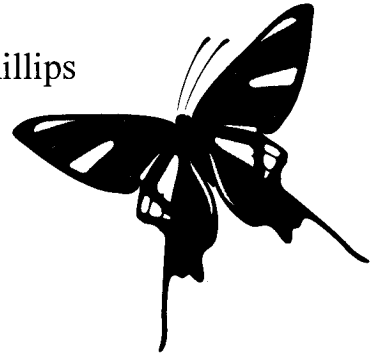

## What a garage sale!

## Hazardous waste drop-off

Unfortunately, due to a lack of liability insurance by the City, we cannot have a local Blackburn Hamlet drop-off of hazardous waste in September.

You can take items yourself to Trail Road. The site is open on Saturday from 9-5. The phone number is 838-2799.

Instead of discarding paint, why not try mixing partial cans together and painting your basement or garage floor.

Also, call the B.C.A. hotline and donate paint for our Fun Fair trailer.

Finally, give partially used cans to *Re-Store* for resale.

Empty cans can be thrown in the garbage.

## Heating with oil or gas?

The following is information from several resources. I

recommend you check all aspects for yourself. This report is to give you a general idea of your choices and approximate prices.

The gap between natural gas and oil for heating has narrowed over the years. The savings in oil is not in the yearly heating bill, but in the long term, avoiding

I noticed, too, that my oil furnace is quieter than the gas furnace in my previous home.

By comparison, my neighbour

### Furnace upgrading prices

Oil furnace to oil continuous for high-efficiency (94%). Full 20-year heat exchange warranty \$1,800.00

Gas furnace to gas continuous for 80% eff. 20-year warranty \$2,000.00

Gas furnace to gas continuous for 94% eff. \$3,000.00

Oil furnace to gas with 80% efficiency \$2,800.00

Oil furnace to gas with 94% efficiency \$3,800.00

Note: gas furnaces have a shorter life span than oil furnaces and are usually pro-rated for their warranties. Ask about this. Also, a fee of \$600 is required each time the exchanger is replaced, plus a pro-rated cost.

installation cost and pro-rated costs.

With the same efficiency furnace, oil is kinder to the environment. It is not as dirty as some people believe.

We are fortunate in the Hamlet we have piped-in oil, avoiding space-wasting tanks.

I decided personally last year to stay with oil, having experienced both methods of heating.

It cost me \$451 to heat 1,500 square feet last winter, even though I am home during the day (we lower the thermostat at night). What really helped was R40 insulation in the roof and having my basement walls and all windows upgraded.

paid \$473 to heat his 1,650-square-foot home.

His basement is not as well insulated as mine.

## Is your home green?

Call Envirosense at 798-4748 for a free green-home visit.

I learned from their visit how to save money and help the environment, as well as some useful tips on energy use.

Sponsored by the Region, they check your home from attic to basement.

By calling the above number, you can buy a rain barrel for \$75, installed, or \$65, uninstalled. Installation includes the barrel, a stone and connecting drain pipes.

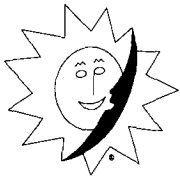

was provided to the *BANAR* by the NCC outlining changes or concessions made as a result of the public consultation process.

### Greenbelt Master Plan - Blackburn Hamlet Area

The NCC undertook an extensive public consultation process this past spring on its draft Master Plan for the Greenbelt. As a result of several public meetings in the Blackburn Hamlet area, a meeting with community representatives, and presentations and resolutions from the Gloucester Planning Advisory Committee and Council, the Commission has proposed alterations to the plan in the Blackburn Hamlet area.

The following highlights proposals of the draft Master Plan that generated significant public response in the Blackburn Hamlet area. Beneath each proposal is a summary of changes to the Master Plan proposed by the NCC. The map on this page references the proposals.

#### Draft Master Plan Proposal #1

The **linear commercial strip** on the south side of Innes Road between Green and Mud Creeks will be **withdrawn** from the Master Plan. The area will continue to be farmed.

#### Draft Master Plan Proposal #2

A proposed RMO **transitway** paralleling Innes Road, the Blackburn Bypass, and Navan Road will **remain** in the Master Plan. The exact location of the transitway will be determined by the upcoming RMO environmental assessment. The public will have the opportunity to participate in this study.

The NCC **prefers an alignment close to the Blackburn Bypass**, preferably one sharing the existing corridor. Such a route would avoid adjacent natural areas and especially farmland to the south of the Greenbelt, while maintaining distance from the community.

#### Draft Master Plan Proposal #3

The proposed **removal of the Blackburn Bypass lands from the Greenbelt**, south of Innes Road between the west and east ends of the Bypass excepting Tauvette Park will **remain** in the Master Plan. The NCC has committed not to develop the lands between the west end of the bypass and the former Navan Road. The NCC will seek to turn the lands over to the City with a

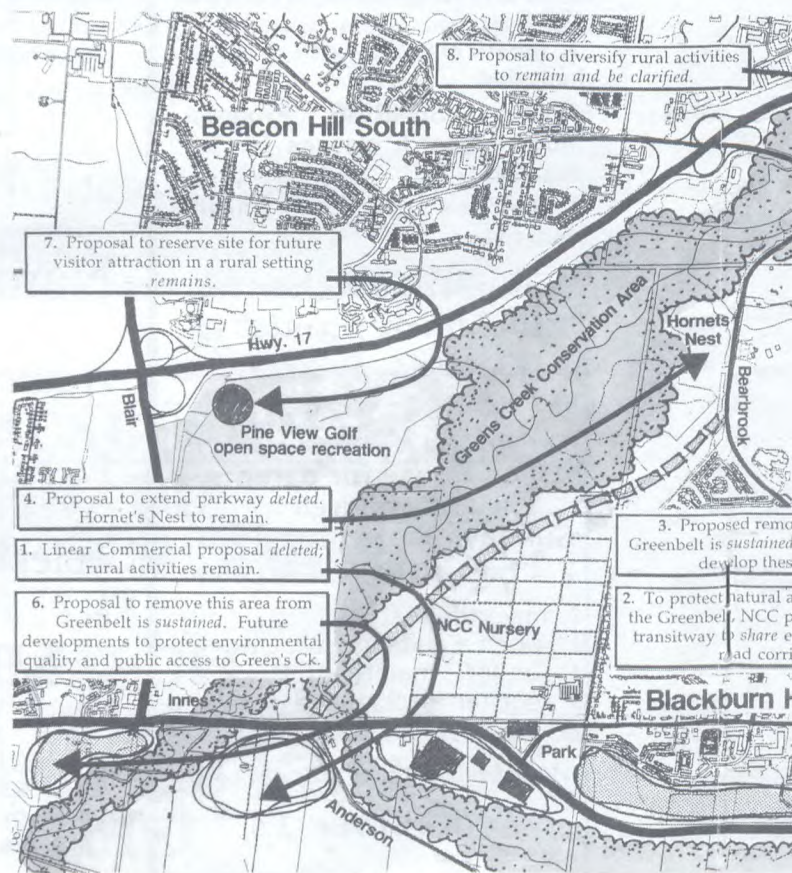
long-term lease; a condition of any longer-term transfer of ownership to Gloucester would be that the city maintain the area as open space.

#### Draft Master Plan Proposal #4

An **extension of Rockliffe Drive** west of Blackburn Hamlet to connect with Anderson Road will be **withdrawn** from the Master Plan. The Hornets Nest Soccer fields will remain; small adjustments to the existing field layout may be required to protect Greens Creek.

#### Draft Master Plan Proposal #5

Development of the former Land Engineering and Test Establishment (LETE) lands: the existing buildings and facilities on the north part of the site will be used by the

RCMP. A second Built Facility area in the southern portion of the site will be retained; future uses could include War Museum facilities.

**Draft Master Plan Proposal #6**

The proposed **removal of a 10 hectare area** on the south side of the Blair/Innes intersection will **remain** in the Master Plan. Land use compatibility with Greens Creek will be improved by instituting buffers and diverting storm drainage away from the Creek. Public access could be provided on a portion of the site east of Blair Road. Site planning, and Gloucester and RMOC Official Plan and zoning amendments (which involve public consultation) are required. The City is incorporating the site into its

Cyrville Employment Area Study.

**Draft Master Plan Proposal #7**

A **visitor attraction** to be sited on the southeast corner of the Blair/Hwy 17 interchange will **remain** in the Master Plan. Statements in the Master Plan will be reinforced to ensure facility use and design is compatible with the rural character of this area of the Greenbelt.

**Draft Master Plan Proposal #8**

Increased **visitor commercial activity** along St. Joseph Blvd. will **remain**, however, the types of encouraged uses will be clarified in the Master Plan. The intent is to support existing or new commercial uses that enhance visitor rural experiences, such as a farmer's market, the roadside sale

of agricultural products from adjacent farms, and visitor accommodation in converted buildings.

The final Master Plan will be ready by the end of the year, and a public consultation report will be issued by the NCC. For further information, please call Sandra Pecek at 239-5155.

Hopefully in the future we will be able to see both the forests and the trees.
