hat's Happening at the community Hall?

The Community Hall is being well used by groups in Blackburn and is booked practically every evening during the week. There are some daytime blocks available and we are looking for programs that would be useful to the community.



The community hall is the new location for a great game of bridge or euchre. Interested adults are invited to join this group of bridge players that meet every Tuesday afternoon at 1 pm. An evening of euchre has been planned for Saturday, February 5th.

Regular users include Guides, Sparks, and Pathfinders. The Blackburn Youth Association holds monthly dances, chess tournaments, bazaars, and many other functions.

There are also two quilting groups that hold their meetings once a week in our hall and the Gloucester Baha'i groups use it for their meetings on a regular basis. The hall is an excellent place for a private birthday party or team party and many Blackburn residents have taken advantage of this facility for family reunions, anniversary dinners, sleepovers and wedding receptions.

The City ran a daytime program during the summer on PD days and the Christmas break. They will be doing so again this year. They are also running a Yoga class on Mondays from 2:00 to 3:15 pm. Those interested in City programs should watch for announcements in the local newspapers, or call the City to get more information.

The BCA has purchased 25 card tables for use in the hall and a bridge group has started. This group meets on Tuesday afternoons from 1:00 to 4:00 pm and is open to anyone who wants to enjoy an afternoon of informal bridge and relaxation. Bill Durning has offered to direct the play and we have had up to 13 players show up without any formal notification. Euchre evenings have also been very successful and are being organized on a regular basis. See page 7 for more information on the next Euchre evening.

Students at Emily Carr are working on the artwork commissioned by the Gloucester Arts Council. It will be a wall mounted mosaic of coloured tiles depicting life in Blackburn and be mounted on the south wall. Paul Graham of the RPB is investigating various designs for reducing the noise echoes and will likely have something ready shortly. The air-conditioning of the hall was included in the first draft of the budget and will be done this spring before the warm weather is upon us. This will make the hall comfortable 12 months of the year.

There is still space available for weekend or daytime activities. It is open to any Blackburn resident, preferably a BCA member and rates are very reasonable. If you wish to book the hall for your group please call Jan Whitehouse at 830-8644.

irst, Happy New Year and I will not use the "M" word or any acronym starting with Y and ending in K. We have heard enough of these terms for a while and it's time to get over the hype.

While on the subject of a new year, I would be remiss if I did not thank the Blackburn youths who organized the community New Year's Eve celebration. These teenage residents, led by Sean Morris and Matt Cahill, put together a party for all ages. Their celebration, beginning with a fun-filled hour of entertainment at the community hall for the really young, was followed with teen bash with a live performance by Kenmore's Last Hope at the arena. For the older crowd, myself included, they organized a party in the community hall, with complementary party favours and champagne for the midnight countdown. As well, these youths raised several hundred dollars for the Gloucester Emergency Food Cupboard.

The good news is that a 5% property tax decrease on the local portion of your tax bill has again been achieved (by the way, this is the third 5% reduction in Gloucester taxes in the last four years). reconstruction of Innes Road and a partnership with the Gloucester Soccer Association to build a field house at the Hornets Nest.

By now, most, if not all, are aware of the decision on municipal restructuring. The province has put us all on the same track by reducing two local levels of municipal government to one with a significant reduction in the number of local politicians.

It is time for all of us to get onside and make the new city work by being part of the solution for the new municipal structure. While we will be celebrating our past in Gloucester this coming year, it's time to move ahead to reach our full potential in the years to come.

City Budgets for Projects in the Year 2000

I attended the City's budget meeting in December to support the Tennis Club with their proposal to have the courts refinished in the year 2000 and to request that Phase 2 of the Innes Road project also be included. Mike Haddad made a presentation to council following which they approved the required City funds to advance this project into the year 2000. The Tennis club, along with the BCA, is contributing half of the costs of the project. The City also added the construction of the 2nd phase of the Innes Road upgrade to the 2000 budget. This had not been included in the original submission. Hopefully this phase will be completed in a more timely fashion last summer's (and fall's) work.

Things are looking good for our community. Hopefully when the dust settles and the restructuring haggles are over we can continue to work as closely with the politicians and staff of the new municipal government as we have in the past.

Bearbrook Outdoor Pool

The Board Members would like to thank the Pool staff for providing a fun-filled and safe summer. The renovated pool took on a wonderful resort atmosphere especially during the hot spell in July.

Parks Inspection

The volunteers on the Board performed an inspection of all parks and have made recommendations to City Staff for repairs and replacement.

New Park Structures

Although a delay in ordering resulted from extensive consultation with interested community members, Keystone Park is greatly improved with a new light (partial funding from Councillor Bloess), new playstructure, the addition of swings, improved pathways and a

new seniors area with horse shoe pits, bird feeders and benches. Other parks to have equipment installed include Bearbrook Park with the addition of larger swings and Red Maple with a new slide.

Blackburn Park Playstructure

(Beside the Blackburn Preschool) The concept of moving this structure is being considered. Potential locations include the west side of the Community Hall. Comments are welcome, please contact any of the board members or myself at 830-2868.

Blackburn Arena

Ice is available for public skating on Fridays and Saturdays from 7 to 8:20 pm. and on Saturday from 1 to 2:20 pm at the Blackburn Arena. Cost is \$2.00 per person. Frequent user and season passes are available.


Outdoor Rinks

Keeping Competitive Sports Fun

Being involved in sports is an important building block for good health for your child. Sports activities promote fitness, establish healthy sleeping patterns and relieve stress. They also teach children social skills, such as how to be a team player and a good winner and loser. Most of all, sports give children a sense of accomplishment, whether it's swimming the length of a pool, scoring a goal for the team or learning a new gymnastics routine.

Here are some tips to make sure that sports remain fun:

- · Accept your child's feelings. It's OK for them to feel badly because they lost.
- Look for an organization or league that teach basic skills and have lots of practices rather than focusing on games and competitions. Ask around and find out what coaching philosophies are used in the league.
- Don't push your child too hard to excel. The harder a child is pushed the higher the risk of problems developing if expectations are not met.
- Not all sports are right for all children. Parents need to listen to what their children have to say and either help them through their problem or give them the confidence to quit when they say they want out.
- Kids play sports to be part of the group, to be like their heroes and to have fun. It is better to expect less and be pleased with your child's efforts and achievements that to expect more and be disappointed.
- Look for stress signals. The three most common are: wanting to avoid the activity; anxiety regarding practices, meets, and games; and a vulnerability toward non-healthy behaviour.

Ontario's Strategy for Alzheimer Disease

lzheimer Disease is the most common dementia affecting elderly people, although it has also been diagnosed in those as young as 40. It is a

deteriorating brain disease that eventually kills. In Ontario, more than 100,00 people live with the disease, 90 % of whom are over the age of 65. With Ontario's growing and aging population, it is expected that Alzheimer Disease and related dementias will increase significantly in coming years.

The Ontario government promised to listen carefully to those affected by Alzheimer Disease and respond with a co-ordinated strategy to address this

devastating disease. The resulting Alzheimer Strategythe first of its kind in Canada -- is the result of broad consultation with key stakeholders across the province. Over 180 submissions were received in response to the government's draft strategy released March 4, 1999.

Ontario's unprecedented multi-year investment of \$1.2 billion in long-term care services has already led to increased service for individuals and families coping with the effects of Alzheimer Disease and related dementias. The Alzheimer Strategy, announced on

September 10th is an important, complementary step and outlines the government's action plan to better meet the needs of Ontarians with Alzheimer Disease and related dementias, as well as their caregivers and families. The Ontario Government will invest \$68.4 million in the comprehensive, multi-faceted strategy over the next five years.



Insider Trading

ate last year Corel's Michael Cowpland was charged with insider trading by the Ontario Securities Commission. The OSC alleges that his sale of \$20.4 million of Corel stock - or about 1/3 of his holdings - made one month prior to their 33% drop in value, was improper. The Commission alleges that his trade was made because he had material confidential information — poor sales

figures — which had not yet been made available to the general investing public, who purchased his stock.

Mr. Cowpland denies this theory alleged by the OSC, claiming the stock sale was made for other unrelated reasons. Maybe it was time to trade in his car.

This law is controversial. On one hand, company owners and employees are encouraged to own stock in their own company, as performance incentives. They must be allowed, obviously, to sell their stock. Since they work at the company the idea that everybody is entitled to the same information about the company, in order to level the playing field, seems just too unrealistic. And to draw the line at whether or not the insider "abused" his clearly privileged position is too vague, when abuse is not so easily defined.

a secret sale can damage the integrity of all securities markets

On the other hand, Mr. Cowpland's alleged crime appears to be not in his actual sale of the stock, but in the way his sale was done, anonymously through his holding company. As the theory goes, a secret sale can damage the integrity of all securities markets by turning off public confidence and in turn the ability of all companies to raise investment capital. This will hurt all of us in the long run.

Insiders cannot have the best of both worlds. If they

choose to go to the public to raise money they cannot then turn around and, without disclosure of their sale, avoid losses by selling before material information is made public. The penalties for doing this, which include fines of up to three times the profits made, should be considered just one of the more important rules of the investment game.

And as for Mr. Cowpland, selling at around \$6.00 per share to allegedly

avoid a drop to \$3.00 per share, only to see it rise recently to somewhere around \$50.00 per share, makes one wonder if he even is an insider. Maybe a good defense will be that his staff fails to keep him informed.
