

## The Season of Bloom or Gloom

find that our relatively short summers here in Blackburn Hamlet are marked by several consistent characteristics, both positive and negative. On the positive side, we get weeks of great sunny, warm weather, acres of luscious greenery to enjoy in our parks and the greenbelt and the FunFair, which gives opportunity to re-acquaint ourselves our neighbours with while contributing to community programs. On the negative side are stretches periodic of intense humidity and a rash of predictable, mindless attacks by vandals, defacing and damaging taxpayerfunded public property.

As usual, this year the early summer brought out a slew of hooligans and numerous incidents of vandalism were reported. Especially hard hit were the bus shelters, not only in Blackburn Hamlet but across the east end. Another local target was the pool

area, and, as a result, security cameras have been installed to monitor activities twenty-four hours a day. This seems to have had the desired impact and discouraged the perpetrators, but it is unfortunate that such costly measures were necessary. I encourage all of you to report any suspicious activity or behaviour to the police. By remaining watchful and working

together we can protect our community and the investment we have all made in it from pranksters and vandals, the summer's other "blooms."

On a more positive note, at this writing, another stretch of the Innes Road rehabilitation program (from Tauvette to Beddoe) is well underway. Your feedback indicates that many of you have noticed the vast improvement this project has made in the look of the Hamlet.

While we are making our roadways safer with the installation of sidewalks, more than ever traffic issues are a prime concern. To address this problem, we have installed a number of multi-way stops to slow drivers down on many local streets. In addition, the police department's East Division Traffic Enforcement squad has been extremely visible and effective in our area. In the Orient Park area, for example, there were 69 traffic tickets issued in July. These statistics do not include the general patrol officers who also continue to do their best to enforce speed limits in response to residents' complaints.

On another traffic issue, I have received a petition for multi-stops on Bearbrook Road. It is quite clear that the volume and speed on Bearbrook is a problem for the residents and for children who must cross this street to go to school. I will be holding a community meeting to deal with this matter and look forward to your participation to make this street safer. In the meantime, let's all slow down and remember that most offenders actually live in the neighbourhoods in which they are ticketed.





## Hamlet "Relay For Life" continues to grow

ongratulations to the many Hamlet residents who → participated in this year's Canadian Cancer Society Relay for Life held on June 7th and 8th at the Nepean Sportsplex. Once again Blackburn Hamlet was well represented, fielding four enthusiastic teams, up from last year's three. In all, our Hamlet representation contributed over \$7,200 to the Ottawa area total of \$440,000, a personal best and more than twenty per cent higher than last year's total!

Congratulations to the new "kids" on the track, Anne Gray's youth team, the Colonel By Cougars, Lucie Durning's Eclectics, Hannah Rycroft's "Friends" and the original Hamlet team, Bill and Marnie Adams' Omelettes. Thanks also to the many other dedicated local volunteers whose support helped make this year's relay such a resounding success.

Across Canada, 162 teams and 33,000 volunteers participated this year in the event's overnight non-competitive relays, raising nearly 8 million dollars to fund cancer

research, victim support programs and public information services. Team members pay ten dollars to participate and are encouraged as well to raise an additional \$100 each for the cause. The Relay for Life is not only a tremendously successful fundraising event but a celebration for cancer survivors and a tribute to

the lives of loved ones lost to cancer. The emotional sunset Luminary Ceremony that ends the event features the lighting of hundreds of candles surrounding the relay site dedicated to cancer victims and survivors. The dramatic impact of this ceremony brings volunteers back year after year to contribute to the fight against this dreaded disease which, at one time or another, seems to touch us all.

Our local coordinator, Kevin McGuire, hopes that next year we can once again increase the complement of Hamlet teams and event volunteers and he is looking in particular at fielding additional youth teams from local schools. Mark June of next year's calendar as the month when you and your family and friends can join our local relay contingent to play an active role in the continuing fight against cancer.

## Goneau prepares por Team Canada training!

s the highest-ranking assistant instructor at Blackburn Taekwon-Do, Julie Goneau is teaching the children of Blackburn Hamlet patience, respect and self-control through the art of Taekwon-Do.

This 18-year old young lady is not as shy as she first appears. She has qualified to represent Canada for a third time in the World Championships. In 2000 she competed to a silver medal 2nd Degree division in Pyongyang, North Korea and a 3rd Degree division Bronze medal in 2001, Rimini, Italy. This will however be her first time competing on the National Team. Goneau has never been selected to be on the team because of her small stature. In team events there are no weight classes, meaning a lightweight could fight a heavyweight. For this

reason, lightweight competitors are rarely selected for team events but are sent to represent their individual weight category.

> Goneau was selected by the Canadian Executive board of ITF at the first ever "International Master Choi's Cup", which was an international tournament that took place past in June in Oakville, Ontario. Goneau scored a first round knock-out against a top Canadian athlete and a second round victory against a

British athlete who won the 4th Degree division Bronze Medal in the 2001 World Championships. The outcome of the tournament guaranteed her a spot on the team.

Julie Goneau has dedicated her life to Taekwon-Do, which has helped her learn how to discipline herself in life as she prepares for university next year. She is an inspiration to family, friends and fellow students and Blackburn Taekwon-Do is very proud to have Julie as one of their instructors.

Julie teaches twice a week at Blackburn Taekwon-Do with the goal of passing on her knowledge and experience to the younger generation. Her hope for the future is to build a more peaceful world.



Pour la deuxième semaine, nous étions au chalet international Guide, Our Chalet, à Adelboden, sans chef









The 2002-2003 school year is upon us and as always new schedules have to be arranged. The latest in budget cuts has resulted in reduced seating for elementary school students on old bus routes, with fewer buses and drivers. The solution is to change the start and finish times of local schools and have one bus and driver service two or more schools. So, in case you're not aware, two schools in Blackburn are changing schedules. Glen Ogilvie Public School on Centre Park and Emily Carr Middle School off Innes are both moving to 9:00 am start and 3:30 pm finish with appropriate changes for kindergarten drop-off and pick-up at lunchtime. That means three schools within less than a kilometre of each other will have the same timetable. (The third school is Good Shepherd Catholic School.) These changes pose a couple of problems for our community. The most visibly apparent problem will be increased traffic congestion at the above mentioned times on Innes and Bearbrook. This includes all forms of

traffic—pedestrians, cyclists, scooterriders, parent's dropping-off and picking-up, and, of course, buses. By combining this traffic with the regular rush hour traffic the potential for accidents and frazzled nerves grows. Another problem associated with these timetable changes is not so apparent, but none-the-less inconvenient for daycare providers who look after children at more than one elementary school. It means being in two places at the same time, which is impossible. So, if you can wait 10 or 15 minutes before heading out the door at 8:50am, or if you can head north on Bearbrook, or avoid the traffic light at Orient Park and Innes, that would probably do a lot to ease the congestion. And if you find yourself caught in a line-up at the pedestrian activated light at Bearbrook and Good Shepherd School, just take a deep breath and watch out for all those eager kids running across the street (without looking) on their way to meet their friends at school.



#### Safe Schools

ast spring there was an unusual number of cases where students were suspended for debatable reasons. One concerned a student's English paper that was thought to be threatening; one where a police dog sniffed marijuana; another where a student took a letter opener to school that was deemed to be a weapon.

The root of this sudden surge in suspensions seems to be the province's new Safe Schools Act and its Code of Conduct. A review of the Code causes my knobby doggy bone of angst to ache once again. In cases of uncivil behaviour the Code decrees that suspensions and expulsions are mandatory.

Years ago the Charter pretty much wiped out the imposition of mandatory sentences for crimes. One or two still exist, e.g., Latimer's minimum 10-year sentence for second degree murder. But one of our most important legal principles is that when sentencing someone the punishment must not only fit the crime, it must also fit the criminal. Mandatory sentences tend to violate this principle since all crimes and all criminals must be treated the same.

Under the Code, for example, swearing at a teacher brings an immediate mandatory suspension, no explanations allowed. As does uttering a threat to cause serious bodily harm. I wonder if a student, who says "I'm going to kick your butt" must now be suspended. And does he actually have to mean it as a threat in order to be suspended, or is he suspended just for uttering the words? And if the words are said spontaneously, without any thought during a heated exchange, is that just too bad for him?

Suspensions may be reviewed and appealed. Of course, they will probably have already been served.

Mandatory expulsions are imposed for such things as possessing a weapon, giving alcohol to a minor, and for school fights where a victim needs some medical treatment. In law, anything can be a weapon — a pen if used as a weapon is a weapon. Medical treatment might be for a mere bruise or for hair being pulled out.

Zero tolerance strikes again. Rules, rules and more rules. Doesn't anyone trust their common sense any more? Suspensions and expulsions that are mandatory take away the ability for our teachers and principals to decide what is the appropriate punishment that fits the student.

Codes of Conduct try to make us all fit the same keyhole. But behaviour is complex and finding justice is not always that simple.






## École Sainte-Marie


