
So much information only a click away

Greenbelt Use and Maintenance

One of the great resources we have in Blackburn Hamlet, and probably the most underused when considering our population, is the Greenbelt. Our Greenbelt Director, Mike van Aanhout has held discussions with the management of the greenbelt and he will be reporting the NCC's plans for our area on a regular basis in the BANAR. Bearbrook RoadTraffic Concerns and Use of Pesticides

Since the last BANAR, we have held a public meeting to discuss the traffic situation on Bearbrook Road, and attended another public meeting on the use of pesticides in the City of Ottawa. The purpose of the meeting was to solicit public input for the development of a city pesticide policy. Our Environmental committee will be reporting on the pesticide meeting in the BANAR, and if anyone has questions they should call Caroline Harris-MacDonald (837-3818).

The BCA is here to assist and/or investigate any problems the residents of Blackburn have within our community. The traffic issue on Bearbrook is one example where we worked with our city councillor, Rainer Bloess to organize a public meeting, and another recent one I am trying to get some data on is the level of blasting at the Lafarge quarry. If anyone has any information on this problem, please contact me and, with sufficient data, I think we can do something about it.

On a parting note, we are in the midst of our membership campaign, and I urge every family to support our community and purchase a \$10 membership. The money is used to subsidize the BANAR and allows us to organize community events such as Fun Runs, the Fun Fair, the Outdoor Pool, and public meetings. 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Hamlet traffic woes tackled on two fronts

am pleased to provide an update on a number of traffic issues of concern to the Hamlet residents. These issues pertain to speeding on Bearbrook Road, the status of Innes in Blackburn, and the congestion on Innes Road west of the Bypass.

On October 3, approximately 125 local residents attended a public meeting held at the community hall to discuss Bearbrook Road's long-standing traffic and speeding problems. This significant showing was no doubt indicative of the high level of community concern over the stretch of Bearbrook, lined with homes and schools, which cuts directly through our community. Although data presented at the meeting indicates that traffic volume has decreased over the

last decade, Bearbrook remains the only north-south link between Innes Road and St. Joseph Boulevard and, as such, is still heavily travelled. The message heard loud and clear at the public meeting was for more action to slow down heavy-footed drivers.

In the three weeks directly following the public meeting, over thirty tickets have been issued (prior to the meeting, 99 tickets for various infractions were issued over the summer). Since the meeting, plans have been finalized to install a second pedestrian-activated crosswalk across Bearbrook between Centrepark and Westpark (at Bush Park). Watch for this installation to be completed before the end of November. In addition, Bearbrook will see increased use of the City's electronic speed warning signs as well as a beefed

up police presence. School boards are also being contacted and asked to remind bus drivers, students and teachers to slow down. We will continue to work to get the message out to slow down on this busy roadway.

A second Hamlet pet peeve, the Innes Road bottleneck problem, is also finally getting welcome attention. October 11 saw the official public announcement that combined federal and provincial funding will be coming our way for the widening of Innes Road. The Canada-Ontario Infrastructure Program will contribute \$30,240,000 which, along with City funding, will finance the widening of Innes between Blair Road and the 417 west of the Hamlet and from Orléans Boulevard to Trim Road to the east. Both projects will include the installation of sidewalks, the addition of bicycle lanes and construction of noise reduction barriers. The western stretch is to commence at the beginning of the 2003 construction season and the Orléans leg, which will be completed in two phases, will be fully operational by 2005.

Finally, as you have noted, another phase of Innes in Blackburn has been brought up to an urban standard. At the time of writing, the City's draft budget contains funds for the remaining phase (east of Eastpark) to be undertaken in 2003.

Thanks again to all of those who came out on October 3 to provide input on the Bearbrook Road issue. I encourage all of you to keep in touch and voice your opinions on all municipal and local community issues.

BCA joins the Equality East campaign for an Arts and Cultural Facility

he Equality East Citizens' Coalition officially launched on October 23rd, a campaign to press members of City Council to commit a minimum of \$8-million to establish a permanent, multifunctional community arts and cultural facility in Ottawa's East District. The Blackburn Community Association has signed onto the Declaration of Support. Although the East District Arts Facility project was removed from the 5-year capital forecast, a motion was passed by Council to fund \$100,000 in study money for 2002. This money is now being used to study the arts facility project and is undertaking an Arts Needs Assessment..

What is Equality East?

Equality East is an independent, non-partisan community-based citizens' coalition committed to promoting the cultural, economic and social development of the city of Ottawa's East District community. The coalition is working with the Gloucester Arts Council and the Visual Arts Centre on a joint lobbying effort for the establishment of a permanent, multi-functional community arts and cultural facility in Ottawa's East District.

Although primarily an umbrella organization for existing community groups and associations, (sports, recreation, arts and culture), membership in Equality East is open to all individuals. Equality East is currently headed by a steering committee made of representatives from arts and cultural organizations, the business sector and community associations. 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



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
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Home Interiors that are Personally Yours

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Faster, stronger, farther

Campaign goal: \$5,000 Contributions to date: \$2,904

he *Orléans Online* and *The Eastender* are proud to announce the establishment of a fundraising campaign to help one of the east end's top athletes achieve her goals.

Caitlin Renneson is a model of perseverance, sportsmanship and fortitude.

The 19-year-old Blackburn Hamlet resident and recent Gloucester High School grad started wheelchair racing when she was just eight years old. At the time she got involved she was looking for a way to keep physically active and meet new friends.

Over the years, she progressed to the point where she could compete with the best cerebral palsy wheelchair racers in the world.

In 1996, at 15 years of age, she

qualified for Canada's Paralympic team heading to Atlanta. Unfortunately, she had to stay home because she did not meet the minimum age requirement.

In 1998, she broke the world record over 1500 metres and held it for over a year. That same year, she won two bronze and two silver medals at the 2nd IPC World Track and Field Championships for the Disabled in Birmingham, England.

She is only one of a handful of CP wheelchair racers who have gone under 4:30 in the 1500 metres, having gone 4:29 in a timed training session in 2001.

In 2000, Caitlin finally got to go to her first Paralympics in Sydney, Australia and won a bronze medal in the 400 metres. This was an especially significant accomplishment since the International Paralympic Committee had dropped Caitlin's specialty races, the 800 and 1500 metres, from the Paralympic schedule six months before the competition. In just six short months, she had to transform herself from a middle distance racer to a sprinter.

Since Sydney, Caitlin has been diligently working on completing the transition to world class sprinter in preparation for the 2004 Paralympics in Athens, Greece. This summer she placed third in the 400 metres at the 3rd IPC World Track and Field Championships in Lille, France.

Like any sport, an athlete's success depends a great deal on their equipment. Wheelchair racing is no different. The top racing chairs can cost upwards of \$4,000. And while Caitlin's chair is only two years old, her wheels are over 10 years old.



In order to help Caitlin be the best that she can be and continue to compete at the highest level on an even playing field, Orléans Online has launched a campaign to raise enough money to buy Caitlin a new chair.

Ten per cent of the advertising revenue generated by *Orléans Online* and *The Eastender* will go towards this effort. As well, Orléans Online will be accepting contributions to the fund from its many visitors and the community at large. Donations can be dropped off at any TD Canada Trust branch. Simply indicate the funds be applied to account number 3283-5200219.

No amount is too small. One hundred all per cent contributions will go directly to buying Caitlin new equipment. The initial goal of the campaign is to raise \$3,000 to buy Caitlin a new set wheels for the world championships. After the first phase of the campaign is achieved, money will be raised to buy Caitlin a new frame and hardware.

During the duration of the campaign, Caitlin will be making regular contributions to an online diary (www.orleansonline.ca) so supporters can keep track of her progress during training tune-up meets and the big events.

Hopefully, through Caitlin's efforts and those of *Orléans Online* and its many supporters, physically challenged children will be inspired to become active earlier and maybe, one day, go on to become Canada's Paralympians of tomorrow.

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
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Blackburn Tennis wraps up Summer 2002



New Play Structures for parks in Blackburn

here is a new play structure in Centrepark Park and another in the planning stage for Diceman Park. The following will give you an idea of the process involved for the replacement of such a structure:

- 1. Identifying a structure that is beyond its serviceable life.
- 2. Establishing a budget based on replacement value.
- 3. Issuing a questionnaire to the neighbourhood to determine preferred components.

- 4. Using the results of the questionnaire to draft a request for proposals.
- 5. Arranging for proposals to be evaluated by the Recreation and Parks committee, including our community representative, Monica de Römer.
- 6. Selection of the successful bid based on best match, best design and best value.
- 7. Removal of the old structure and installing the new one.

Some expansion of the existing play area on Centrepark was required. The total cost was \$25,100 of which \$5,000

was contributed by the BCA. Thank you to Carol Kerwin who organized the questionaire.

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Anti-idling — The Facts

Fact: Canadian motorists idle their vehicles an average of five to 10 minutes per day. A recent study suggests that in the peak of winter, Canadians voluntarily idle their vehicles for a combined total of more than 75 million minutes a day – equivalent to one vehicle idling for 144 years.

Fact: If every driver of a light-duty vehicle in Canada avoided idling for just five minutes per day, we would save 1.6 million litres of fuel worth more than \$1.2 million.

Fact: If every driver of a light-duty vehicle in Canada avoided idling for just five minutes per day, we would prevent more than 3,800 tonnes of carbon dioxide from entering the atmosphere.

Fact: Idling for more than 10 seconds costs more than turning off your engine.

Fact: A recent study in the City of Toronto found that more than a third (35-45%) of parents idle their vehicles while waiting to pick up their children.

Fact: Children are particularly vulnerable to air pollution – they breathe faster than adults and inhale more air per pound of body weight. Fact: Health Canada estimates that more than 5,000 Canadians die prematurely each year because of air pollution.

Fact: Service delivery vehicles spend 20-60% of their time idling, which costs fleet owners a lot of money and gets them nowhere.

Fact: Molson Canada, a participant in the Repair Our Air "fleet challenge," estimates that it is saving \$225,000 annually from its idling control program.

Fact: Stopping unnecessary vehicle idling is one relatively easy way to contribute to improved air quality and respiratory health in our communities.

How can you decrease unnecessary vehicle idling?

- 1) Reduce "warm-up" idling to 30 seconds.
- 2) Turn your engine off if parked for more than 10 seconds.
- 3) Avoid using a remote car starter.
- 4) Spread the word to family and friends.



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Vandalism takes a dip at city pools (City goes high-techto fight crime)

he City of Ottawa's most recent initiative to increase security at local recreational facilities is proving to be remarkably successful. The installation of new high-tech cameras at a number of outdoor pools is making these facilities more secure for the many residents who enjoy them. The City will be introducing a "pilot program" using the latest in integrated security technology to identify persons committing acts of vandalism, illegal drug and alcohol usage and prohibited use of City property. This crime prevention initiative is expected to enhance security and police response to community problems as well as lessen financial strain on community centres, pools and other City of Ottawa facilities.

Security cameras serve to both detect and deter trespassing and vandalism by late-night revellers who often target unattended public properties and facilities. In the case of Bearbrook Pool in Blackburn Hamlet, the number of troublesome incidents has dropped from eleven prior to installation to one since the new security measures were implemented and, because of the evidence provided by the on-site camera, this one incident was effectively dealt with in conjunction with the Ottawa Police Service.

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

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
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"Tinsel Tea & Bake Sale"

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
