has had on flights and flying from Ottawa.





BCA Board Meeting Highlights November 2023 and January 2024

Highlights from recent BCA Board activities include:

- Shashank Iyer has taken over management of the BCA Memberships.
- Maureen Forsythe will not be running for re-election at the March AGM. We hope to find someone to take over and expand the Youth activities that Maureen has worked hard to establish.
- The front doors of the Community Hall have been replaced and are now compliant with current accessibility guidelines.
- OCTranspo continues to work out the details for the On-demand pilot that will replace route 28 on the weekends. No date has been set for the start of the pilot.
- The NCC is planning on extending Greenbelt pathway E, parallel to Tauvette Street. This will include
 a fence with limited openings to separate the path
 from Just Food farms.
- The Community Closet event is looking for someone to lead the event planning and preparation activities.
- We are closely following the proposed changes to the Ottawa Community Partnership Insurance Program and have had a number of discussions with Councillor Dudas and City staff on the impact these could have on our programs.
- The BCA Board passed the 2024 budget. While it shows a planned \$10k deficit, this is more than offset by the \$30k surplus we accrued in 2023. The BCA Finances will be presented at the March 21 Annual General Meeting.

Blackburn Hamlet residents have been treated to some terrific talks at our recent Discovery Café sessions.



In November,

we were thrilled to welcome Robin Grosset, Chief Technology Officer of the fraud-detection company Mindbridge, for a behind-the-scenes look at how his company helps other companies find fraudulent activity and mitigate risk. It was fascinating to hear how technology is being used to analyze a staggering amount of data to find the elusive needle-in-a-haystack.

In January, Jim Davies, Professor at Carleton University's Department of Cognitive Science, author, poet, game designer, internationally-produced playwright and co-host of the award-winning podcast Minding the Brain (http://www.mindingthebrainpodcast.com/), spoke to us about "Education, Society, and Generative AI". He helped to demystify some of the issues about artificial intelligence, explored some of the risks and benefits of AI, and raised some interesting questions about what the future will hold.

On February 22, we will welcome Ottawa Book Prize winning author Jean Van Loon as she reads from her book Nuclear Family and discusses growing up in Ottawa at the beginning of the nuclear age.



Associate members reside outside the boundaries of Blackburn Hamlet. Membership gives them the right to vote motions raised at Members' Meetings. Associate members are not eligible to vote on the election of the Directors.

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NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH SEMINAR

On March 7, starting at 7pm, at the Community Hall, the BCA will be conducting a Neighborhood Watch (NW) seminar. The event will be a joint collaboration between the Ottawa Police (OPS) and the BCA. The aim of the event is to inform residents of the importance of the NW in our community and its role in making it a safer place.

Traditionally, NW was about neighbours knowing neighbours, paying attention to things that did not look right on the street, and reporting suspicious circumstances for follow-up action by police. This has evolved, to include crime prevention tips across the spectrum of criminal-

ity. The NW program also keeps the community informed about general crime awareness in our community, and understanding the trends, in order to crime-proof the neighbourhood. The seminar will focus on the NW program, how it works, and the roles of NW participants, including the Street Captains (also known as Block Captains).

The focus will also be on the positive role of community policing. Police are most effective when they know their communities, and that occurs through a general relationship with the communities they serve. We have excellent community police officers who serve the Hamlet, and are our link to the

Patrol and Investigative Sections, including Crime Analysts. Come to the event, meet some of these people, and learn how we can work collaboratively in our community to make it a safer place. The OPS will also be featuring the Ottawa Police incident mapping tool, which is available to everyone in the community on the internet. This tool allows you to see on a map where incidents (to OPS) of various types are occurring within the Hamlet.

Remember, the strength of our community lies in working with each other – "Neighbors helping Neighbors". Join us at the seminar and be a contributing partner in improving community safety.

Tick talk



- * Ticks starts to be active when it is above 4C regardless of the season. Ottawa might see ticks in January and February (like Kingston see every year) because of the recent exceptionally mild weather.
- * Ticks mostly live in tall grass, cedar edges and wooded areas. When there is only a mild snow coverage or vegetation is exposed ticks can be present. It's always a good idea to do a tick check on your pet and yourself after going in theses areas.
- * Ask your veterinarian about tick prevention

or if the lyme vaccination is a good option for your dog. More and more veterinarians are discussing the option of all year round tick prevention if pets are going in high risk area.

- * There are several species of ticks. Please make sure the tick prevention you are using for your pet is effective against the Deer Tick (Ixodes Scapularis). This tick is the one that can transmit Lyme Disease and the main one in the greater Ottawa area. Although less common, there are several other diseases that ticks can give to your dog besides Lyme.
- * A good tick prevention should protect your pet for a minimum of one month against several tick species.

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Blackburn Hamlet Emergency Preparedness Plan

Science has shown us that climate change is affecting the frequency, duration, and intensity of climate-related disasters around the world. 2023 was reported as the warmest summer in Canada in 76 years.

Ottawa was affected by climate events in 2023. In February, Ottawa temperatures averaged 5 to 15 degrees colder than normal for some of the lowest temperatures in a generation. In April, Ottawa had nine hours of continuous freezing rain. Many were still without power, including parts of Blackburn Hamlet, after two days. On June 6, there were out-of-control wildfires burning in almost every single province and territory. Throughout the summer Canadian cities, including Ottawa, suffered with some of the worst air quality on Earth. On July 13, two tornadoes touched down in Barrhaven with wind speeds up to 155 km/h. The two tornadoes left paths of damage 1 km and 5 km long. On August 3, a tornado with winds of 130 km/h touched down in the Findlay Creek area, toppling and debarking trees, downing power lines, and wrecking buildings.

At times, these events overwhelmed the city's emergency services. To better prepare for disasters the City of Ottawa has initiated a plan for communities to play an active role in the event of emergencies. Blackburn Hamlet has been chosen as one of the first communities for this new concept.

In the evening of **February 26, starting at 6:30pm**, at the Community Hall, the BCA will be presenting the Blackburn Hamlet's Emergency Preparedness Plan. The plan will address such items as how we can look after the most vulnerable in our community, what steps can we take to minimize the hazards in an emergency, where can people go for help, and how communications play a vital role in an emergency. There will be presentations by various members of the community. This event is a joint effort between the City of Ottawa's Office of Emergency Management and the BCA.

Q & A with new FunFair Chair Steve Vesely

How did you get involved with the FunFair?

My wife and I are nearing 20 years living in Blackburn and, like many, we used to take our kids to the annual fair. We liked it because it wasn't super loud or boisterous or big. It had a good community vibe and we appreciated that. Then we started helping out, with the book sale, the Fun Run, wherever we were needed. And we enjoyed the experience. I have an IT background and redesigned the website a few years ago, helped with the stage set up and tear down and food vendors in more recent years. I've been involved in different aspects of the fair for about five years now and always felt appreciated by the group. There's been really good leadership here in past chairs Brent Lawrie, Mike Murphy and Trisha Cloutier and I know they were all feeling the weight of responsibility managing the fair these past few years. I feel I'm ready to take the torch and carry on the good work they've done and hope I can live up to the example they've set.

Is that a new look logo?

Yes. I wanted a simple redesign to emphasize our local roots and convey some fair nostalgia. Or as our social media team aptly put it – our iconic Blackburn hornet takes center stage amid vibrant fireworks, capturing the essence of our spirited community.

Do we have enough volunteers?

Sadly no. The FunFair is blessed with a small group of dedicated

volunteers who plan and organize the event. It's an important task. But everyone's time and commitment competes with other personal priorities. This year that means we specifically need:

- a coordinator to organize the dog show
- a coordinator to help with the FunRun
- a coordinator to organize volunteers on fair weekend
- SmartServe certified adults who can bartend on fair weekend
- help with stage set-up and teardown
- adult help to take tickets
- book storage volunteers folks with garage space to store books in the months prior to the fair

I'm keenly aware that there are some volunteers who have been doing this for decades and want to pass the torch to a younger generation. We can't keep asking the same core group to do this every year. We need to lighten the load. And it's one of the reasons why I stepped up and agreed to chair this year's fair. I'm hoping there are others in the community who feel the same way.

Why is the FunFair so expensive?

It honestly hurts to hear this raised as a criticism. The FunFair strives to be an affordable weekend event that won't break a family's entertainment budget. Did you know that:

It includes many FREE

attractions:

- the Friday family movie night,
- Saturday morning parade,
- · magician show,
- petting zoo,
- cake celebration,
- afternoon music acts
- and evening fireworks.
 It includes many low cost events:
- the pancake breakfast where else can you get a breakfast meal for under \$10?
- the cheapest beer find me another fair with lower alcohol prices
- the cheapest food we value our partnership with longtime supporters Metro and the Optimist Club of Blackburn Hamlet who offer hamburgers, hotdogs, fruit and simple beverages at wholesale pricing.

And it does include a few attractions like the climbing wall and main band cover charge that are pricier, yet still affordable in comparison to similar events.

I wish folks would consider these factors when looking at prices. I'll happily compare the costs of our fair against another. We have no gate fee, we have no parking fee, and we have multiple free and low-cost attractions to keep prices affordable. The other side of the coin is that it's not cheap to run a fair. This year's expenses are likely

going to be over \$70K and the fair needs to generate enough revenue to cover those costs. We're feeling the inflation pinch just like you and striving to provide the best value for your dollar.

What happened to the Midway?

There is only midway operator – All Canadian Entertainment – that serves the entire eastern region of Ontario and that operator is facing revenue challenges. Our fair is small and less profitable and there are other more profitable alternatives for ACE to pursue in that first week of June. I know the community would like to see the midway return and we have made overtures to see if there is some partnership model that would work. Sadly, we have not yet found a solution.

Any local Olympians?

With this being a Summer Olympics year, the Parade organizing committee are considering an Olympic theme to this year's parade and wondering if we have any local residents who are past, present or future Olympians in our midst who could serve as Parade Marshall... Don't be shy. Reach out!

What's new at this year's fair?

It is my hope to add a few new attractions and change a few others at this year's fair but I'll keep that surprise for the spring issue of the BANAR.



My green journey

I have been steadily working on reducing my overall energy consumption since 2010 and have learned a lot along the way. It started with home renovations which allowed me to replace the existing insulation, add vapour barrier, increase the attic insulation and install energy efficient appliances. When the siding and exterior doors were replaced, a Styrofoam thermal break was installed on the outside walls. These changes resulted in a 25% reduction in electricity use and a 30% reduction in natural gas consumption!

In addition to the home improvements, in 2020 I replaced my aging car with a Tesla Model 3 electric vehicle.

The introduction of the Canada Greener Homes Grant kicked off the next series of projects. These included an Air Things Plus air quality monitor, ER40 rated windows, an energy recovery ventilator, a hybrid heat pump hot water tank and a standing seam metal roof with an ice and water shield underlay.

This year I plan to install solar panels before scheduling the follow-up energy audit, which is required to submit the request for my Canada Greener Homes Grant. Future plans include R60 attic insulation and a high-quality cold climate air source heat pump.

I started with simple goals that grew and changed over time. While I have made mistakes along the way, I am very happy with the end results. My key recommendations to others are:

- Ask for advice from experts and those who are willing to share their experiences and help others understand the options available.
- Hire trusted professionals to help you plan the optimal solutions for your needs.
- Scrutinize everything you receive from sales people and ask lots of questions.
