BCA Board highlights May & June 2024

Highlights from recent BCA Board activities include:

- The September 19, 2024 board meeting will be held upstairs in the big red barn at Just Food starting at 7:30 pm. Blackburn Hamlet residents are welcome to attend.
- The NCC is planning to install a multi-use path parallel to Tauvette that will connect the Hornets Nest path to Innes Road. This will include a fence that will have openings at the end of Tauvette and at Southpark for access to Just Food.
- The BCA is continuing to work on our Emergency Preparedness Plan in conjunction with the City of Ottawa and many other stakeholders.
- The BCA has been working with the Arena Manager on improvements to our Community Hall.
 Initial improvements included an outdoor trash can and a recycling bin inside the hall. Our next priority will be improving the electrical supply for FunFair and smoke and CO2 detectors. Future goals include an emergency generator, public Wi-Fi and an outdoor water fountain.

Protect yourself from scams!

Scams seem to be everywhere.

Scenario 1: You get an email from your bank that says there has been an adjustment to your account and the bank owes you money. The email requests that

you confirm your bank account number and the password, and the money owed to you will be deposited into your account immediate-

ALERT! No bank in Canada would do this.

Scenario 2: You get a phone call from someone who identi-

fies himself as a police officer. He says your grandson has been involved in a vehicle accident and has been charged. You immediately ask if Johnny (your grandson) is okay. The caller, now knowing the name of your grandson, says Johnny is fine, but needs \$800 for bail or he will be sent to jail.

ALERT! No police agency in

Canada would do this.

These are just two of the many tactics that fraudsters use to get your money. In 2023, credit card fraud was the leading issue among bank customers, with 951 fraud-related complaints, an almost 350-per-cent increase from 2022. The Government of Canada reports

> that there were 41,988 victims of all types of fraud in 2023. There have already been 15,941 cases reported so far this year.

So, what can you do to avoid these scams?

On September 26, don't miss Stephanie Senecal from the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC)

as she will explain the role of the CAFC, how you can recognize scams, and how you can defend yourself against fraudsters as part of the Discovery Café series (more info on page 26).

The Just Food Community Farm's farm stand

Nestled in Blackburn Hamlet, the bountiful Just Food Community Farm is a hub of creative agriculture and community. Independent producers share experiences, tackling new challenges daily and devising quick solutions. Organic farming is embraced here, reflecting a commitment to sustainable practices and a love for regenerating the land.

The most public face of the Just Food Community Farm is its farm stand, where producers sell what they grow and make, every Sunday from 11 am to 2 pm (except long weekends). The stand can be found within the grounds of Just Food (enter at 2391 Pepin Ct), under the pavilion behind the barn.

Here are the producers selling at the farm stand this season:

- be Bountiful Beaver is a new farm this year in the "start;up farm" program, offering seedlings, vegetables, and a farm-sourced beverage of the week!
- Capital Bees sells Certified Naturally Grown honey and hive products from the bees that pollinate the farm.
- 7 Hues Eco-Farm: CBC's Ottawa Morning referred to Li as "the tomato lady"! Li and her husband Yves grow around 20 types of tomatoes along with peppers, squash, beans and many exotic Asian vegetables.
- Chi Garden is a small ecological farm, believing in "food is medicine." Using regenerative soil practices, they grow vegetables and herbs, and forage wild edibles from East and West traditions. They specialize in

- fermented foods and offer teachings and tours.
- **EHO Farm** produces organic veggies with a passion and brings a taste of Haiti.
- WWHG provides trauma-informed programs for Women and 2SLGBTQIA+ people who have served in the Canadian Armed Forces. They sell eggs, pickles, jam, balms, and soaps.
- Nanabush Food Forests sells innovative low-sugar preserves from sun-ripened fruits, vegetables, herbs, and mushrooms growing in its restorative forest gardens and donates proceeds to the registered charity, Forêt Capitale Forest.



October 24, 2024 - First Crossing: Alexander Mackenzie's fascinating crossing of North America - Richard Van Loon


Alex Mackenzie from Canada by land 22d July 1793 - Those simple words painted on a rock at the head of the North Bentinck Arm near Bella Coola BC mark the culmination of the first complete crossing of North America, a voyage by one of Canada's most famous trader/ explorers, Alexander Mackenzie. Mackenzie's odyssey was indeed amazing, but it would not have been possible without the support of several First Nations and a hardy group of traders who preceded his travels to the northwest. We will meet many of them, and his dog, as Mackenzie makes a perilous way west. Hang on. It's a tough trip.

Richard Van Loon was President and Professor Emeritus of Carleton University which he led from 1995 to 2005. He then returned to teaching there in the School of Public Policy and Administration until 2015.

He was a professor of political science and public administration at Queen's, the University of Ottawa and Carleton, intermingled with a career in the public service, ending as Associate Deputy Minister of both Health Canada and Indian and Northern Affairs.

This talk and others on early Canadian history result from an ongoing interest rekindled after he left the presidency of Carleton in 2005.






Anesthesia-free dental cleanings for pets are popular outside veterinary clinics due to their lower cost and avoidance of anesthesia risks. Pets remain awake, making it convenient for owners and much cheaper. However, these cleanings only address visible tartar ABOVE the gumline, focusing primarily on **cosmetic** improvement. They do not effectively clean below the gumline where bacteria thrive, leading to potential dental health issues like periodontal disease and bad breath.
